Dedication

The Town of Livermore Falls would like to dedicate the Town Report to Joseph G. Riordan.

Joseph G. Riordan was born in St. John, New Brunswick in 1923. In the same year, his parents moved to Livermore Falls.

Mr. Riordan attended local schools and graduated from Livermore Falls High School in 1941. After graduation, he went to work for International Paper Company at the Otis Mill.

In 1942 Mr. Riordan enlisted in the Royal Canadian Air Force, and was trained as a Wireless Air Gunner and served overseas until the end of World War II, when he was discharged with the rank of Warrant Officer.

Mr. Riordan returned to work at International Paper in November, 1945 and worked there until his retirement in 1984 at which time he was foreman of #3 paper machine.

In 1961 Mr. Riordan became an American Citizen and after that time always took a deep interest in town government, serving on budget committees.

Mr. Riordan was a Selectman and Assessor from 1978 to 1991.

Mr. and Mrs. Riordan has lived in East Livermore since 1945. They are parents of eight children.

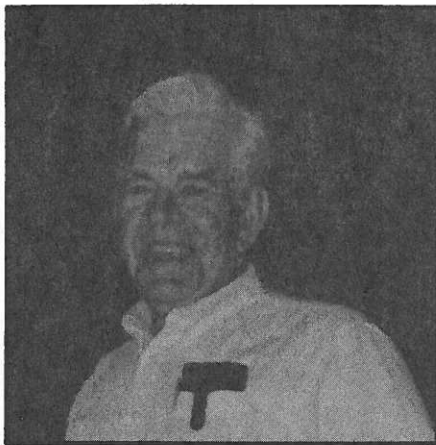
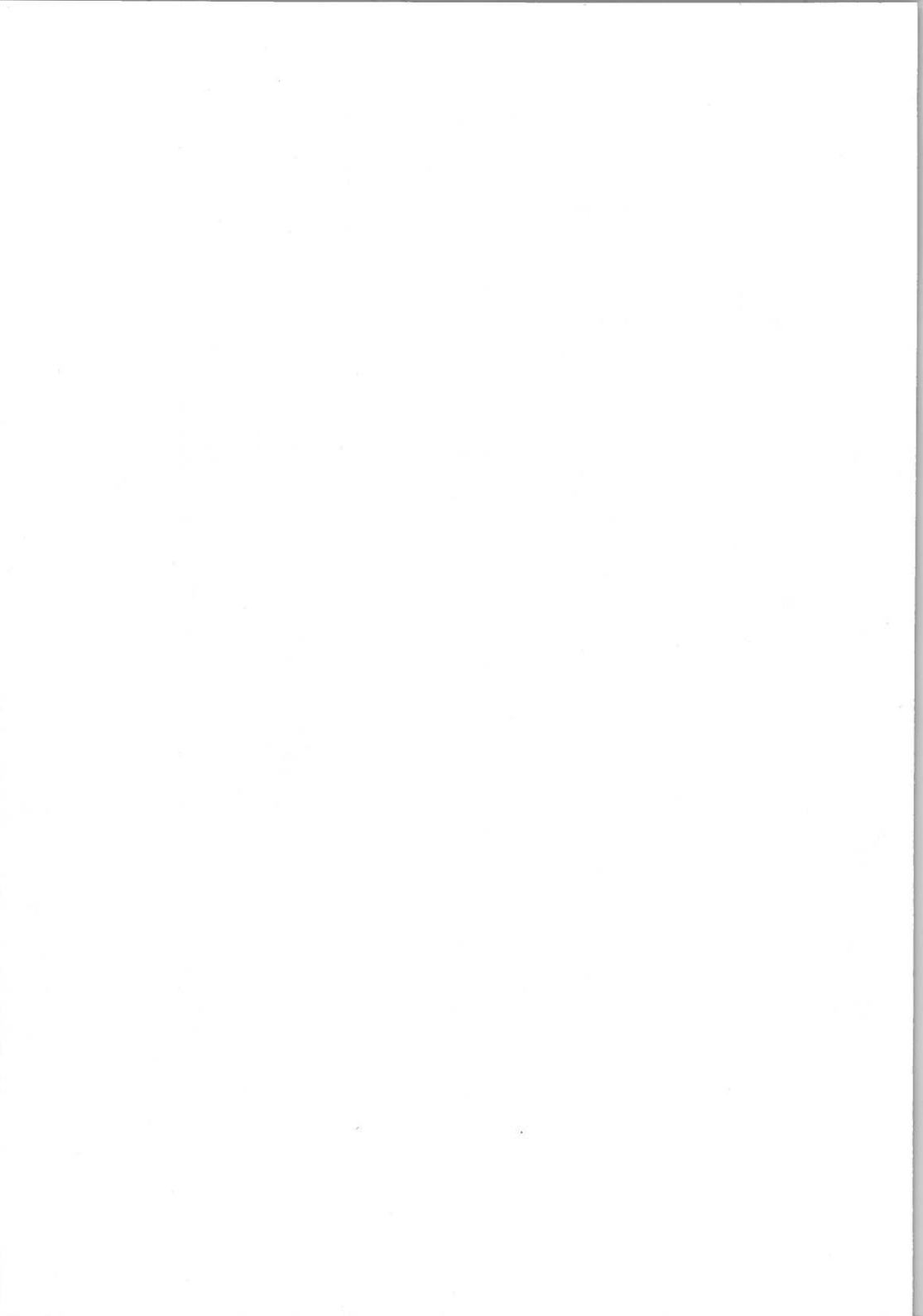

