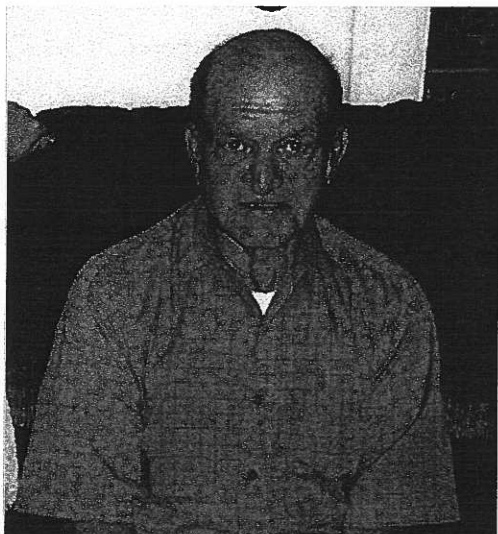

**REPORT TO THE CITIZENS OF LIVERMORE FALLS**

Dear Neighbors:

Serving as your state representative in Augusta is an honor. During this 122<sup>nd</sup> session, I will work hard to address concerns and issues that are important to our community – for example, less federal funding for state programs, concerns about affordable health care, and property tax reform.

Last December, the Governor introduced his tax reform legislation. Taking action to provide property tax relief for Maine residents was our first order of business in the Legislature. The final bill was enacted on January 20, 2005, with bipartisan support. It provides immediate property tax relief, spending caps for state and local governments, as well as increasing the state's share of local education funding. This was accomplished without increasing taxes.

While the state has realized some economic gains, we will have to give consideration to all programs during the budget process so that we stay within the spending cap. There are no major revenue increases planned, which means that cuts to find additional cost savings from some programs may happen. Now, more than ever, we must ensure that Mainers get the most from their tax dollars.

Working for – and with – the citizens of Livermore Falls on these important issues is an honor. I am proud to be your state representative. To the People of Livermore Falls,

I've been given the opportunity to report to you the current state of affairs, in the Town of Livermore Falls. First I have to thank the Board of Selectmen, the Town Manager, and the excellent office staff that operate the town on a daily basis. Together we put together what we believe is the best possible budget to properly maintain the towns operations and services. We have passed along our work to the budget committee, and they have done a good job in presenting their recommendations. It's not always possible to agree on every issue that faces us, but this dedicated group of individuals do their best to do what they believe is right for the future of Livermore Falls.

Our Police, Fire, and Dispatch Department should be respected and commended for the work that they do for the people of this town. The town is divided on regionalization plans for County dispatching services in an effort to cut costs. We as a board thought it best for the voters of Livermore Falls to help us make a very difficult decision. We have to decide whether or not to continue with the current level of dispatch services, in an effort to reduce the tax burden on residents property tax bill.

The Highway and Sewer Dept. continue to serve the public with pride, and do an excellent job providing the town with vital services. Eddie Black retired from the highway crew this past year. We are in debt to him for his many years of loyal service to the town.

Sheila Dorey has also retired after being the long time Librarian of the Library. On behalf of the town I would like to thank her for the many years of dedication.

Things at the Transfer station are ever changing with the different State and Federal mandates we must enforce. It can be very confusing at times to know what items are recyclable and which are not. Our attendant is always willing to assist you in the proper disposal of items. Your cooperation will help keep tipping fees down.

The Superintendent, School Board, Teachers, and Staff have put in countless hours improving the quality of education for our children. MSAD 36 is a leader among schools involved in regionalization

efforts. In doing so, they have again lowered the local share that the town has to raise in tax dollars for education.

The newly formed Livermore Falls Downtown Betterment Group is made up of local business people, town representatives, citizens, and interested members of the community. This group is taking on several projects to help make our downtown more attractive to shoppers or potential new businesses. The LFDBG is planning to utilize the rich historical value that Livermore Falls has to offer. The goal is to provide a good place for people to do their shopping and consider making their homes here.

As I write this letter, a very successful event was recently held. The theme was Main St., USA 1946. The local eighth graders along with historian Dennis Stires and many volunteers, drew hundreds of people to our downtown area. Many comments were made by residents of the area who were living during those times. Every person was very pleased to see Livermore Falls alive and well. It brought a great sense of pride to those involved and those who attended.

