

Article 42. Note: This new definition better reflects what the Planning Board recommends as a definition of a home occupation, given the applications they have received over the past two years and the potential for negative neighborhood impacts that some of those applications have presented, given the current definition of "home occupation".







ANNUAL REPORT FOR THE TOWN OF LIVERMORE FALLS FOR THE YEAR 2000

Article 38. To see how the Town will vote to authorize the payment of equipment approved in Article #37.

Option A. Raise and appropriate \$60,000 with the balance to be used by using the proceeds of the sale or trade in of old equipment or borrowing of the balance for the period of 1 year.

Option B. Borrow the total amount for 1 or more years using the proceeds of trade in or sale price of old equipment to lower the purchase price.

Option C. Other

Selectmen Recommend: Option B

Article 39. Shall the ordinance entitled "Town of Livermore Falls, Septage Control Ordinance", be adopted?

Note: This is an ordinance proposed by citizens in Town and would prohibit the use of sludge (biosolids) and septage from being stockpiled or spread in Town other than stabilized sludge and septage generated by the Town of Livermore Falls.

Article 40. Shall the ordinance entitled "Victualer's License Fee Ordinance", adopted March 9, 1981, be repealed?

Note: Since this ordinance is directly connected to State Law that was enacted 4 years ago, it is no longer necessary.

Article 41. Shall the ordinance entitled "Shoreland Zoning Ordinance, Town of Livermore Falls", adopted June 3, 1991 and most recently amended June 9, 1999, be amended by changing the shoreland zoning map of property shown as Lot 7 on Town of Livermore Falls Tax Map from Resource Protection to Limited Residential and Recreational?

Note: When the town updated the shoreland zoning maps back in this section of property was inadvertently left as Resource Protection and should not have to be. This is a change at the request of the landowner.

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Article 33. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$14,000 for the Cruiser Fund to be used with funds already in that fund and either trade in value or proceeds from the sale of a cruiser to purchase a new cruiser.

Article 34. To see if the Town will vote to transfer \$100,000.00 from Undesignated Revenue to reduce the 2001/2002 Tax Commitment.

Article 35. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$5,000.00 for the Legal Account for the ensuing year. (Last year \$7,500.00)

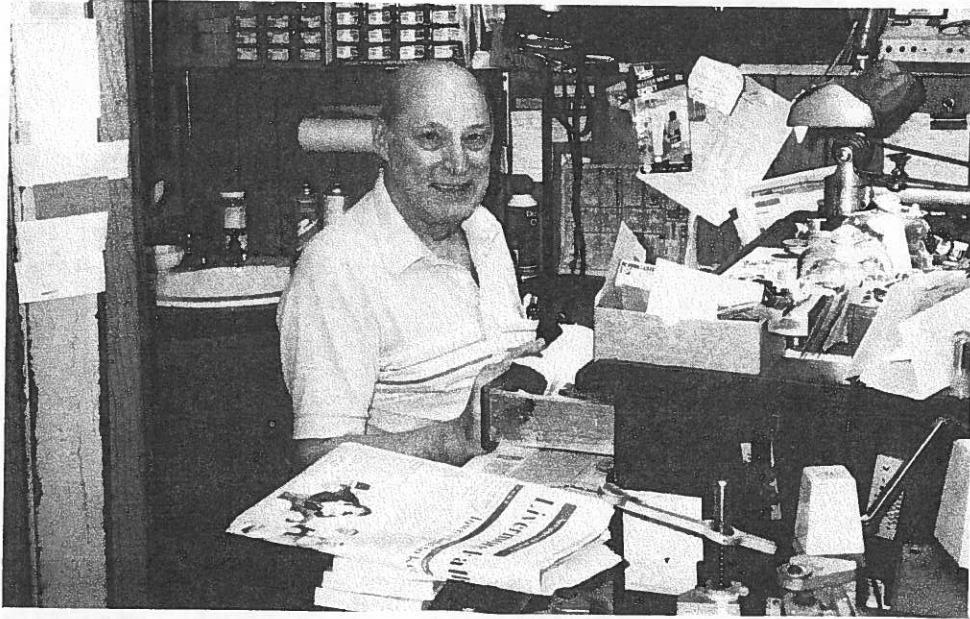


issues that have not been able to wait until the next meeting. They have to do the work that needs to be done.

There is a new Ordinance that deals with solid waste and recycling. There are changes in it, but it does tighten up control a bit. Article 45 is a statement that the Town intends to enforce state law on the roads. If they are opened for any reason, there needs to be a permit so that the roads are put back the way they were so that we can again make the dollars stretch further by making sure that the roads get the attention they need.

TAX COLLECTOR'S REPORT

Taxes are committed to the Tax Collector at the time the annual bills are mailed out, usually in September, and at the expiration of eight to twelve months any unpaid balances are placed on lien and turned over to the Treasurer for collection. Any liens which are not paid in full with interest and recording fees foreclose after eighteen months and become the property of the Town. The Treasurer and Tax Collector accept partial or installment payments in order to assist taxpayers to avoid liens and foreclosures.

