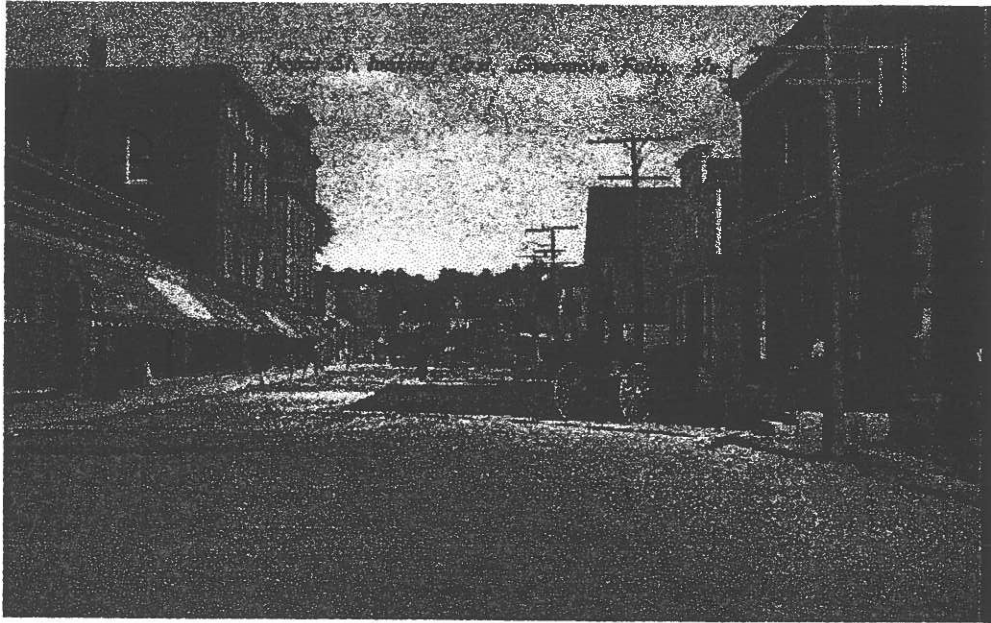

We would like to thank Maxine for many years of support, cooperation and contribution. We wish her a happy retirement.

This year, two long time Selectmen, Dianne French and Bernal Lake are finishing their terms, choosing not to run for re-election. We thank them for their contribution and dedication.

We wish to take this opportunity to thank our Town Manager, Town Clerk/Treasurer, Office Staff, Department Heads and all of the Employees for their dedication this past year.

We would also like to thank all the volunteers on the Boards and Commissions for their fine work.

## TOWN MANAGERS REPORT

To the Selectmen and Citizen's of Livermore Falls

My nine years as Town Manager of Livermore Falls, have been both challenging, and enjoyable. I started in 1988 and the following are some of the changes made since then.

The revaluation of the Town was completed in 1989, which changed the mill rate from 23.50 to 13.50. We closed out the C.D.B.G. Grant, after redoing the parking lot and paving at the Municipal Building. We also put roofs over the Town Office and Police Department entrances. The sewer project at Moose Hill was completed, which replaced the sand filter system.

In 1990 we dedicated the Town Report to the "Maine Street '90 Committee", for their many hours of work in building the Gazebo. This was a great addition to the Town. The Alternative Energy Plant started to be built on the Snelling Road. "Downeast Casual Footwear" bought the "Maine Woods" shoe factory. We put welcome to Livermore Falls signs up, and hung plants on the light poles in the Business area.

We applied for two Grants in 1991, and received both. One was from M.D.O.T. to rebuild the Snelling Road. The other Grant was for the Sewall Street Sewer Project.

We closed the Landfill in 1992, and started hauling our waste to the Town of Jay. Computers were installed in the Town Office and Police Department. We also purchased a new Fire Truck.

We covered the Landfill and grassed it over in 1993 at a cost of \$200,000.00. The State reimbursed 75% plus interest. We purchased a ten wheeler to haul snow and sand at the Highway Department.


We worked many hours on the upgrade of the Sewer Treatment Plant in 1994-95. We hired Whitman & Howard Engineering firm to do the plans. We received approval for a Grant in the amount of \$508,700.00 and approval to borrow a million dollars from Farmers Home Administration.

In 1996-97 we bought new chairs for the Selectmen's room. Ron Morris painted the offices and meeting room at the Municipal Building, and we had a new carpet laid.

I will retire January 1, 1998 after working for the Town since 1979. I would like to Thank the Selectmen, Heads of Departments, all Town Employees, and all volunteer Committee Members for their support over the years.

I'm very proud of my Town, and will miss you all. We are in very good financial shape, and have an excellent office staff. I'm sure who ever replaces me, will find it very easy to work with all of you.

