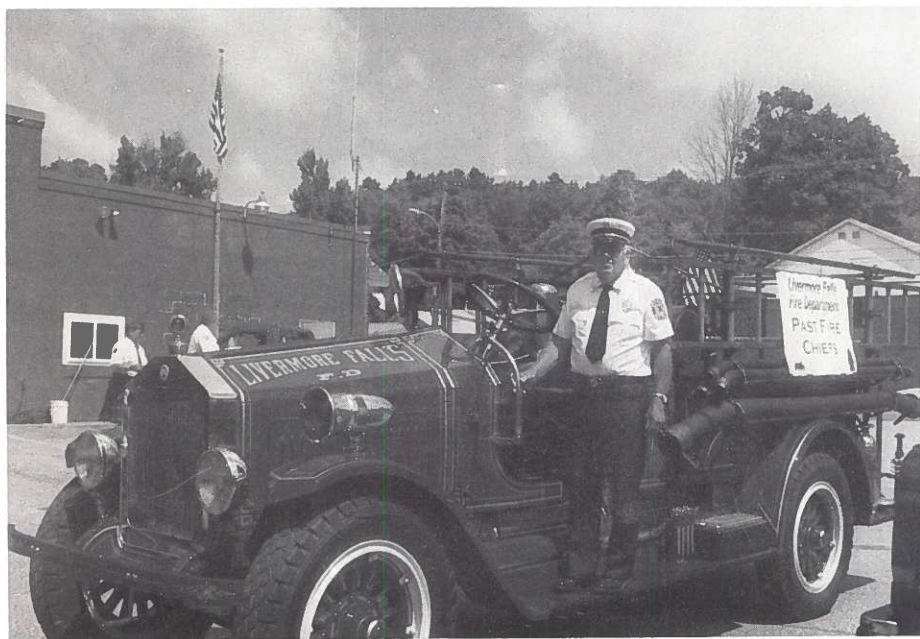

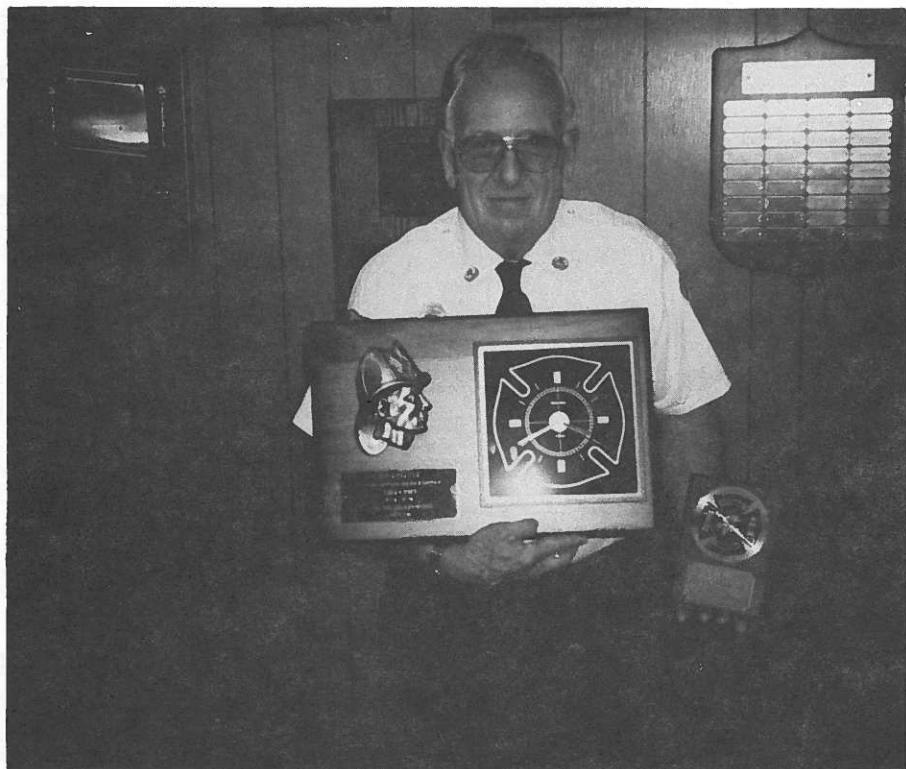

TOWN MANAGER'S REPORT MAY, 2002

Thank you to all the folks who have welcomed me, and lent a hand these past few months. And thank you to the Selectmen and Department heads for their patience.

