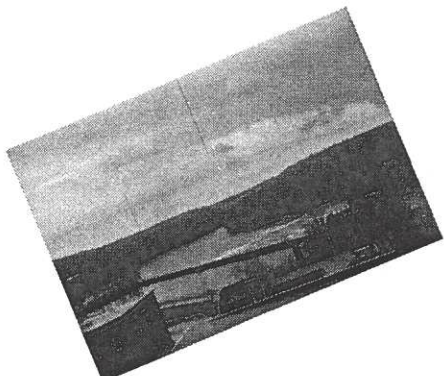

ANNUAL REPORT TO THE TOWN OF LIVERMORE FALLS

Message from Senator Kenneth D. Blais

Dear Friends:

I want to thank you for allowing me to represent your interests in Augusta. I am very proud to have been elected to serve the people of District 20 in the 121st Maine Legislature. There are many new faces at the State House this year, including mine. I look forward to working both with my legislative colleagues, and with our new governor, John E. Baldacci, to promote policies that will strengthen our state's economy.

The first regular session of the 121st Legislature is now underway. There were more than 1,700 bills submitted for consideration, which means it is sure to be an extremely busy six months. As has been widely reported in the news media, the biggest challenge facing the governor and the legislature this session is a looming budget deficit that, at about \$1 billion, represents nearly 20% of our overall budget for the next two years. I will support Governor Baldacci's efforts to deal with our budget shortfall by curbing spending rather than increasing the burden on Maine taxpayers.

One of my first acts in Augusta was to join the Rural Caucus. The Rural Caucus is a bi-partisan group of legislators dedicated to keeping track of issues and legislation that affect the use and management of our natural resources, especially issues that will impact farmers. I also received my assignment from the Senate President to the Joint Standing Committee on Labor. The labor committee is responsible for wage and hour laws; employment security; job service; unemployment compensation; workers' compensation; labor relations; collective bargaining; workers' health and safety; job training; retirement eligibility and benefits for state and municipal employees, including teachers; and judicial and legislative retirement systems. We will be dealing with about 80 bills in the labor committee this session.

As I told many of you while visiting door-to-door last summer, I am strongly committed to policies that will encourage our young people to stay here in Maine to start and raise their families. And I know the only way to do that is to ensure they can afford to live here. We must stimulate our economy to create new jobs that pay well, and to create an economic environment that encourages new business opportunities. A strong, growing economy is the best way to ensure we have the tax revenues to support the many generous programs and services available to Maine citizens.

Other issues that are at the top of the agenda this legislative session include education costs, health care costs and access, worker's compensation costs, and tax equity. We may see three or more competing tax-reform referenda on the ballot next November, and I would encourage you all to study any proposals very carefully, since passage can have far-reaching impact on the way we manage our state government.

In closing, I want to thank those of you who already have written to share your views and to encourage me as a new legislator. It is a privilege to represent you in the Maine State Senate. I already have started my visits with local municipal and school officials. I urge you to contact me with your thoughts and opinions on legislation, or if you need help with a government agency or program. Since last July many things have occurred; several positive; and some unfortunate. We work steadily to foster improvements for the Town; to bring a progressive outlook, and to provide municipal services in an efficient manner.

The Town's largest capital asset is our road system. You will hear about the five and ten year plan as time goes on. Next year we hope you'll have an article to address repair of some of the worst roads. Also, we need to plan several sidewalk improvements. Speaking of assets, the federal government requires we account for all municipal assets by June 30, 2004. Including roads, storm drains, rec facilities, parks, benches, sanitary sewers, everything. The location, condition and estimate of funds for any needed repairs or replacements. This is known by the name "GASB 34", and it will require great effort and time.

The tax rate has received much attention this spring. The annual town meeting will address articles on services and funding levels; as the Board of Selectmen attempt to hold the rate at 24 mils, or less. The meeting is Wed June 11 at the High School cafeteria. The articles are in the end of this book, in the Annual Warrant. SAD 36 managed a difficult achievement in their new budget, a reduction in the local assessment. This has helped us strive toward holding the 24 mil limit. SAD 36's administration is on the up-swing; we have openings on the school board, you may want to get involved.

Efforts are in the works for community improvements. A grant is helping fund the new Skatepark; a tri-town effort, many thanks go to the Skatepark Committee. The park is located in the Livermore Falls Rec complex, off the IP Powerhouse driveway. Minnie Luciano's gift for youth recreation, given to LF and Jay also helped fund this new facility for skate-boarders and in-line skaters.