## TAX COLLECTORS REPORT

Under the July 1 through June 30 fiscal accounting period, annual reports must be prepared and printed prior to the end of the fiscal period and before the post annual audit can be started. April 1 through March 31 has been selected as the most reasonable reporting period that can be offered to the voters for comparative information purposes.

Taxes are committed to the Tax Collector at the time the annual bills are mailed out, usually in August, and at the expiration of eight to twelve months, any unpaid balances are placed on lien and turned over to the Treasurer for collection. Any liens which are not paid in full, with interest and recording fees, foreclose after 18 months and become the property of the Town. The Treasurer and the Tax Collector accept partial or installment payments in order to assist Taxpayers to avoid liens and foreclosures.

### Tax Discounts

In order to encourage early payments of taxes, which help the Town to avoid borrowing costs and to make higher investment earnings, the proposal for tax discounts is the same as last year, which was very successful. If the entire bill is paid within 30 days of the date of commitment, a discount of 2% will be deducted from your bill. These discounts are to be funded from a \$15,000.00 appropriation.

# Public Works Report

The highway department ran smoothly this year with no major problems. The winter was late in arriving but stayed beyond its welcome. Many late storms used up sand and caused minor road damage. The budget is projected to be right on track with original estimates. The highway garage got 2 new overhead doors and an exhaust system to remove welding smoke and paint fumes. This year will see the crew busy with sand clean-up, painting, ditching, shoulder work, brush removal, and everyday road work. Our highway crew worked very hard this year and received many compliments on their professional job of winter road maintenance.

A face lift is expected at the landfill this year with additional bays added to handle the recyclables more efficiently. We are also looking at a cement pad for easier walking and traffic control in the drop off area. People are doing a good job, on average, of recycling but with tipping fees and hauling costs going up it becomes even more important to recycle as much as possible. The savings of recycling over trash hauled away is now \$40 per ton. If anyone has questions about recycling please ask Fred at the landfill and he will gladly help you.

The wastewater treatment plant upgrade is projected to be bid by August with construction starting sometime in the fall. The new plant will be a secondary treatment facility utilizing trickling filters and 2 new circular clarifiers. This project will replace the old treatment plant, have design flows that allow growth, remove all overflows to the river, and correct all confined space safety issues. The total project is expected to cost \$5.8 million of which Livermore Falls will pay 51% and Jay will pay 49%.

TO THE TOWN MANAGER, SELECTMEN AND CITIZENS:

THE LIVERMORE FALLS POLICE DEPARTMENT HAS RECEIVED AND RESPONDED TO 3148 CALLS FOR EMERGENCIES AN/OR ASSISTANCE THIS YEAR. IN ADDITION, 301 ARRESTS WERE MADE, 238 CRIMINAL SUMMONS WERE ISSUED AND 1379 TRAFFIC STOPS WERE MADE. ARRESTS HAVE AGAIN INCREASED THIS YEAR BY 107. THIS IS A 38% INCREASE OVER LAST YEAR'S INCREASE OF 34%. IT BECOMES APPARENT THAT THE POLICE DEPARTMENT IS FIGHTING AN UPHILL BATTLE IN DETERRING MAJOR CRIMES SUCH AS ASSAULT, BURGLARY, THEFT, DOMESTIC DISPUTES, NEIGHBOR DISPUTES, DRUNKENNESS, LIQUOR AND DRUG LAW VIOLATIONS. ALL HAVE NEARLY DOUBLED OVER THE LAST YEAR. THIS ONLY REPRESENTS THOSE CASES THAT ARE ACTUALLY REPORTED TO US. THE INCREASE IN THESE AREAS DEMONSTRATES THE LACK OF RESPECT TO ONESELF AS WELL AS THEIR FAMILY AND NEIGHBORS. THIS APPEARS TO BE A GROWING TREND ACROSS THE COUNTRY. IT IS ONLY WITH THE ASSISTANCE AND COOPERATION OF THOSE CITIZENS THAT TRULY CARE FOR THEIR TOWN THAT WE CAN ONCE AGAIN HAVE A FRIENDLY AND PEACEFUL TOWN TO ENJOY.

OFFICER PHILIP PORTER HAS COMPLETED HIS FIRST YEAR OF TEACHING D.A.R.E AT THE FIFTH GRADE LEVEL. CORP. THOMAS GOULD WILL STILL BE WORKING WITH THE D.A.R.E. PROGRAM, HOWEVER HE WILL BE TRAINED FOR THE JUNIOR HIGH/HIGH SCHOOL LEVEL. OFFICER GERALD COWLES HAS COMPLETED FIELD TRAINING ALL OF THE RESERVE OFFICERS IN THE DEPARTMENT AND CONTINUES TO WORK WITH THEM, ALONG WITH CORP. GOULD.