Several items stand out as deserving attention in the coming year: the overall municipal infrastructure- streets, sidewalks, and storm drains. The sewer collection system is very old and must be addressed soon, we will attempt to start a reserve account and may have to build some lines with loan funds. This is a user- funded department, not tax base.


The highway dept vehicle fleet needs two updates which we'll discuss at the Annual meeting. Two other vehicle projects have been delayed by re-habing the existing backhoe and the 12 year old plow truck will be done next year. Equipment for calcium anti-icing of roads will also be at the Meeting.

We will plan upkeep of the Town buildings, and pursue a reasonable solution to the space problem in the Police Station. Further needs are detailed in the proposed Comprehensive Plan, available in the Town Office lobby. Vote on adoption of the Plan is June 12th.

Recycling is again in the forefront, because numerous household, businesses, etc are not separating out items that are to be recycled. If a ton of recycling costs \$30 to remove, and a ton of trash is \$75, you can easily see the expense of throwing out what could be re-used. Please get on the bandwagon and preclude the expenditure of funds on enforcing something that should be self-motivated.

Please call whenever we can be of assistance; we will continue to inspire the Town Employees to take pride in the quality of the work we do.

TAX COLLECTORS REPORT

Under the July 1 through June 30 fiscal accounting period, annual reports must be prepared and printed prior to the end of the fiscal period and before the post annual audit can be started. April 1 through March 31 has been selected as the most reasonable reporting period that can be offered to the voters for comparative information purposes.

Taxes are committed to the Tax Collector at the time the annual bills are mailed out, usually in September, and at the expiration of eight to twelve months any unpaid balances are placed on lien and turned over to the Treasurer for collection. Any liens which are not paid in full with interest and recording fees foreclose after eighteen months and become the property of the Town. The Treasurer and the Tax Collector accept partial or installment payments in order to assist taxpayers to avoid liens and foreclosures.



As a new employee of the Town of Livermore Falls I would like to introduce myself to those of you who do not know me. My name is Denis Castonguay

I was hired to take Sonny Jones job as public works director and have to fill some big shoes.

My family background is in road maintenance in the town of Jay. I am a native of Livermore Falls and it is good to be home.

The winter was kind to us.

Some major breakdowns did occur but thanks to an experienced crew the downtime was minimal.

We had twenty-five storms, nine above the average of sixteen.

Snow accumulation was little with no major storms.

We are still learning from each other and we are looking forward to meeting more taxpayers as time goes on.

Summer projects have begun and new water lines being installed have caused many problems with our roads. The new water lines are a necessity, so we can all be patient and the improved water service will be welcomed.

A lot of ditching projects are planned and the paving of new sidewalks on High street and paving of Bailey, Jordan, Marion streets are planned.

Some construction of Strickland Loop will be done in hopes of future paving in this area.

Recycling Station

Recycling is one of the most expensive agendas on the budget.

With fewer and fewer options we are forced to dispose of recyclables at a greater expense than ever before.

However the most expensive part of the budget is trash. At 74.23 per ton the annual cost last year was almost 100,000.00, we have to find a less expensive way.

We only recycled 31.1% this past year down from 37.1% two years ago.

With the help from all tax payers and the education programs provided, our goal for the coming years will be 50% recycled.

This will cut our recycling budget by 20%.

We need the help of all.

To the Town Manager, Selectmen and Citizens;

The Livermore Falls Police Department received and responded to 4859 calls for emergencies and/or assistance this year, an increase of 1323 calls. In addition, 207 arrests were made, an increase of 31 arrests. 470 criminal summons issued an increase of 200 and 343 traffic summons issued an increase of 71 over last years totals. In consideration of the time and paperwork it takes to work criminal cases and still maintain an effective visible patrol. It becomes obvious why the officers are busy and the department is constantly reallocating its resources.

On behalf of the Livermore Falls Police Department, I would like to congratulate Officer Kenneth Bryant for his accomplishment in graduating first in his class from the 1st Maine Criminal Justice Academy Combined Police School. He graduated November of 2001 from the 18-week school of 48 Officers from State, Local and County Departments.

I would like to welcome Dispatcher Sherry Given who was hired 11/20/01 to replace Dispatcher Jane Gallant who took a job with Life Star Ambulance, and Dispatcher Amanda Shaffer was hired 10/22/01 as a reserve dispatcher. I would also like to welcome Officer Maurice Drouin Jr. who was hired 3/18/02 to replace Officer Terry Wheeler. He has chosen to pursue a different full-time Career but will stay on as a Reserve Officer.