The State has ear-marked us for funding Bike/Walk paths in the Foundry Rd area; contingent on passage of the MDOT Bond this coming Nov. Another nice addition to our Rec complex; many people walk for exercise in this area. Adjacent to Foundry Rd we will study the Downtown neighborhood. A grant is addressed in Art # 35 at the June 11 Town Meeting, to plan improvements for the businesses and residents of the Downtown.

One less than fortunate occurrence was the closing of Parkview Nursing and Rehab Center, in October, 2002. The residents, families and employees were all hit hard by this loss in elderly care in our community. We continue to seek new uses for this facility. Likewise we make constant efforts to attract new business to our Town.

A positive note is the winter roads program, with salt/priority giving us safe conditions, and savings. Many citizens have stopped by or phoned in to voice their support for this

environmentally sound means of anti-icing.

To complete this report we need to mention solid waste - trash; and recycling. Recycling is one way we can all lower the taxes. Let's give thought and attention to separating recyclables.

We will continue to inspire the town employees to take pride in the quality of work we do. Thank you to the Selectmen, employees and citizens.

TAX COLLECTORS REPORT

Under the July 1 through June 30 fiscal accounting period, annual reports must be prepared and printed prior to the end of the fiscal period and before the post annual audit can be started. April 1 through March 31 has been selected as the most reasonable reporting period that can be offered to the voters for comparative information purposes.

Taxes are committed to the Tax Collector at the time the annual bills are mailed out, usually in September, and at the expiration of eight to twelve months any unpaid balances are placed on lien and turned over to the Treasurer for collection. Any liens which are not paid in full with interest and recording fees foreclose after eighteen months and become the property of the Town. The Treasurer and the Tax Collector accept partial or installment payments in order to assist taxpayers to avoid liens and foreclosures.





2002 2003 Highway annual report

As I start my second summer at the highway department ,we all are happy to see this past winter over.

We treated 39 storms that started November fourth and ended in mid April. No major breakdowns occurred, and the crew did an excellent job with winter road treatment. As you know we started a salt priority program ,and even in the first year we feel money was saved over using sand. Hopefully the tax payers will let us continue this treatment and more money can be saved as we learn more, and become more efficient with this process.

The Pennsylvania ,and New York D O T 's have been using salt priority since 1973 and have made it a great success.

Because of using salt our spring cleanup time has been cut in half ,and our catch basins will not have to be cleaned this spring. We will monitor the basins as summer progresses and maybe they will not have to be cleaned at all.

Some road repair is still needed from last years water line project, and we are working with the water company and C H Stevenson to rectify any left over problems. Thank you all for your patience over the trenches and bumps created by the water line digs.

Summer projects have started ,and when we have a new budget we can start more.

Many roads are in need of repair and a road repair plan must be enacted as soon as our municipal budget problems can be addressed.

As I reported last year it is good to be Home.

2002 2003 Recycling Report

As we are all aware , recycling and trash is becoming a burden to all taxpayers in all municipalities. The cost of trash disposal is up from seventy four dollars a ton to seventy nine dollars per ton .

It is just another example of inflation and burden we all must face.

Recycling is the answer ,and for every ton of recycled product we save forty nine dollars on every ton not put into our trash.

It currently costs thirty dollars per ton to dispose of recycling ,but costs seventy nine dollars to get rid of trash. [One ton of cardboard put in with trash will cost all taxpayers Forty nine dollars.]

One roll off of trash from our recycling facility costs us about three hundred and fifty dollars to dispose of. We have about four per week, at a hauling fee of ninety dollars per haul . This is an average cost of fourteen hundred dollars for garbage and three hundred and sixty dollars hauling fee per week.

Other ways to dispose of recycling and garbage are being researched. Some may be a savings and some may not. We have to try different things to see if they are right for Livermore Falls . Please be patient with some changes at the transfer station . We are trying to save tax dollars .

Recycling at home is were it all starts , and please remember the cost of just a few cans recycled instead of put in the trash can mean lower operating costs for your transfer station.

To the Town Manager, Selectmen and Citizens;

The Livermore Falls Police Department received and responded to 4007 calls for emergencies and/or assistance this year, a decrease of 852 calls. Of that figure nearly 200 less barking dog complaints, 72 less trespass violations and 170 less motor vehicle complaints were reported. The department attributes this to the updated dog ordinance and curfew ordinance that the residence enacted last year at town meeting. In addition, 271 arrests were made, an increase of 64 arrests. 500 criminal summons issued an increase of 30 and 361 traffic summons issued an increase of 18 over last years totals.