TOWN MANAGER'S REPORT

To The Selectmen and Citizens of Livermore Falls:

As we all know, the economy in the State, has not been very inspiring, this past year, and the cuts in Municipal revenues has not been easy, cuts in Education, Revenue Sharing, Court Rent, and many other State Services.

The Town of Livermore Falls however, should be very proud, that we have the Bio-mass plant and the Downeast shoe shop, that have been hiring people in the area and still are. While other towns have not been so lucky, jobs have been scarce and many people have been out of work.

The Town is financially in very good shape since changing our year from a calender year to a fiscal year in 1983, and have taxes due twice a year. We no longer have to borrow money, our tax collections have been very good, therefore we can make interest on our money, rather then pay interest on borrowed money.

With the help of Kent Mitchell and Greg Gill, we have applied for different Grants. One of which we received from the Maine Department of Transportation. It is a matching fund Grant for the Snelling road. They started work on it last fall and should finish in a month or so. We are applying for a grant for the Sewall Street sewer project, this has to be in by May 29, 1992. We are hoping to receive that this summer.

The Welfare Program has improved over the past year with the change in State laws, and the hiring of Donna Fontaine, who is the new General Assistance Administrator.

Ronald Leclerc was appointed as the new Fire Chief last year, and has done a great job. He has worked on having our firemen get Hazmat Training at the International Paper Co. which is a big savings to the Town. He has also gotten Mutual Aid Agreements with many surrounding towns.

I think the Highway Department should be commended for the good job they did this winter on our roads. The Police Department and Dispatch should also be commended for their professionalism, in handling their jobs.

I would like to thank the office staff, the Selectmen, and the many Volunteer Committees, for their help and support in the past year.

I look forward to a great and prosperous year in 1993, for the Town.

TAX COLLECTOR'S REPORT

Under the July 1 through June 30 fiscal accounting period, annual reports must be prepared and printed prior to the end of the fiscal period and before the post-annual audit can be started. April through March 31 has been selected as the most reasonable reporting period that can be offered to the voters for comparative information purposes.

Taxes are committed to the Tax Collector at the time the annual bills are mailed out, usually in August, and at the expiration of eight to twelve months, any unpaid balances are placed on lien and turned over to the Treasurer for collection. Any liens which are not paid in full, with interest and recording fees, foreclose after 18 months and become the property of the Town. Both the Treasurer and the Tax Collector accept partial or installment payments in order to assist taxpayers to avoid liens and foreclosures.

Tax Discounts

In order to encourage early payment of taxes, which helps the Town to avoid borrowing costs and to make higher investment earnings, the proposal for tax discounts is the same as last year which was very successful. If the entire bill (100%) is paid within 30 days of date of commitment a discount of 3% will be deducted from your bill. These discounts are to be funded from an \$11,500 appropriation.