In closing I would like to take this opportunity to ask all residents of Livermore Falls to get involved with some sort of community project. Whether it be serving on a town board, or volunteering your time towards a community project. The future of Livermore Falls does not sit solely on the shoulders of town government. It is in the hands of all of us, to take action and help make Livermore Falls the vibrant community it once was. Livermore Falls is the best it has been in years. Thank you.

ANNUAL REPORT: MAY 23, 2005

TOWN MANAGER'S OFFICE

To the Citizens of Livermore Falls;

Many good things have happened since our annual report last May. And some not so good, like the Governor and Legislature enacting Question 1B LD 1) after the Maine voters passed 1A in June 2004. The Gov projects they'll get to an education funding share of 55% (Question 1A) by maybe 2010. Well, that's not what the voters passed.

And now they are proposing elimination of the tax on machinery, thereby taking the burden off industry; but unfortunately it falls on small business, home-owners and agriculture. You could have seen a 1 mil decrease in our tax rate this year, what with the school funding from the State. However, the State didn't fully fund the Homestead exemption on the local property tax. So the unfunded difference which we will make up locally wipes out the school decrease.

On the local front, the Town's finances are improving with the growth of the Undesignated Fund Balance (Surplus). The Auditor gave us our healthiest report in years. This year's town meeting, June 14 & 15 continues to underfund capital needs, primarily roads and the Highway Dept fleet. This will haunt our successors in the years to come. Department expenditures are level, or up slightly as with the computer replacements needed at the town office. PD and Dispatch have kept their computers more current, with the help of DARE and bust monies.

Fuel price increases have boosted our Buildings account budget; and a hard winter caused all towns to spend heavily on ice/snow control. On the plus side we continue to benefit from the drainage work we've accomplished in recent years.

Planning efforts are aimed to guide our community to a stable, attractive situation in the years ahead. The Planning Board offers several land-use rules at the 6/15 meeting. Also, traffic planning for our village area is underway; along with the efforts of our Betterment Group. A healthy village enlarges the tax base and offers our young people the hope of living and

working here. We are working on several projects to stabilize and increase jobs, another goal for a health community.

Our citizen volunteers are to be commended; serving in the Adopt .a. spot program, the Town Tower Clock Repair project, The Betterment Group, the Gazebo Farm Market, AYS and other community programs.

Thank you to the Planning Board, the Appeals Board, Assessment Review and Budget Committee. Also thank you to our employees for their good work; and , the Safe-Work Record continues.

### **To The Citizens of Livermore Falls,**

As in the past I would like to take this time to recognize and thank the following in assisting me during the past year. Fire Department Officers & Members, Town Manager/Fire Commissioner, Selectman, Town Clerk, Police Chief & Officers, Dispatchers, Highway Crew, Mutual Aid Departments and Citizens. Finally, last but not least, my lovely wife and family for allowing me the time to serve the community again this past year.

The Department received \$25,898.00 through the Federal Homeland Security Grant for Calendar Year 04. Funds were awarded for purchasing communication equipment; portable and mobile radios along with a vehicle repeater. Remaining funds were combined with Livermore Fire Department's award for a joint purchase of a new air compressor, containment fill station and cascade station for required air supply. This equipment will be housed here at Livermore Falls, with accessibility to Livermore's Department.

We also received \$1,450.00 through the Maine State Forestry Title IV Grant in which carries a fifty percent matching fund. These dollars were used to replace a tired, rusty, leaking 200 gallon skid tank on our

forestry 4 X 4. The total cost for fabrication and installation of the new poly tank came to \$3,000.

Also we are currently involved with four other municipalities; Jay, Livermore, Wilton and Farmington on a regionalization study made possible through a grant received by the State of Maine in the amount of \$10,000. Areas of concern are automatic response of Mutual Aid to calls, joint equipment purchases, apparatus purchasing, dispatch, training facility and other areas to improve the overall quality of service to reduce homeowners insurance cost through the ISO rating per Departments.

Once again this year we applied and were rejected for the FEMA Grant. We continue to apply and can only hope that in the near future our luck will change and we will be on the receiving end of a substance award. This year we are in for \$142,000 for replacement of Turnout Gear, Pagers and Air-Paks. If received, we will have to match 5 percent of the total amount awarded.