This coming year will be a challenge to the officers as we have agreed to eliminate the Sergeants position in July to help save tax dollars for the town. We have yet to feel the impact in loosing this position as reserve officer Terry Wheeler is filling in until the end of June. Sergeant Michael Pike left the department in March to work at Jay PD. With the increase in criminal cases that take time to investigate and prepare for trial, officers are going to have to prioritize their criminal investigations and still try to maintain a visible patrol to deter other criminal activity.

The Police Department graduated its first citizens Police Academy April 22, 2003 there were 12 citizens in the class that lasted 11 weeks. Instructors gave them information on numerous law enforcement topics. The Instructors were from the Livermore Falls Police Department and other agencies that we work closely with. Officer Small was the class coordinator and the class was inspired at the request of his neighborhood watch group also a first of its kind in Livermore Falls.

Reserve Officer Stephen Gould was named Officer of the Year for 2002. He has been a Reserve Officer for 15 years and has always responded to the needs of the Citizens of Livermore Falls and the Department. His dedication and service is a great asset to the department and has earned him the respect and admiration of the entire staff.

Officer Roderick Small, Eric Goodrow, Stephen Gould, Terry Wheeler and Dispatcher Stanley Wheeler were all commended along with members of the Livermore Falls Fire Department for their response to a violent crime scene in East Livermore in early March. The combined efforts of the officers and well-trained Fire Department resulted in a quick arrest and saved a life. Dispatcher Amanda Shaffer was also commended for her dispatching efforts during a robbery that occurred several weeks later. She was able to relay direction being phoned in by a citizen with a cell phone as he followed the suspect, until police were able to locate and arrest him.

On behalf of both the Dispatch staff and the Police staff, we have chosen to dedicate our services to the citizens of Livermore Falls. We strive to do our best for the Town of Livermore Falls and offer our Thanks to all the Citizens, Selectpersons, and Department Heads that have supported the Officers and Dispatchers over the years, for their assistance, cooperation and understanding. The Department's ability to do its job is directly related to the support you have provided us.

To The Citizens of Livermore Falls,

First I would like to recognize the many individuals that assisted me through the past year; Fire Department Officers & Members, Town Manager/Fire Commissioner, Selectman, Town Clerk, Police Chief & Officers, Dispatchers, Highway Crew, Mutual Aid Departments, Citizens. Finally, last but not least, my lovely wife and children for allowing me the time it takes through out the year.

The Department again applied and received monies this past year through the Forestry Title IV Grant in which we received \$1000.00 for the purchase of 1.3/4 inch hose. Early last fall, the installation of a Dry Hydrant on route 133 at the former Masterman Pond was completed with last years grant.

We also have applied for the FEMA Grant once again. After several meetings with Department Officers and the Town Manger it was decide to continue to request a heavy rescue in the vehicle category. Currently we have out grown our squad truck and feel the need for a larger vehicle equipped with improved storage requirements to meet the departments current needs.

With a couple of donations, which include materials and man-hours, Lieut. Jim Leclerc was able to reach one of our long time goals with the raising of a new flagpole in front of the station. As this allows us to fly three flags; United States, State of Maine and The Fire Department Flag.

During this past year, we ran into bad luck with apparatus. Last fall we lost the transmission in Engine 3 and had to have it rebuilt. Just lately with the demand for the forestry vehicles, we lost the high-pressure skid tank on the 4X4 Unit. We hope to have a replacement tank fabed within the next month with money left in the current budget.

Last August we had three high school seniors enroll in the Firefighter 1 program at Mt. Blue Vocational Technical Center in which they completed 140 hours of training. In June they will take the final hands on exam for their Firefighter 1 certificate. They are currently active members on the department and include; Jake Letendre, Brady Lake and Levi Jones.

Any resident that still does not have **an installed reliable working smoke detector**, we encourage them to contact any member of the fire department as we still have a few smoke detectors left from the **Maine Residential F.I.R.E. Project**.

The Department continues to strive to fill its roster with qualified individuals. Anyone who has any interest at all, please contact any department member for a department application.

Recently there has been a move to reduce taxes with the reduction of emergency services. At this time I'm not sure if it's in our best interest to have dispatching provided through other alternatives. We have worked long and hard to achieve the professional dispatch service we currently support through taxes. I strongly recommend all tax payers to be present at the Town Meeting and vote.