If the entire bill is paid within 30 days of commitment a discount of 2% will be deducted from your bill. These discounts are funded from a proposed \$25,000.00 appropriation.

To the Residents of Livermore Falls,

As the fiscal year draws to a close, we are looking at the end of a two year project to review the assessment on each piece of property in town. John McGinley has been working on this and has become very familiar with the town. As of October 1, 2001 this position will once again become part time, with the Assessors' Agent working two days a week to keep the assessments and the records current.

The heating system in the Municipal Building has been replaced and we are comfortable with the fact that we are no longer breathing air that is contaminated. We appreciate the tax payers supporting the replacement of the system and look forward to many years of quality service from the system.

At the printing of this report, we have applied for 5 grants from various locations. We have not heard from any of them but they include grants for library renovation, recreation field work, economic development staffing, and fire department equipment. We will continue to apply for any grants that we become aware of. This is quite a boost to the town if we are successful.

This past year we were able to obtain and sell another HUD Home. These are homes that HUD has repossessed and have been unable to sell. We have been fortunate that we have been able to sell them and use the money to benefit the citizens of Livermore Falls, particularly the youth. This year the selectmen have decided to once again devote the income we received to the recreation field. We have limited choices on what we can do with the income, as at least part of it has to benefit low and moderate income people.

As you know, this past year has seen an increase in the amount of solid waste and a decrease in the amount that is recycled. We are proposing in this warrant a new recycling ordinance that will provide for more control over the disposal of recyclables. If we are serious about holding costs down we need to do something.

Public Works Report 2000

We saw our total solid waste increase by another 70 tons this year. This is 5.5% over last year and because the tipping fees are rising, this will mean almost a 10 % increase in removal costs. The recycling numbers from the transfer station showed a decrease of 33 tons. This was a 16.7% decrease in recycling. Because our numbers are getting worse every year, we are going to look at changes in how we can promote better recycling. If everyone did a better job of recycling we could save thousands of dollars on the disposal of our solid waste.

The upgrade of the wastewater treatment plant was finally completed last winter with final punch list items finished up this spring. The operation ran very smoothly once we balanced out the odor control system and learned to operate all the new equipment. We now discharge a very good effluent that easily meets all State and Federal guidelines. Our new centrifuge concentrates the waste sludge from 1.5% to around 30% solids and is transferred to Little River Compost Facility where it is turned into a class A compost to be used as a loam substitute. The highway department successfully completed a very long, tough winter. Due to the many late snowstorms, and some unexpected equipment repairs we will probably be slightly over our proposed budget for last year. However due to FEMA declaring our area a snow disaster for the two major storms of March 5-6 and March 30-31, we are going to get refunded around \$10,000, which will cover all of the projected overrun. The State is doing a drainage and road rebuilding project from the bottom of Hinkley Hill to Rt 17. Please drive carefully in this area while the construction is going on. It will be very congested in this area while new pipes are being installed.

To the Town Manager, Selectmen and Citizens;

The Livermore Falls Police Department has received and responded to 3536 calls for emergencies and/or assistance this year. In addition, 176 arrests were made, 270 criminal summons issued and 272 traffic summons issued.

The renovations at the Police Station have been completed this year to come into compliance with Department of Corrections standards and the State's Telecommunications standards. Security of the Prisoner holding area and the display screens in the Dispatch area were the major concerns of both departments. While making these renovations it provided the Emergency Dispatchers with an area that can be secured from the distractions of the Police operations. This allows them to provide uninterrupted Dispatch service to the Ambulances, Fire Departments, Town Crew, and Police. This has been a concern since the Town agreed to take over the Dispatch operations from CES in 1988 and appointed the Police Chief as their supervisor.

Officer Larry Spencer retired from the Police Department this year after serving 20 years as a reserve officer for the Town. He will continue working as a reserve dispatcher but due to injuries sustained in a motorcycle accident last summer he is unable to continue his service as a reserve officer. As of this writing Officer Roderick Small has completed 10 of his 12 weeks at the Maine Criminal Justice Academy and is 4th in the class standing of the 59 officers attending.

Addressing and 911 Update

On May 1, 2001 I had several conversations with the State 911 coordinator, the Post Office, our PSAP Center at the Androscoggin County Sheriff's Department and the Phone Company. We are now online with 911, but we can not change to our new addresses until the Post Office has reviewed and approved the changes sent to them 3/28/2000. Our list is still in the pile on their desk in Portland. They estimated it would be another month or two before they can review and get back to us with the approval. Until we receive approval to make the changes calling 911 will be much the same as it was when Jay Dispatcher received the calls. When you call 911 the call will go to the Androscoggin County Sheriff's Department, they will need to get some information to verify what Town you are from and what type of emergency you have.

As always, I would like to take this time to recognize the many in that assisted me through the past year; my Department Officers & Town Manager/Fire Commissioner, Selectmen, Town Clerk, Pol Officers, Highway Crew, Mutual Aid Departments, Citizens and Immediately Family.