Three high school students; Cassandra Purington, Charles Lake and Kurtis Barnett completed the 140 hours of Firefighter I training program at Mt Blue Vocational Technical Center in January. They have also introduced a collection of data which include hydrants, dry hydrants and landing zones locations on a Global Information System Program. This data will be instrumental in emergency response for fire departments with locations, flows and accessibility in the above categories.

**We encourage any resident that still does not have an installed, reliable working smoke detector; to contact any member of the fire department as we still have a few smoke detectors left from the Maine Residential F.I.R.E. Project.**

The Department continues to strive to fill its roster with qualified individuals. Anyone who has any interest at all, please contact any department member for a department application.

**All outside burning requires a permit, other than a contained campfire that is used for cooking or warming on your own property. We continue to have illegal burning in incinerators and we will prosecute if caught. Currently you can only burn clean wood (no paint, stain, etc.) and wood debris such as leaves, trees, brush, etc. You may not burn any paper or cardboard, any questions call one of the following;**



To the Town Manager, Selectmen and Citizens;

The Livermore Falls Police Department received and responded to 4692 calls for emergencies and/or assistance this year, a decrease of 49 calls. In addition, 294 arrests were made, an increase of 22 arrests, 530 criminal summonses were issued, an increase of 5 and 360 traffic summonses were issued, a increase of 11 over last years totals.

This year has been a rebuilding year for the department as Officer Bruce Benson resigned 3/7/2004 to take a civilian job in Iraq and was replaced by Officer Brock Caton on August 2, 2004. Officer Caton was sent to the Maine Criminal Justice Academy in January for his 18 weeks of training and will have graduated May 27, 2005. Officer Roderick Small left the department at the end of July 2004 to work for Jay Police Department; Officer Joseph Sage replaced him on August 29, 2004. Officer Sage has moved into town and will be attending the Maine Criminal Justice Academy this August for 18 weeks. Our regular officers as well as a few of our reserve officers have stepped up to help fill the gaps left during this period of rebuilding and training.

With all the court cases being held in the Lewiston/Auburn area now and the increase of court dates from 2 per month to 8 per month and the continuing increase of criminal cases that take time to investigate and prepare for trial, we rely on the dispatchers to help us filter calls and keep up with some of the paperwork, both routine and administrative. This has helped the officers maintain presence on patrol to help deter crime.

Loosing the court has its good points as well; the extra office space provided a new home for the Town Office and the Dispatch and Police Department was able to utilize the space vacated by the Town Office. It has provided a more efficient and pleasant work environment for all.

On behalf of both the Dispatch staff and the Police staff, we have chosen to dedicate our services to the citizens of Livermore Falls. We strive to do our best for the Town of Livermore Falls and offer our thanks to all the Citizens, Selectpersons, and Department Heads that have supported the Officers and Dispatchers over the years, for their assistance, cooperation and understanding. The Department's ability to do its job is directly related to the help and support you have provided us.





## 2004 2005 Public Works Report

### Greetings

Allot has happened in public works since we last reported.

The winter started early, and several storms were recorded during this past winter. The first storm was in mid November, and the storms ended with flooding rain in early April.

We were very fortunate with the flood in early April. No roads were washed out, and only a few hours of overtime were recorded.

The ditching and erosion work we did last summer may have helped, and the vigilance of the highway crew on basin cleaning and pushing back snow banks was a plus. We still are repairing minor wash outs on shoulders and ditches, and will do more as the weather clears and the ground dries. Our thanks to the police department, Dispatch, and the fire department for there help though many storms this winter.

Our budget was strained early in the winter because of the sudden increase in cost of road material, and fuel prices. As we set a budget last year no one could foresee this sudden price increase on both Fuel, and salt, and sand.

We have applied for two F. E. M. A. grants for storms in February, and March. These two grants together were for about seventeen thousand dollars. Another March storm has been declared, but we have not applied yet. We expect maybe another ten thousand for that storm. This money will help offset our winter expenditures.

The flood in early April has been declared for disaster relief , and our early estimates for that storm is about seven thousand dollars.

I don't remember a winter with four or more storms declared by F.E.M.A.

We are just glad we are finally in spring season.

Two Employees have left us this past year. Warren Smith has been employed at the paper Mill, and our long time mechanic,

Eddie Black has retired. William Nichols Jr, and Robert Merrill have replaced these employees.