All outside burning requires a permit, other then a contained campfire that is used for cooking or warming on your own property. We continue to have illegal burning in incinerators and we will prosecute if caught. Currently you can only burn clean wood (no paint, stain, etc.) and wood debris such as leaves, trees, brush, etc. You may not burn any paper or cardboard, any questions call one of the following;



We had a very busy year as we welcomed 165 new members to the library in 2002. We added 1,292 books and other materials to our collection, many of them donated by generous patrons. We now receive 26 magazines and two newspapers.

The computers that we received from the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation Grant are getting a lot of use. We are very happy that they have made it possible for us to offer the latest technology to our patrons, especially in these times of limited funds. We received four new Gateway computers which are connected to the Internet, a content server, software, laser printer, as well as technical support and training. The computers allow the public to access the Internet at the library. It also helps students and adults to do their homework and other general research. We have several additional educational programs on the computers for the younger children to use. The Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation are working with the libraries in Maine as part of the Maine State Partnership Library Grant Program. They are dedicated to bridging the digital divide by providing computers, software, technical support, training, and Internet connectivity to eligible public libraries to enable them to expand access to information technology.

We had a very successful Summer Reading Program with the theme of "Some Of My Best Friends Are Books!" Forty-five children and six parents completed the program with a combined total of 1,347 hours of reading. We had special events during the summer, which included a Pizza Party on the Library Lawn, and several Story and Craft Times for the children provided by Theresa Timberlake, Francena Goodine and Elaine Smith.

We had a victory party at the completion of the program, which was highlighted by the appearance of "The B. J. Hickman Magic Show". He performed a fast-moving, fun-filled, audience participation (interactive) magic show. Following the program, everyone enjoyed refreshments provided by the library and several generous parents. Ken and Amie Smith were a big attraction with their aromatic popcorn machine. They made individual bags of tasty popcorn for everyone to enjoy.

Everyone who successfully completed the program received a packet containing the following: a notebook, pen, pencil, a certificate of completion, a "Some Of My Best Friends Are Books!" bookmark, a "Some Of My Best Friends Are Books!" Book Bag, and a certificate for a complimentary pan pizza from Pizza Hut. The Trustees of the Livermore Falls Water District hereby submit their Report for The year ending December 31, 2002.

Construction resumed in the spring of 2002 with the comprehensive system plan. This plan/upgrade is designed to improve fire flow, eliminate old cross country transmission mains and improve pumping capacities at two existing pump stations. The contract work was performed by C.H. Stevenson's and engineered by Sevee & Maher Engineering, Inc. Installed, was 16,000 ft of 12" DI water main, 22 new hydrants and 75 gate valves.

Throughout the year the following services, repairs and installations were made:


Four (4) new services were installed.

Seven (7) water mains were repaired, Three (3) gate valves were replaced and one (1) hydrant was replaced.

I have begun working my second year on a contractual basis for the town of Livermore Falls having started in March of 2002. I am assisted on a regular basis by my associate Kevin Geaghan. We have enjoyed the opportunity to work here.

The above report shows the changes in the appropriations, other revenue, net assessments, and valuations from 2001 to 2002. The valuation of the town decreased from last year, primarily from the correction in the valuation of Central Maine Power and a reduction in the value of the Borelax plant.

In the past the homestead exemption was a uniform \$7000 exemption on all qualified homestead property. This year the legislature has modified the homestead exemption. For properties less than \$125,000 in value the exemption remains at \$7000 in value. For properties between \$125,000 and \$224,999 in valuation the exemption is reduced to \$5000. For properties of more than \$250,000 in value the exemption is reduced to \$2500 in value.

To the residents of Livermore Falls,

The Livermore Falls Summer Recreation program offers structured, very well supervised fun for six weeks in the summer for all local children. Summer recreation is offered to all children entering 1st grade to children entering 8th grade.

Last summer I had 254 children enrolled in the program (166 from Livermore Falls, 56 from Livermore and 32 from other surrounding towns. It is great to see that many children involved.

I had 22 counselors and 6 junior counselors working with these children. Most of them are from Livermore and Livermore Falls. I want to say they all did a great job and I was very pleased on their performances.

Every day recreation started at 9:00 in the Livermore Falls High School cafeteria where they were served a nutritious breakfast, which is offered free to all children through a grant. Lunch is also provided to all free of charge. A big thank-you goes out to the cafeteria workers for the great job they did.