Addressing and 911 Update

The addressing has been complete and in effect for nearly a year now. This is only as effective as the participation from the citizens of Livermore Falls. We still have residences in Livermore Falls that do not have the new address visibly posted. Regardless of whether or not you receive mail at you residence we need to have the residence address posted so emergency response personnel can easily see it. UPS and other postal service providers will be using these physical addresses to locate your residence as well. Also please remember, when you call 911 the call will go to the Androscoggin County Sheriff's Department. They will need to verify that your physical address matches what is showing on their screen. This includes the Town you are calling from, the emergency 911-road name and physical residence number you are calling from. They will then ask what type of emergency you have. Once they

verify you are from Livermore Falls and their information is correct, they will transfer the call to the Livermore Falls Emergency Dispatch Center so you can speak to the Dispatcher that has direct communication with the emergency services you need. All phone numbers are linked to a physical address so if you can not speak on the phone or get cut off, emergency personnel will be told where the call came from and will be sent to help you. THIS IS WHY IT IS IMPORTANT TO POST YOUR RESIDENCE NUMBER IN A LOCATION VISIBLE FROM THE ROAD.

On behalf of both the Dispatch staff and the Police staff, we have chosen to dedicate our services to the citizens of Livermore Falls. We strive to do our best for the Town of Livermore Falls and offer our Thanks to all the Citizens that have supported the Officers and Dispatchers in the past. I would also like to thank the Selectmen, Town Manager and area Departments for their assistance, cooperation and understanding.

To The Citizens of Livermore Falls,

As always, I would like to take this time to recognize the many individuals that assisted me through the past year; my Department Officers & Members, Town Manager/Fire Commissioner, Selectmen, Town Clerk, Police Chief & Officers, Highway Crew, Mutual Aid Departments, Citizens and finally my Immediately Family.

There were several improvements made to the station due to the damage from the roof leaking the previous winter. The repairs included a new roof on the front half, ceiling tiles in the meeting room, and a new tile floor. The interior damage was covered by insurance, due to water damage that occurred.

The department received two grants from the State Forestry this past year totaling \$1,800.00. These monies are to be used to install two dry hydrants and \$300.00 towards the purchase of a portable pump.

Once again, we have applied for the FEMA Grant this year in which they are distributing 360 million dollars. The officers decided to again apply in the apparatus category for a heavy rescue to replace the current squad in which the department has outgrown.

Back in September, four members spent 16 hours of training at the Bangor Training Facility learning and receiving the department's new thermal imaging camera. The training was part of the agreement through the Cole Foundation in which \$5,000.00 was received towards the purchase of the camera (Carins Viper). The rest of the money was raised through donations, department functions and money carried over through the previous years budget. This vital piece of equipment became reality without asking for any additional monies through the budget request.

Currently we are raising money for the purchase of a wireless video monitor to operate with the thermal-imaging camera. This vital piece of equipment will be an additional assist to the incident commander as he/she will be able to view the current conditions within a structure.

This past April, we recognized Richard Wells for 50 years of service to the Livermore Falls Fire Department. During this period, Richard has held every position in the department; firefighter to chief, and is currently holding the department safety officer position. Please join in with the department members and myself, in thanking Richard, answered many calls, attended all but three monthly meetings and donated many, many hours for this community over the years.

We finally received the states **enhance 911 emergency telephone number**. For all emergencies, you now are to dial **911**. This call will be received at Androscoggin Sheriff's office and transferred back to our local dispatch center. During this time of transition, many of us will require to change our fiscal address. I thank you all for your patience during such time.

Any resident that does not have a working **smoke detector**, I strongly encourage them to get in contact with me immediately as we currently have smoke detectors on hand from the Maine Residential F.I.R.E. Project. These are a **Lithium-battery Smoke Detector guarantee for 10 years**.

All outside burning still requires a permit, other then a campfire that is contained on your own property. We continue to have illegal burning in incinerators and we prosecute if caught. Currently we have very high dry conditions and hopefully it will change as the Ice Storm of 98 still poses a threat with all the material lying on the ground in the woods.

We had a very busy year as we welcomed 148 new members to the library in 2001. We added 1,509 books and other materials to our collection, many of them donated by generous patrons. We now receive 46 magazines and two newspapers. Mrs. Elaine Smith joined our library team in January.