We hope to do more paving, and erosion work this summer. Our budget is not set yet, and we are looking forward to working with the selectmen, and budget committee on our new budget.

## 2004 recycling report

The 2004 recycling report was filed with the state in March.

What we noticed most was we have finally achieved an adjusted recycling rate of 41 percent. Thank you to all.

Continued recycling is a must, as trash disposal costs are very expensive.

Along with recycling being up our trash was also up. We believe this is related to new types of packaging that is mostly plastic and cannot, or already has been recycled. Spot inspections of trash bags from the dumpsters also show that some are not recycling.

**Let us put it this way. We only pay about thirty dollars per ton for some recycling disposal, and some we actually get paid for.** With the costs almost offsetting. Our income from some commodities has increased with the worth of some materials going up.

We are paying almost eighty dollars per ton for trash disposal.

**Please do the math, and do your part on recycling.**

We have started accepting what is called Universal waste. By law these items have to be recycled. These include florescent bulbs, some small rechargeable batteries, and other items. A complete list can be picked up at the recycling station, and the town office. Please ask the manager at recycling if you have any questions.

The board of selectmen has reintroduced the policy of no dump picking this year, and we ask all to respect this policy. This is mostly a safety issue, and also will keep some people out of our facility after hours.

Does not include: Plastic or metal caps and rings, bottles that are clear and glossy.

- ◆ **Mixed Paper**

All mail, office paper and food boxes. Must be clean. Magazines now go with newspaper.

- ◆ **Tin Cans**

Tin cans and lids—all metal cans can be mixed together. Must be clean, flattened and have the label removed.

Does not include: Paint or aerosol cans.

- ◆ **Newspaper**

Newspapers, including all the glossy supplements that come with the paper. Magazines and catalogs are included in this category.

- ◆ **Corrugated Cardboard**

Only corrugated cardboard and brown paper bags are allowed. Boxes should be clean and dry and broken down flat.

Does not include cereal, pizza, egg or shoes boxes. These are mixed paper. Please remove staples, tape and plastic mailing labels.

We had a very busy year as we welcomed 121 new members to the library in 2004. We added 987 books and other materials to our collection, many of them donated by generous patrons. We now receive 20 magazines

and two newspapers. Our total collection of books, videos, audiocassettes and CD's is 28,059. We welcomed Mrs. Myra Rosenbaum as a new member of our library team in February 2004.

I have attended educational workshops and classes sponsored by the Maine State Library during the past year.



## CODE ENFORCEMENT OFFICE REPORT

I had another busy year enforcing everything from building codes for apartment buildings to enforcing junkyard laws, and helping people prepare for site plan review with the Planning Board. In total I have responded to approximately 180 complaints.

Junkyards continue to be the biggest complaint. I have been trying to educate people on what constitutes a junkyard because it covers far more than just automobiles. If you have questions about this or the "Hobbiest Law" please feel free to call and ask.


The Planning Board had another busy year approving 26 permits from 1/21/04 until 4/6/05 and have one application for the May meeting so far.

The Planning Board and the Code Enforcement Officer have been working on some amendments to the existing "Building Lots Standards" and have worked very hard to improve the proposed "Building Notification Ordinance". At the last town meeting some good points were brought out regarding this ordinance. We have worked hard to address these issues and have held a public hearing on it, however, there was very little public involvement. It is very important that the people of the Town of Livermore Falls are involved with these public hearings so that problem areas may be flagged out before Town Meeting so we can fix them. I explained last year that the purpose of this ordinance is to make my time more efficient, help the town to see where growth is occurring so we can better modify the comprehensive plan, and to help the tax base. As I mentioned last year there may be buildings that are not being taxed properly which effects everyone's taxes. This permit will not cost anything, and it will help everyone to be treated equally.

Dog houses, small decks, pools, and sheds under 200 square feet will not require this permit. Last year one of the concerns was the square footage so we changed it to 200 square feet to address this issue. Copies of both ordinances may be acquired at the Town Office.

Thank you to the Citizens of Livermore Falls for your patients and understanding, and special thanks again to the Office Staff, Board of Selectmen, Planning Board, and the Police Department that has helped on a few cases. Hope you all have another good year.