PUBLIC WORKS REPORT

Main-Land Development of Livermore Falls was selected to do the closure plan for the Town's landfill. So far this year, only preliminary work has been done. Every step of the closure has to be approved by the D.E.P. as we move through the slow process of the final capping of the landfill. The projected date of changing from the dump and cover method we now use to some other way of handling our solid waste is January of 1993. This date could change if the State decides to grant extensions but the selection of our final alternative should happen this year. Thanks to good public support of our voluntary recycling program of cardboard, plastic, tires, metal, glass, and cans, along with the volume of recycled paper at the Otis Mill, we reached the state recycling goal of 25%.

The treatment plant got approval for three more sludge spreading sites last year. This allows us more flexibility in the wasting program and lighter loading of our older sites. All D.E.P. discharge license requirements were met with no violations reported. Separation and infilliation removal have kept flows at the plant within design guidelines even with some additional hook ups to the collection system. Some replacement of older equipment this year should make for better control at the plant, namely a new grinder for influent solids and a new sludge collection system in the clarifiers. A design for replacement of the old sewer line on Sewall and Depot Street is almost complete and the project could possibly be done this year. Two other state mandates being studied are declorination of the effluent and toxicity testing. These two parameters will be added to our next license renewal in 1993.

Highway work last year included spot mulch work on the Eastman Road, Blind road, and Jug Hill road. Mulch and chip seal was done on Campgrounds Roads and Androscoggin Bluffs. The planned work for the Snelling road was put off due to the energy plant construction project. This road will be totally rebuilt this summer with some state grant and town funds. The winter was kind to us early but went out with a roar with April seeing more snow than February or March. Many projects are planned for the coming year including paving, ditching, road trimming, landfill work, sewer work, and culvert repair.

To Whom It May Concern:

During my 8 months as Fire Chief, I am pleased to report that with the help of the officers and men of the L.F. Fire Department, we were able to make major advances in many areas:

TRAINING

Training was carried out for all members in Haz Mat Awareness; six members are qualified Haz Mat technicians after completing their 40 hour course. The L. F. Fire Department was proud to sponsor their 2nd Fire Fighter I 120 hour course, qualifying 8 more members in addition to the present 5 members, to Fire Fighter I level. We also have 5 members trained to Fire Fighter II level. This training, along with the experienced personnel for the department, allows us to provide excellent fire protection for the townspeople while ensuring the safety of the fire fighters.

SAFETY

All fire fighters are outfitted with the best available fire protection gear. We also have a fire ground safety officer who monitors personnel who enter buildings to fight the fires and to ensure they exit safely.

MUTUAL AID

Agreements were made or renewed with the Departments of Jay, Livermore, Fayette, Wilton, Leeds and Farmington. These agreements allow the townspeople of all these areas maximum fire protection by sharing equipment and trained personnel, thereby reducing cost to taxpayers.

EQUIPMENT

The major upgrade for the department was the addition of a Cascade system for filling air pack bottles at the scene of a fire. It is mounted in the department's Squad Truck. It allows us to inventory less bottles because we can refill so quickly, and is a secure air supply. Smaller equipment, hand tools, fans, hose fittings, were also updated or improved.

A very positive sign has been the influx of new members after a long dry spell of new volunteers. I hope to continue to attract new members by providing more and better training and involving all members in the workings of their department.

I would like to thank all the members for their continued efforts to improve the Fire Department in 1991 and forward to the coming fiscal year. I am very pleased with the support and cooperation of the Town Manager, Maxine Bailey, and the Selectmen for helping this department improve.

We had a very busy year in 1991, and our circulation was up by 3,051 items (11 per cent over 1990).

We observed National Library Week in April, and had several displays for our patrons to enjoy.

In the spring, I completed another 8 week Continuing Education Class on Cataloging and Classification, which was sponsored by the Maine State Library.

During the month of May, we were privileged to have a special display of watercolor paintings done by the Adult Education students of Mrs. Jean Kozlowski. Our patrons really enjoyed this exhibit of the works of some very talented local artists.