We play games, sports, arts & crafts and swim lessons were offered at Brettuns Pond. They also went bowling at the Tri Town Bowling Center, and roller-skating at the Livermore Falls Skating Center, which was both opened to accommodate our recreation program. We also went on field trips to Roy's Miniature Golf, a Sea Dogs game, movie theater in Farmington, Dummer's Beach and Funtown. We also had a bike safety rodeo put on by Sandy Richard and the Franklin County Healthy Community Coalition. There were many kids who qualified to receive a new free bike helmet and others could purchase a helmet for only \$10. Every child was fitted properly with a helmet and shown the proper way to wear the helmet. Officer Mike Pike and other officers from Livermore Falls Police Dept. were also there. They had set up an obstacle course for those kids that brought their bicycles. They gave them some safety tips and handed out stickers and reflectors. It was great to have them there.

Kids that are kept busy are less likely to find trouble. And in summer recreation they are kept very busy. They are having fun with their friends and classmates for most of the summer. The reaction program gets kids of all ages involved.

Last year was my first year as Director. I want to thank all of the kids, parents and counselors for making it a success. I am looking forward to this summer and hope to see you all again.

Sewer Department Report

The new wastewater treatment plant ran smoothly this year. All license requirements were easily met with no discharge violations experienced. One new push on at the state level is phosphorus reduction. The sewer users in town can help this problem by using low or no phosphate cleaning supplies. If the time comes that we have to do phosphorus removal it is going to be quite expensive, so all reduction we can accomplish ahead of time will help.

As part of the Rt 4 (Main St) upgrade, by DOT, we are planning to replace the old sewer line that was installed in the early 1900's. This project makes sense in that we will not have to pay for opening permits, and the old collector line is in pretty bad shape. This was verified by a TV inspection of the line last summer. We are pursuing all avenues of grants and loans to help fund the project. The construction phase will probably be done in the summer of 2005.

We tried a product called ROOT-X on Depot St and Pine Ave. to help with the frequent root blockages. The lines were treated with a root retarding foam by Ted Berry Co. and will be monitored to see if the treatment is cost effective. The replacement cost of just these two streets is over \$108,000.

2003 ANNUAL TOWN MEETING WARRANT

To: Ernest N. Steward, Jr., a constable of the Town of Livermore Falls, in the County of Androscoggin, in the State of Maine:

Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the voters of the Town of Livermore Falls in the County of Androscoggin, in the State of Maine, qualified by law to vote in Town affairs, to meet at the Fire Station in said Town of Livermore Falls on Tuesday, the 10th of June AD 2003 at 9:00 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles to wit:

Article 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Article 2. To choose by secret ballot in accordance with Title 30 M.R.S.A. Section 2061 all necessary Town Officials including one Selectman/Assessor for a three year term; one Selectmen/Assessor for a two year term; three MSAD #36 School Board Directors for three year terms; two MSAD #36 School Board Directors for two year terms; one MSAD #36 School Board Director for a one year term.

- ▶ Note: The polls for election of officers will open at 9:00 o'clock in the forenoon and close at 8:00 o'clock in the evening. At the closing of the polls the meeting will recess and reconvene at 7:00 o'clock in the evening on Wednesday, June 11th, 2003 at the Livermore Falls High School Cafeteria for the purpose of acting on the remainder of the Articles.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to fix dates when taxes shall be due and payable and see if the Town will fix a rate of 7% interest to be paid on taxes unpaid after said date.

- ▶ **Recommendation:** That 7% per annum be charged commencing on October 22, 2003 on all first ½ year payments not paid on or before October 21, 2003 and that 7% per annum be charged commencing on March 31, 2004 on all second ½ year payments not paid on or before March 30, 2004.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to fix an interest rate of 5% on all taxes abated that have been paid in full, amount to be paid from the date the taxes were paid.

Article 5. To see if the Town will authorize a tax discount of 1% of the entire tax bill, if the bill is paid in full within 30 days of commitment of taxes, and raise by taxation and appropriate \$10,000.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to borrow if necessary, in anticipation of taxes, and raise by taxation and appropriate \$2,000 for interest expense.

Article 7. To see if the Town will fix a time period after which interest will be charged on unpaid sewer assessments and to see if the Town will fix a rate of interest to be charged on sewer assessments not paid within said time period.

- ▶ **Recommendation:** That 7% per annum prorated daily be charged on sewer assessments not paid within 60 days of the quarterly billing date.

Article 8.