## REPORT FOR TOWN WARRANT

For the Town of Livermore Falls

July 1, 2004 - June 30, 2005

Tri-County Mental Health Services is the federally designated and state licensed comprehensive community mental health center providing a range of services to the residents of your community. We have been providing the services since 1951. Tri-County is a private nonprofit corporation. It is governed by a Board of Directors of fifteen people representing, proportionately, the residents of Androscoggin, Cumberland, Franklin and Oxford Counties. The Board of Directors, representing your community, legally oversee all of the financial and programmatic operations of the center. They are always there to speak on your behalf.

Tri-County provides the following range of services for the residents of your community: outpatient therapy, psychiatry, case management services for the chronically mentally ill emergency services (twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week, fifty-two weeks a year); a range of services to the criminal justice system (to the courts, probation and parole, etc.); rehabilitation services to the mentally retarded; alcohol and drug abuse counseling services and consultation, education, training and prevention services to other care givers in the community schools, police, nursing homes, etc.

It is the foremost intention of this agency to reduce emotional pain and dependence upon chemicals, to rehabilitate those in need and to prevent people from ever needing our services. Your appropriation serves to defray the cost of our services which the residents of your town cannot afford to pay. This makes us truly a public service. Every effort is made to collect payment for services, which is predicated upon a sliding fee scale assessment of a patient's ability to pay.

I am sure that what we have done, and what we do generally is known to many of you regarding this report. We would appreciate any reactions you have to what we do or ought to be doing at any time.

During this period, the active clients were served from the town of Livermore Falls for a total of 1,576 hours (1,652 visits). These visits cost us \$236,680. Receipts from consumers averaged 11.4% of costs leaving a gap in revenues of \$27,031 that is paid for by the United Way, state government, or town funds.

## TAX COLLECTORS REPORT

Under the July 1 through June 30 fiscal accounting period, annual reports must be prepared and printed prior to the end of the fiscal period and before the post annual audit can be started. April 1 through March 31 has been selected as the most reasonable reporting period that can be offered to the voters for comparative information purposes.

Taxes are committed to the Tax Collector at the time the annual bills are mailed out, usually in September, and at the expiration of eight to twelve months any unpaid balances are placed on lien and turned over to the Treasurer for collection. Any liens which are not paid in full with interest and recording fees foreclose after eighteen months and become the property of the Town. The Treasurer and the Tax Collector accept partial or installment payments in order to assist taxpayers to avoid liens and foreclosures.

The tax commitment for 2004 was the third one prepared by me, since starting to perform work for the town of Livermore Falls in March 2002. I am assisted on a

regular basis by my associate Kevin Geaghan. It has been a pleasure for us both to work for Livermore Falls.

We appreciate the help and cooperation of the town staff that they provide on a regular basis.

At this time it does appear that the homestead exemption for this year will be raised to \$13,000. The legislation enacting this change this year does not fully reimburse towns for the lost revenue of this new exemption. In the past, the state has reimbursed towns for 100% of the lost tax revenue from the homestead exemption. Now the state reimburses for 50% of the lost tax revenue from the homestead exemption. This means that the benefit of the expanded exemption may be offset somewhat by an increase in the tax rate. It also means that there will be somewhat of a tax shift to non-residential real estate that does not benefit from the homestead exemption.

A major reason for the increase in value in 2004 over 2003 was due to the expansion of the IP hydro electric plant.

Taxpayers are reminded that taxes are assessed as of each April 1st. If you are applying for an exemption from taxation for the first time, you need to submit it to the town office by April 1 of the first year the exemption is applied for.

## Sewer Department Report

In April of 2005 we started the process of renewing our State discharge license with the DEP. Our preliminary draft gives us our full 2.0 million gallons per day that the plant was designed for. The only real change in the license is a phosphorus limit of 8.34 pounds per day. We will run tests in 2005 and if some removal is necessary, we will start chemical addition in the summer of 2006. Please try to use low phosphorus products, as this will reduce the cost of removal, which is quite expensive.

The Main Street sewer replacement project has now been delayed until the summer of 2008. This is just a small portion of our collection system and the estimated price is over \$300,000. The old collection system in town is going to be a real challenge in the future of the sewer department. Every time we have a severe problem we now try to TV the line to get an idea of where to spend our limited resources to get the most out of our money. So far there is no shortage of places to improve.