Last spring we applied for a grant for new computers for the library, through the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation. Our dream came true in the fall when we received four new Gateway computers which are connected to

the Internet, a content server, software, laser printer, as well as technical support and training. The computers will allow the public to access the Internet at the library. It will also help students and adults to do their homework and other general research. We have several additional educational programs on the computers for the younger children to use. The Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation are working with the libraries in Maine as part of the Maine State Partnership Library Grant Program. They are dedicated to bridging the digital divide by providing computers, software, technical support, training, and Internet connectivity to eligible public libraries to enable them to expand access to information technology.

We have now entered most of our collection of books and other materials on the computer. We are able to check materials in and out on the computer at the desk, and also have our card catalog computerized for use in the library.

We had a very successful Summer Reading Program with the theme of "Beat The Heat, Read!" Sixty-four children and ten parents completed the program with a combined total of 1,676 hours of reading. We had several special family events during the summer, which included the Chewonki Foundation's presentation of the nature program "Scales and Tales", which featured many live reptiles. We also had "Wayne From Maine", a one-man show. He played the guitar and sang many songs with help from the children in the audience. These programs were made possible by a grant from the MSAD #36/Jay Adult Ed Program. Theresa Timberlake, Carrie Castonguay, Francena Goodine, Elaine Smith and Amie Smith offered Story and Craft Times for the children, which they enjoyed very much.

We had a victory party at the completion of the program, which was highlighted by the appearance of "The Amazing Ed Morris, The Balloon Zoo". He performed the Comedy Magic Sideshow/Balloon Zoo Supershow, a fast-moving, funny, laugh-packed, fun-filled, audience participation (interactive) combination comedy magic show and balloon-sculpturing act. Following the program, everyone enjoyed refreshments provided by the library and several generous parents.

Everyone who successfully completed the program received a packet containing the following: a notebook, pen, pencil, a certificate of completion, a "Beat The Heat, Read!" bookmark, a "Beat The Heat, Read!" book bag, and a certificate for a complimentary pan pizza from Pizza Hut. We want to extend our much appreciated thanks to all the people who helped to make the program so enjoyable for the children.

We offer a growing collection of Large Print books, some of which are loaned to us by the Maine State Library on a rotating schedule with other Maine libraries. We have had several books donated by generous patrons in memory of their loved ones. We also offer collections of videos and audio books on cassette, which are very popular.

I have attended educational workshops and classes sponsored by the Maine State Library, as well as other library meetings during the past year.

We offered an afternoon Story and Craft Time on Thursdays, which was sponsored by the Adult Learning Center.


We had some renovations during the winter months. We have new paint, carpets and windows that give the library a fresh look.

To the Citizens of Livermore Falls:

The Trustees of the Livermore Falls Water District hereby submit their Report for The year ending December 31, 2001.

New construction started for the comprehensive system plan in June with the locating of utilities for all routes for the new transmission mains. Contract projects were reviewed with SME (Sevee and Maher Engineers, Inc.) and shop staff. In November a connection of 340 ft – 12" main was made on the Foundry Road and in December a hydrant was replaced on the Souther Road. Construction was then on hold until spring.

Throughout the year the following services, repairs and installations were made:

Two (2) new services were installed.


Twenty-six (26) water services were repaired and seven (7) services were replaced.

Fifteen (15) water mains were repaired and approximately 2000 feet of new water main was installed. This was contracted with A. L. Vining with a "Change Order" to replace both existing 6" CI with 8" AC with one 12" DI main.

Installation of 340 feet of 12" DI on the Foundry Road was done to eliminate two dead ends and improve fire flows in the down town area.

Other work done by District personnel is considered routine.

FOR THE YEAR 2001

My activity level remained the same this past year, as compared to last year, working with the Planning Board and the Comprehensive Plan Committee, as well as providing advice on numerous issues and addressing those properties in town that seem to collect things. Brenda Medcoff, the town's new Code Enforcement Officer, came on board in March to replace me after I accepted another position in the Town of Wayne.

Permit activity is minimal, as the town still only issues permits for mobile homes and for buildings on those lots that were created after June 11, 1997. The town continues to notify the owners of those new lots so that the owners do not violate the town's ordinance. Keeping up with those people who add value to their properties is more difficult since there is no permit process to track added valuation in town.