THE DISPATCHERS ARE PATIENTLY WAITING FOR UPDATED EQUIPMENT FROM THE STATE FOR THE DISPATCH CENTER. WE ARE ALSO WAITING FOR APPROVAL FOR LICENSE CHANGES. THE STATE HAS STILL NOT MADE A FINAL DECISION ON WHERE THE "PUBLIC SERVICE ANSWERING POINTS" WILL BE LOCATED FOR THE E911 SYSTEM BUT WE ARE HOPING TO BECOME ONE.

THE 911 ADDRESS COMMITTEE HAS JUST RECEIVED THE FINAL MAP DRAFTS ON 05-09-97. THE COMMITTEE WILL NOW HAVE TO VERIFY THEIR ACCURACY AND MAKE A CONVERSION LIST, CHANGING THE OLD RESIDENCE NUMBERS TO THE NEW ONES. ONCE THIS HAS BEEN COMPLETED, NEW RESIDENCE NUMBERS WILL BE ISSUED. THIS NEW ADDRESS SYSTEM WILL ALLOW QUICK AND ACCURATE RESPONSE TO ALL RESIDENTS IN THE EVENT OF AN EMERGENCY.

IN CLOSING BOTH THE POLICE DEPARTMENT AND DISPATCH CENTER WOULD LIKE TO THANK ALL THE CITIZENS OF LIVERMORE FALLS, THE TOWN MANAGER, SELECTMEN AND AREA SERVICES FOR THEIR SUPPORT AND ASSISTANCE OF THE PAST YEAR.

To the Citizens of Livermore Falls,

At this time, I would like to thank the many individuals who contributed time and effort towards the department in the past year.

First of all, my Department Officers & Members, Town Manager, Clerk, Office Help, Selectman, Code Enforcement, Police Chief & Officers, Dispatchers, Town Mechanic, Water District, CES, Mutual Aid Depts., Jay, Livermore, Wilton, Farmington, Fayette, Leeds, Chesterville, Wayne, Otis Specialty Papers, International Paper Company, Mead Paper High Angle Rescue Team and last but not least I must mention my Family Members, as many hours continue to be served.

One accomplishment of this past year, was the signing of a Mutual Aid Agreement with the Town of Wayne. This was pursued many times over the past several years with no agreement reached. This agreement should enhance our water supply in the rural area of East Livermore.

The purchase of a Class A Foam System, will enhance the departments tactics in battling all types of Class Fires. To date, data shows the use of less water and man hours when the class a foam is applied in incidents.

Major improvements continue at the station, kitchen, offices remodeled, air compressor to fill S.C.B.A. bottles, miscellaneous equipment within, and the removal of the under ground oil tanks in the immediate future. These tasks were accomplished by budgetary monies, donated materials, items and manhours.

A couple of unusual Emergency Incidents accrued in the recent fiscal year. First being a Propane Release that occurred at the Middle School. The investigation concluded that human behavior appears to be the cause with the opening of a valve to a 100 lb. Liquid Propane Tank. In which when the liquid reaches normal air it expands 270 times and settles in low areas. With a large vapor cloud showing on arrival, the immediate decision to evacuate a half mile area



down wind was ordered. An evacuation of this size to my knowledge has not been excised for sometime. It pointed out the importance of all The Public Emergency Services and Mutual Aid Agreements, of everyone involved in the incident.

The second incident involved an engineer slipping and falling from the stack located at the Biomass Plant. As the incident developed, it was determined that an available resource, with more significant training in high rescue would be used. Immediately, Mead's Paper High Angle Rescue Team was called to assist in the rescue, which shortly turned into a recovery before their arrival.

Once again I would like to stress that all outside burning requires a permit. Depending on the weather, time of year, and Fire Danger Classification, issued by the Maine State Forestry Service, will determine if a permit will be issued on a daily basis. A permit may be obtained through the Town Fire Warden; Chief Jones, Deputy Wardens; Assistant Chief Leclerc and Lieut., Jones.

The Department Members and Myself would like to express our feelings by taking this time to thank the many individuals who continue to support our efforts in fund raisers which are used in various ways. Recently a five ton trailer was purchased with these funds which will be used to haul our antique truck to various functions.

We continue to struggle with the recruiting of new members to our department. I encourage any local citizen who may have some level of interest to help and serve their local community to contact an officer of the department so the process of recruitment could be started.

As in the past, I must once again stress the importance of having AT LEAST ONE WORKING SMOKE DETECTOR per level in all structures. Along with having a well rehearsed ESCAPE PLAN. Fire Prevention must be second to none!

We have had a very busy year as we welcomed 203 new members to our library in 1996. We added 1,346 books and other materials to our collection, many of them donated by generous patrons. We now receive 37 magazines and two newspapers.