Also in May, I attended the Maine Library Association Conference at the University of Maine in Orono. While there we attended many workshops, and saw numerous displays of books presented by several publishing companies. I have also attended several workshops, meetings and book reviews during the past year, which were hosted by area libraries.

In June, we hosted a workshop on "How To Get Your Kids To Read This Summer", which was presented by Ms. Ramsay Fifield from West Bath, Maine. She shared many popular books which should help to make children more interested in reading.

The 1991 Summer Reading Program was another huge success. We had 64 children successfully finish "Summer Splash 1991", with a total of 1,214 hours of reading by the children. A victory party was held for these children with a special program presented by Nathan Pepper, a young magician from Farmington. He did a magic show, juggling, and then made animal balloons for the children to take home. During the 6-week program several special activities took place. They included storytelling, a learn-how-to-draw class, special video showings, and many other craft and storytime presentations.

We gave several tours to area school children, and continued to introduce them to the world of books.

We welcomed 309 new customers to our library in 1991. We added 713 books to our shelves, many of them donated by generous patrons. We are now subscribing to 48 magazines and receive two newspapers.

We have borrowed several educational video packages from the Maine State Library for our patron use. These are loaned to us on a rotating basis with other Maine libraries. We also offer a Large Print collection of books, which we also borrow on a rotating schedule from the Maine State Library.

We want to thank Mrs. Doris DeMillo for the many hours that she has volunteered at the library this year. We also want to thank all the other people who have helped us with storytime and craft times, in addition to all the assistance we received in connection with our special programming during our Summer Reading Program.

In closing, we would like to thank all the people who donated books to the library this year, and to give special thanks to all of our patrons for making 1991 a great year. We hope that you will continue to support your local library in the coming year as well.

LIVERMORE FALLS WATER DISTRICT

To The Citizens of Livermore Falls:

The Trustees of the Livermore Falls Water District hereby submit their annual report for the year ending December 31, 1991.

In the spring of 1991 the twelve inch ductile water main from Parkhurst Pond to Moose Hill was tested and the clean up completed. The system can be used at any time the level in Moose Hill gets extremely low.

Two slow sand filter pilot systems were installed. One at Parkhurst Pond the other at Moose Hill. The systems ran and were tested from March to October of 1991, to determine whether slow sand filtration was feasible for the Livermore Falls Water District to meet E.P.A.'s regulations requiring filtration of surface drinking water supplies. Very favorable results were found with this process of filtration, and the District is proceeding with plans to build a plant at Moose Hill.

A great deal of time in 1991 has been spent on these projects by the District employees.

In April the system was flushed through the hydrants.

Three (3) new services were installed.

Twelve (12) service boxes and ten (10) service lines were repaired or replaced.

Four (4) road boxes were repaired or replaced.

Four (4) main line breaks were repaired.

In December 1991, because of the possible unsafe conditions and environmental legal ramifications and the reporting required by the government the gas Chlorination system at Moose Hill pump station was replaced with a Sodium Hypochlorite disinfection system.

Other work done by the District personnel is considered routine.

POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT

To the Town Manager, Selectmen and Citizens:

The Livermore Falls Police Department received and responded to 3,974 calls for emergencies and/or assistance, an increase of 157 over last year. In addition to these calls 79 parking tickets were issued, 1,625 traffic stops were recorded with 508 traffic summons issued, 148 Criminal summons were issued and 224 arrests were made. The Police Department also handled 180 traffic accidents.

The DARE Program was presented to the S.A.D. 36 students by Officer Thomas Gould this year at the 5th grade level. This is the first program from our Department and we hope to continue.

The major increase in crime this year appears to directly relate to the economic conditions of the times. Domestic disputes or family quarrels increased over last year, as well as attempted suicides and persons that had to forcibly be institutionalized (commitments). This, along with a slight increase in thefts, shows how desperate and frustrated people have become. This has also become a time of considerable challenge for the Police Officers as they have to gear themselves towards attempting to counsel victims and violators, as well as enforce the law and protect victims from further threat or harm.