Approvals for businesses issued by the Planning Board this past year include: an addition to the hot dog stand, three auto sales and repair businesses, an internet business, an expansion to a candle and gift store, a wholesale floor business, a psychologist's office, the relocation of a scuba supply business, the Cigaret Shopper, an electrician's office, a pump-house for the Livermore Falls Water District, a bus maintenance replacement building for MSAD #36, an expansion to the existing gym, an evidence storage building for the Police Department, the "Golf of Maine", a karate studio, a taxi business, and a home office for Seniors Plus. Supporting these local businesses is good for us all and is an important element of the Comprehensive Plan.

Several of these businesses were approved as a home occupation. The Planning Board proposed a revised definition of 'Home Occupation' at town meeting last year, which was not approved. Working with the legal advice from Maine Municipal Association the Board is now following the recommended interpretation of "Home Occupation" in order to protect the impact on existing neighbors. The Board's proposed amendment to the Site Plan Review Ordinance in order to make the review process clearer and more user-friendly passed at town meeting last year.

The Board also worked with concerned citizens in the Strickland Ferry Road neighborhood in presenting a "Sludge Ordinance" to the voters, which passed at town meeting. We also heard from Donna Poulin about the condition of housing in her neighborhood that detracts value from some of the nicer homes. The issue will be addressed in the proposed Comprehensive Plan. A new Site Plan Review application was also worked on.

The Comprehensive Plan Committee, after a 2-year process, is presenting the town with a Comprehensive Plan to provide guidance to the town as it plans for the future. It relies upon information collected by the committee, input generated by the community at the three free public suppers that were held, and upon the advice of the Town manager and Selectmen. It provides for addressing such issues as farm animals on in-town properties, and the devaluation that occurs to single-family homes when rental property is not kept up, along with many other issues.

One of the methods used to accomplish the goal of addressing these issues is to plan for different districts in town in order to accomplish the results that some of you seek. The committee recognized that it is difficult to address some of the issues that were raised at the public meetings because any recommendation made to the voters at town meeting affect the town as a whole. So, while farm animals in the back yard of someone on Birch Street or dilapidated housing on Searles Street might concern some, it may not be much of an issue in the more rural areas of town. For this reason a proposed Land Use District Map is included in the Comprehensive Plan. It provides a guide to the town as to where to start separating out the issues that confront the town and allowing for recommendations to address those issues in different ways in different areas. The Committee looks forward to your support of this forward-looking Plan.

It has been a pleasure being of service to you these past years.



I started working on a contractual basis for the town in March of 2002. I am being assisted by my associate Kevin Geaghan. We both look forward to working in the town of Livemore Falls and assisting the town in matters relating to its tax assessments. It is a challenge to start in a new town and become familiar with its tax base. We enjoy the challenge and I think have gotten off to a good start.

Unfortunately, there was a substantial clerical error in the valuation of the property of Central Maine Power Company last year. The value was carried in both real estate value and personal property value. State law provides that the wires, poles, substations, etc. of an electric utility be considered as real estate. Therefore, the erroneous personal property value needed to be abated in the amount of \$3,151,800. The amount of the abated tax was \$72,964.17.

Although we will be valuing new construction to add to the tax rolls for 2002, it is quite possible that the valuation this year will be somewhat lower than last year.


Every day rec started at 9:00 a.m. in the Livermore Falls High School cafeteria where they were served a nutritious breakfast - which is offered free to all children through a grant. Lunch is also provided to all free of charge. The cafeteria workers did a great job.

We had games, sports, arts & crafts and swim lessons at Brettuns Pond offered each day. The rec group also went bowling at the Jay Bowling Alley twice and went roller skating at the Livermore Falls Skating Center three times. Both of these owners opened up especially to accommodate our rec program. We also went on field trips to Popham Beach, a Seadogs baseball game, the Portland Children's Museum, the Movie theater in Farmington, Dummer's Beach, and Funtown. We also had a bike safety rodeo put on by Sandy Richard and the Franklin County Healthy Community Coalition. About 30 kids qualified to receive a new free bike helmet and others could purchase a helmet for only \$10. Every child was fitted properly with a helmet and shown the proper way to wear the helmet.

I have resigned as Summer Rec director for the 2002 summer, but I am very willing to help in any way to ensure the summer rec program has continued success. I want to thank all the kids, parents, and counselors for the many years of fun I had working at Livermore Falls Summer Rec. Brenda Bryant, Assistant Director, will be taking over and I am very confident she will do a great job.