The plant's lab has instituted a new quality control program to assure the DEP that we are reporting accurate discharge results. The new program is very time consuming but was mandated, and from our last DEP inspection, we are doing a good job.

This year there are several Androscoggin River bills going through the legislature. They range from dissolved oxygen issues, to phosphorus issues, to flow control of Gulf Island Pond. I would urge the general public to be pro-active on these proposed changes as they could have a huge economic impact on the local paper industry and the entire Androscoggin Valley.

## 2005 Annual Town Meeting Warrant

To: Ernest N. Steward, Jr., a constable of the Town of Livermore Falls, in the County of Androscoggin, in the State of Maine:

### Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the voters of the Town of Livermore Falls in the County of Androscoggin, in the State of Maine, qualified by law to vote in Town affairs, to meet at the Fire Station in said Town of Livermore Falls on Tuesday, the 14<sup>th</sup> of June AD 2005 at 9:00 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles to wit:

**Article 1.** To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

**Article 2.** To choose by secret ballot in accordance with Title 30, M.R.S.A. Section 2061 all necessary Town Officials including one Selectman/Assessor for a two year term; one Selectman/Assessor for a three year term; three MSAD #36 School Board Directors for three year terms; also one non-binding referendum dealing with the changing of Dispatch service currently being done locally and one non-binding referendum pertaining to becoming a part of Franklin County.

Note: The polls for election of officers will open at 9:00 o'clock in the forenoon and close at 8:00 o'clock in the evening. At the closing of the polls the meeting will recess and reconvene at 7:00 o'clock in the evening on Wednesday, June 15<sup>th</sup> at Murray Hall for the purpose of acting on the remainder of the articles.

**Article 3.** To see if the Town will vote to fix dates when taxes shall be due and payable and see if the Town will fix a rate of 7.75% interest to be paid on taxes unpaid after said date.

**Recommendation:** That 7.75% per annum be charged commencing on October 21, 2005 on all ½ year payments not paid on or before October 20, 2005 and that 7.75% per annum be charged commencing on April 14, 2006 on all second ½ year payments not paid on or before April 13, 2006.



**Article 4.** To see if the Town will vote to fix an interest rate of 5% on all taxes abated that have been paid in full, amount to be paid from the date the taxes were paid.

**Article 5.** To see if the Town will authorize a tax discount of 1% of the entire tax bill, if the bill is paid in full within 30 days of commitment of taxes, and raise by taxation and appropriate \$12,000.00 to cover such discount.

**Article 6.** To see if the Town will fix a time period after which interest will be charged on unpaid sewer assessments and to see if the Town will fix a rate of interest to be charged on sewer assessments not paid within said time period.

**Recommendation:** That 7.75% per annum prorated daily be charged on sewer assessments not paid within 60 days of the quarterly billing date.

Statement of fact: This article is to approve a road discontinuance and to leave a public easement. If this article is approved, the municipality will have no legal obligation to maintain the road, but the public will still have the right to travel on it.

**Article 44.** To see if the Town will vote to accept an Ordinance known as "BUILDING NOTIFICATION ORDINANCE within the Town of Livermore Falls." (copies available at the Town Office and Library)

**Article 45.** To see if the Town will vote to accept an Amendment to the Building Lot Standards Ordinance.

Statement of fact: Repeal section B of Article III in the Building Lot Standards Ordinance, which reads "Old Lots, meaning any lot of record, shown on a plan or deed recorded according to law before 6/11/1997 may be built upon regardless of size, provided it complies with the State Plumbing Code, except certain contiguous lots."

**Article 46.** To see if the Town will vote to re-enact the ordinance known as "THE ADULT ONLY BUSINESSES ORDINANCE" that was enacted 11/2/2004.

**Article 47.** To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for and accept Downtown Grants from the State DECD and the Federal Rural Development program for improvements in the Village area.

Statement of fact: Rural Development has awarded us a \$181,000 grant, and the DECD may get our Downtown improvements application this coming December.

**Article 48.** To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for and accept a grant from the State Planning Office to study regional Fire Service prospects with the Towns of Livermore, Jay, Wilton and Farmington.


Statement of fact: The State approved this grant in April, in the amount of \$10,000 with no local match.

**Article 49.** To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for and accept State and Federal grants in the interest of bettering the Town.

**Article 50.** To see if the Town will vote to appropriate Ordinance fees to the Code Office/Planning Account.