All of the Officers at the Police Department are indebted to the dispatchers at the Dispatch center, as they receive and relay necessary information to each Officer so they will know how to respond to a call and once at a call the dispatchers continue to check with the Officers to assure they are progressing safely. In addition to their work with the Police, dispatchers also relay and assist with calls for CES Ambulance, Livermore Falls Fire Department and the Livermore Fire Department.

In closing, I would like to thank all the citizens of Livermore Falls for their assistance and support this year and would like to hear from anyone having ideas or suggestions that would help the Police Department serve the community better. I would also like to thank CES, the area Town, County and State Departments, the Livermore Falls Municipal Departments, the Town Manager, Selectmen and again, the citizens, for their support.

The final manuscript for the Livermore Falls Informational Packet is done and we are hoping for a June 1992 printing. This packet is composed of several sections of data dealing with the following topics: Quality of Life, Business Services, Quality of Labor Force, Business climate, Access to Market and Available Business Sites. Also enclosed in the packet is a separate sheet with up to date demographics for Livermore Falls.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

We have audited the accompanying general purpose financial statements of the Town of Livermore Falls, as of June 30, 1991, and for the year then ended. These general purpose financial statements are the responsibility of the town's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these general purpose financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the general purpose financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the general purpose financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall general purpose financial statement presentations. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

The general purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the General Fixed Assets Account Group, which should be included in order to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. The amount that should be recorded in the General Fixed Assets Account Group is not known.

In our opinion, except for the effect on the financial statements of the omission described in the preceding paragraph, the general purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Town of Livermore Falls, as of June 30, 1991, and the results of its operations and the cash flows of its proprietary and similar trust fund types for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

Our audit was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole. The accompanying financial information listed as supporting schedules in the table of contents is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the financial statements of the Town of Livermore Falls. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the general purpose financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly presented in all material respects in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

1992 TOWN MEETING WARRANT

To: Ernest N. Steward, Jr., a constable of the Town of Livermore Falls, in the County of Androscoggin, State of Maine:

Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the voters of the Town of Livermore Falls in the County of Androscoggin in the State of Maine, qualified by law to vote in Town affairs, to meet at the Fire Station in said Town of Livermore Falls on Tuesday the 9th day of June, AD 1992 at 8:45 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles to wit:

ARTICLE 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

ARTICLE 2. To choose by secret ballot in accordance with Title 30 Maine Revised Statutes Annotated Section 2061 all necessary Town Officials including one Selectman/Assessor for a three year term; one Selectman/Assessor for a two year term; Town Clerk/Treasurer for a two year term; three Directors to School Administrative District No. 36 for three years.

NOTE: The polls for election of officers will open at approximately 9:00 o'clock (9:00 a.m.) in the forenoon and close at 8:00 o'clock (8:00 p.m.) in the evening. At the closing of the polls the meeting will recess and reconvene at seven o'clock (7:00 p.m.) in the evening on Wednesday, June 10, 1992 at Murray Hall for the purpose of acting on the remainder of the Articles.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will vote to fix dates when taxes shall be due and payable, and see if the Town will fix a rate of interest to be paid on taxes unpaid after such date.

Recommendation: That 10% per annum be charged commencing on December 2, 1992 on all first $\frac{1}{2}$ year tax payments not paid on or before December 1, 1992, and that 10% per annum be charged commencing on May 3, 1992 on all second $\frac{1}{2}$ year tax payments not paid on or before April 30, 1993.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will authorize a tax discount of three percent (3%) of the entire tax bill if the bill is paid in full within 30 days of commitment of taxes, and raise by taxation and appropriate \$11,500.00 to said discounts.

NOTE: This will allow a one-time discount of 3% on property taxes if paid in full (both the 1st and the 2nd half) within 30 days of commitment of taxes.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will fix a time period after which interest will be charged on unpaid sewer assessments and to see if the Town will fix a rate of interest to be charged on sewer assessments not paid within said time period.

(Selectmen and Budget Committee Recommendation: That 10% per annum prorated daily be charged on sewer assessments not paid within 60 days of the quarterly billing due date with said interest commencing on the first business day following said 60 day period.)

ARTICLE 6.