Kids that are kept busy are less likely to find trouble, and in summer recreation they are kept very busy. They are having fun with their friends and classmates for most of the summer. The recreation program gets kids of all ages involved.

Wastewater Treatment Department

The new treatment plant ran very smoothly this year. This was the first year that I can remember that we had no call-in alarms at all. Our effluent was well below all licensed parameters set by the DEP. Because of the low ground water levels we also experienced the lowest flows we have seen in the last twenty years. The only down side to the year was the increase in collection system plugs. We think, due to the dryness, that the tree roots were searching for moisture and found a great source in our sewer lines. The low flow rates also causes less natural flushing. Because of these two factors, we have had over twenty sewer calls just since Jan. 2002.

One important thing to note for all sewer users is the change in policy on responsibility for service line maintenance. The Town is now responsible for the house service lines that are in the road right of way. The homeowner is only responsible for the lines that are actually on their property. If you have a sewer problem you need to call the sewer department first, so we can determine where the plug is and who is going to have to fix it. Some telephone numbers to keep handy:

2002 ANNUAL TOWN MEETING WARRANT

To: Ernest N. Steward, Jr., a constable of the Town of Livermore Falls, in the County of Androscoggin, in the State of Maine:

Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the voters of the Town of Livermore Falls in the County of Androscoggin, in the State of Maine, qualified by law to vote in Town affairs, to meet at the Fire Station in said Town of Livermore Falls on Tuesday, the 11th of June AD 2002 at 9:00 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles to wit:

Article 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Article 2. To choose by secret ballot in accordance with Title 30 M.R.S.A. Section 2061 all necessary Town Officials including one Selectman/Assessor for a three year term; one Selectmen/Assessor for a two year term; one Town Clerk/Treasurer for a two year term; two MSAD #36 School Board Directors for three year terms; two MSAD #36 School Board Directors for two year terms; one MSAD #36 School Board Director for a one year term.

- ▶ Note: The polls for election of officers will open at 9:00 o'clock in the forenoon and close at 8:00 o'clock in the evening. At the closing of the polls the meeting will recess and reconvene at 7:00 o'clock in the evening on Wednesday, June 12th, 2002 at the Library Auditorium for the purpose of acting on the remainder of the Articles.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to fix dates when taxes shall be due and payable and see if the Town will fix a rate of 8.75% interest to be paid on taxes unpaid after said date.

- ▶ **Recommendation:** That 8.75% per annum be charged commencing on November 20, 2002 on all first ½ year payments not paid on or before November 21, 2002 and that 8.75% per annum be charged commencing on April 23, 2003 on all second ½ year payments not paid on or before April 24, 2003.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to fix an interest rate of 5% on all taxes abated that have been paid in full, amount to be paid from the date the taxes were paid.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to borrow if necessary, in anticipation of taxes, and raise by taxation and appropriate \$10,000.00 for interest expense.

Selectmen Recommend: Yes

STATEMENT: The 2% discount program cost well over the \$25,000.00 raised last year to fund it.

Article 6. To see if the Town will fix a time period after which interest will be charged on unpaid sewer assessments and to see if the Town will fix a rate of interest to be charged on sewer assessments not paid within said time period.

- ▶ **Recommendation:** That 8.75% per annum prorated daily be charged on sewer assessments not paid within 60 days of the quarterly billing date.

Article 7. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen on behalf of the Town to retain, sell, or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town for non-payment of taxes thereon, such terms as they may deem advisable and in the Town's best interest, and to execute quit claim deeds for such property.

Article 8. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen acting in their capacity as Sewer Trustees, to on the Town's behalf, retain, sell or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town for non-payment of sewer assessments thereon, on such terms as they may deem advisable and in the Town's best interest, and to execute quit claim deeds for such property.

Article 9. To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to accept or reject any or all gifts as they deem advisable, and to expend any monetary gifts on the designated purpose of that gift.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to carry the balances forward in the

following accounts: Recreation, Paving, Cruiser Fund, Capital Improvements, CDBG Account, Comprehensive Plan.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to transfer Fire restitution revenue from the Undesignated Fund Balance to the Fire Reserve Account, in the amount of \$648.

STATEMENT: The amount came in 1999 from a convicted arsonist case.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$223,211.00 for the Contractual Account.



Article 47.