We had another very successful Summer Reading Program with the theme "Super Summer Blast". One-hundred and three children and parents completed the six-week program, with an all-time record of 3,413 hours of reading. We offered many special activities during the summer. We had several story-and-craft times, a sing-a-long, an origami class, and two individual programs on owls and bats presented by the Chewonki Foundation of Wiscasset.

We had a victory party at the completion of the program, and the entertainment was provided by Patrick Swan, also known as "The Amazing Swandini". His lively program was the highlight of the evening with a combination of magic tricks, juggling, unicycling and balloon figures for everyone. We gave out many prizes, and refreshments were enjoyed by all. We want to extend our much appreciated thanks to all the people who helped to make the program so enjoyable for the children.

We continue to offer a growing collection of Large Print books, some of which are loaned to us from the Maine State Library on a rotating schedule with other Maine libraries. We also started a collection of audio books on cassette, which has been well received.

We have started the "long process" of trying to automate the library in the future by entering all of our new materials. We hope to start entering the books currently on the shelves, one-at-a-time, during the next few years. It will require a lot of time and funding to accomplish this project.

I have attended many workshops and classes sponsored by the Maine State Library, and have found them to be very educational and interesting. I have also attended many other library meetings during the past year.

The children and teachers from the Elementary Learning Center (ELC) came to the library every two weeks during the Fall for library skills. They learned how to use the library, enjoyed the books and stories, and later checked out books to take back to their classrooms. They were unable to use their library at school, due to a fire last spring that destroyed their library. We enjoyed having them visit us, and hope that we helped to introduce them to the books and information which is available at their public library.

We continued to have the evening Story and Craft Time for the children, which is enjoyed by all who attend.

Our special "Thanks" to Mrs. Doris DeMillo, Ms. Gail LaChance, Ms. Moira Caron and Mrs. Bernadette Marquis for the many many hours that they volunteered at the library this year. The financial statements of the Town of Livermore Falls, Maine, for the year ended June 30, 1995, were examined by other auditors whose report dated November 27, 1995, expressed a qualified opinion pertaining to the omission of the general fixed asset group of accounts.

I conducted my audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that I plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the general purpose financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the general purpose financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall general purpose financial statements presentation. I believe that my audit provides a reasonable basis for my opinion.

The Town of Livermore Falls, Maine, has not maintained a record of its general fixed assets, and accordingly, a statement of general fixed assets, required by generally accepted accounting principles, is not included in the financial report.

In my opinion, except for the effect on the financial statements of the omission described in the preceding paragraph, the general purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Town of Livermore Falls, Maine as of June 30, 1996, and the results of its operations and cash flows of its proprietary and similar trust fund types for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

1997 TOWN MEETING WARRANT

To: Ernest N. Steward, Jr., a constable of the Town of Livermore Falls, in the county of Androscoggin, in the State of Maine:

Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the voters of the Town of Livermore Falls in the county of Androscoggin, in the State of Maine, qualified by law to vote in Town affairs, to meet at the Fire Station in said Town of Livermore Falls on Tuesday, the 10th day of June, AD 1997 at 8:45 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles to wit:

ARTICLE 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

ARTICLE 2. To choose by secret ballot in accordance with Title 30 Maine Revised Statutes Annotated Section 2061 all necessary Town Officials including one Selectman/Assessor for a three year term; one Selectman/Assessor for a two year term; three Directors to School Administrative District No. 36 for three years; and one Director to School Administrative District No. 36 for one year.

NOTE: The polls for election of officers will open at approximately 9:00 o'clock in the forenoon and close at 6:00 o'clock in the evening. At the closing of the polls the meeting will recess and reconvene at 7:00 o'clock in the evening on Wednesday, June 11th 1997 at the Library Auditorium for the purpose of acting on the remainder of the Articles.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will vote to fix dates when taxes shall be due and payable, and see if the Town will fix a rate of interest to be paid on taxes unpaid after said date.

Recommendation: That 10.50 per annum be charged commencing on November 26, 1997 on all first 1/2 year payments not paid on or before November 24, 1997 and that 10.50 per annum be charged commencing on April 29, 1998 on all second 1/2 year tax payments not paid on or before April 27, 1998.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will authorize a tax discount of 2% of the entire tax bill if the bill is paid in full within 30 days of commitment of taxes, and raise by taxation and appropriate \$ 15,000.00.

NOTE: This will allow a one time discount of 2% on property taxes if paid in full (1st and 2nd half) within 30 days of commitment of taxes.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will fix a time period after which interest will be charged on unpaid sewer assessments and to see if the Town will fix a rate of interest to be charged on sewer assessments not paid within said time period.