In this year past, the department answered roughly the same amount participated in several parades with the 1926 maxim, had several attend state convention and hosted a well deserved and remember Year Celebration. We continued to strive to improve on member training and adopt mandated standards for the well being of the I

One of the Departments goals has been to start the process of pre major buildings in the community. This consists of conducting a building, noting entrances and emergency exits, building construction occupancy, contacts, calculating required fire flow and checking water flow in the immediate area. At the current time, we have one major building and will continue to do at least one a month.

We have currently applied for a couple of grants to update emergency response vehicles and add new equipment to the department. One the **Federal Fire Grant Act** and the other through a **Family For** the State. We have applied for a New Rescue Vehicle, Thermal Camera and a Class A Foam System for Engine One.

Also we assisted with the Police Department on the upgrade of the Communication System with hosting the dispatch in the Fire Station roughly 6 weeks. Today the repeater system has dramatically improved communications both in clarity and coverage.

Any resident that does not have a working **smoke detector**, I strongly encourage them to get in contact with me immediately as we cu

smoke detectors on hand from the Maine Residential F.I.R.E. Project. These are a **Lithium-battery Smoke Detector guarantee for 10 years.**

All outside burning still requires a permit, other than a campfire that is contained on your own property. We continue to have illegal burning in incinerators and we prosecute if caught. Currently we have very high dry conditions and hopefully it will change as the Ice Storm of 98 still poses a threat with all the material lying on the ground in the woods.



I have attended educational workshops and classes sponsored b: State Library as well as other library meetings during the past year.


We offered an afternoon Story and Craft Time on Thursday aft: which was sponsored by the Adult Learning Center.

The Trustees of the Livermore Falls Water District hereby sub Report for the year ending December 31, 2000.

Sand cleaning operations were started in June. A new sand storage facility was erected in August.

A comprehensive system plan was reviewed in November. The plan identified all assets and short falls within the system. The recommended improvements are extensive and will need to be accomplished over 20 years.

The last of the new meters were installed in December. This is the completion of a four-year program with 1288 meters installed.

The National Drinking Water Week was celebrated with plans for students from Livermore Falls Middle School.

One (1) new service was installed.

Twelve (12) water services were repaired and ten (10) service lines were replaced.

Ten (10) water mains were repaired and approximately 900 feet of water main was installed.

Baldwin Hill reservoir was cleaned and inspected by a diving contractor, Liquid Engineering Corp.

Other work done by District personnel is considered routine.

REPORT

I have continued to be active this past year, working with the Planning Board and the Comprehensive Plan Committee, as well as providing advice on numerous issues and continuing with my fall and spring cleanup of those properties in town that seem to collect things.

Permit activity is minimal, as the town now only issues permits for mobile homes and for buildings on those lots that were created after June 11, 1997. The town continues to notify the owners of those new lots so that the owners do not violate the town's ordinance.

Approvals for businesses issued by the Planning Board this past year include: several antique businesses, a parking lot, a hot dog stand, a laundromat (not developed), a gym, two auto repair businesses, a storage building, a body piercing business and booking agency (closed), a carpet installation business, a local neighborhood store, a candle and gift store, a hypnotherapy business, a bottle redemption business, an insurance office, an expansion at Livermore Falls Water District, a salt and sand shed, a garage addition, and a boiler room addition for the town, a gunsmith business, a day care, an upholstery business, Family Dollar, a law office, a wood processing business, a gravel pit, a retreat center, an auto body and sandblasting business, a karate studio, a grain business and an addition to another grain business and a bait and tackle shop. The Board hopes you will support these local businesses.

Some of these businesses were approved as a home occupation. The Planning Board had concerns with approving some of these businesses as a home occupation because of the potential impacts the home occupation may have on its neighbors, but the Board was required to do so because of the definition that is in the Site Plan Review Ordinance, which governs these types of reviews. Because of these potential conflicts, and working with legal advice from Maine Municipal Association, the Board is proposing a revised definition of 'Home Occupation' at town meeting this year. The Board looks for your support in approving the new definition that provides them with a stronger tool to help protect the impact on existing neighbors.

The Board is also proposing an amendment to the Site Plan Review Ordinance in order to make the review process clearer and more user-friendly. The issue of making the review process clearer and more user-friendly was brought to the Board's attention in discussions with present and former town office staff. The Board expects that the proposed amendment will address that concern and looks for your support with this amendment.

To the residents of Livermore Falls,

The Livermore Falls Summer Recreation program offers structured, very well fun for six weeks in the summer for all local children.

Last summer I had 227 children enrolled in the program (149 from Livermore from Livermore, Fayette or other towns). I never expected to have that many children and I was quite overwhelmed on the first day, but it was great to see that many children and we all adjusted very well.


I had 20 counselors working with these children - with all of the counselors in the Livermore Falls, Livermore or Fayette area. I think this is important because the many qualified counselors right in our towns. There were all great role models for them and they did a fabulous job.

Every day at rec started at 9:00 a.m. in the Livermore Falls High School cafe they were served a nutritious breakfast - which is offered free to all children through Lunch is also provided to all free of charge. The cafeteria workers did a great job.

The Town-wide equalization of property values is in the process of being completed. The next round of tax billing in September will reflect the adjusted values.
