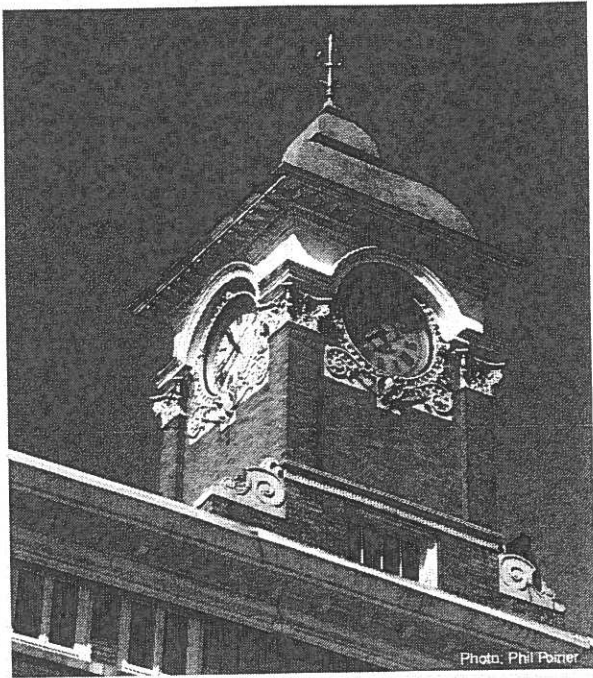

Dear Friends,

As you gather for your Annual Town Meeting, I welcome this opportunity to share some of the work that has made me proud to represent the people of Livermore Falls and all of Maine in the United States Senate.

As Chairman of the Senate Homeland Security Committee, I am pleased to report that Congress made real progress in 2006 to protect our nation, including major legislation that I coauthored to improve the security of America's seaports. I also led a bipartisan effort to pass chemical security legislation that, for the first time, requires security measures at more than 3,400 chemical facilities nationwide.


Following the flawed response to Hurricane Katrina, the Homeland Security Committee conducted the most extensive investigation in its history, and I coauthored legislation that reorganizes and reunites the federal government's preparedness and response capabilities to meet the challenges of all aspects of emergency management.

Congress last year passed many pieces of legislation I authored to improve health care, assist those in need, protect our environment, support our economy and our workers, and strengthen our nation's defenses. The Older Americans Act includes my amendment to establish transportation services for America's seniors. I led the successful fight to reject proposed cuts in Medicare home health and hospice payments, and to prevent prescription drug plans from removing a drug from their formulary during the plan year. I have secured increased funding for diabetes and Alzheimer's research, and for support services for patients and their families.

In 2006, I helped secure a record level of funding for the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP), and Congress renewed the tax deduction I authored for teachers who spend their own money on classroom supplies and my renewable energy tax credit. The landmark Postal Reform legislation I coauthored will ensure affordable rates and preserve universal service. Major Defense bills include my provisions to help secure the future of Bath Iron Works and the jobs of our skilled shipbuilders.

I remain committed to doing all that I can to address your community's concerns on the federal level. If I may be of assistance to you in any way, I encourage you to contact my Lewiston office at 784-6969.



Dear Citizens of Livermore Falls:

This year marks Maine's 123<sup>rd</sup> Legislature and I am pleased to once again be serving as your State Senator. While we will review over 2400 bills that have been submitted on behalf of Maine people this year, it remains a priority of mine to ensure that we continue to look for cuts in government spending, as well as explore how our tax codes compare to those of other New England states. Tax reform needs to happen and these pieces are critical if we are to ever meet the recommendations of the Brookings Institute Report. The report clearly states that we must streamline government to reinvest and cut taxes. I have, thus, submitted legislation to support these goals.

The President of the Senate has appointed me to again serve as Chair of the Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry Committee and has also appointed me to serve on the Judiciary Committee. 2006 – 2007**

The Livermore Falls budget committee met for the first time on October 24, 2007. We are a diverse group of individuals with complementing backgrounds in accounting, business management, professional services, Armed Services, and volunteer work. Some committee members have been involved with town affairs for a number of years. Our common link is the desire for the town to be a success. Our success formula includes financial stability, affordable services, curb-side appeal, and growth potential. The budget committee is committed to making prudent and sound financial recommendations that have a basis in fact.

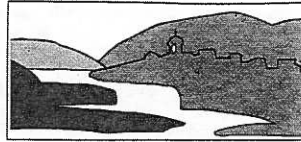
The committee conducted an in depth review as to whether the town's existing aerial truck should be replaced. Our findings and recommendations were presented to the citizens at the January 2, 2007 special town meeting giving the citizens an opportunity to make an informed decision. Since that time, we have been reviewing the town's annual budget for 2007 – 2008. This first year has been a learning curve for the committee members as we try to comprehend the mechanics of the town's financial process. The committee plans to continue to meet regularly after the current budget process is completed. Our goals prior to beginning the next budget season include: conducting cost studies of various department accounts, reviewing ways to reduce costs, and making recommendations for capital improvements as well as developing long-term improvement goals. The Town is also facing the reality of reduced revenues due to tax cuts being implemented by the State. The budget committee will be reviewing the impact of these reductions in relation to the Town's budget and will try to find ways to minimize the impact.

All of the budget committee members have found the past year a great learning experience in town affairs. We hope to continue to serve our community and hopefully, make a difference. We are always open to constructive public recommendations and value your opinions. The budget committee meets the second Tuesday of every month at 6:00 P.M. at the town office. LIVERMORE FALLS BETTERMENT GROUP

**Mission Statement:** The Livermore Falls Betterment Group (LFBG) seeks to revitalize the downtown village area both economically and esthetically.

Acting in accordance with the Comprehensive Plan of 2002 approved by the town, and the Pierce Atwood Planning Study and Revitalization Plan, approved by the Board of Selectmen in 2004, LFBG wishes to create an inviting atmosphere in the downtown village area which will draw in new sources of retail and services. In the process, LFBG will help Livermore Falls develop a more diversified economy, while retaining a small-town/village feel. Recently, with Livermore Falls' acceptance into the Square One Program of the Maine Downtown Center, we also have agreed to organize ourselves according to the four-point principles of the **Maine Street Maine** Program.

Our annual meeting on April 10<sup>th</sup> was a huge success; attended by more than seventy people! At that time, we expanded our board to 11 voting members and four members at large. The new LFBG Board consists of Phil Poirier – owner of Protean Graphics, *President*, Paula Coombs – Owner of PCSolutions, *Vice President*, Gordon Flint – President of Androscoggin Bank, *Treasurer*, Marilyn Grant – *Secretary*, Secretary to Gary Rudemiller, Wausau Paper Mill Manager, Rob Boothby – ReMax River Cities and Boothby Orchards, Darren Carter - LFHS Jobs for Maine Grads Teacher, Ted Finn - LF Middle School Principal, Kenneth Jacques – Co-owner of Ski Depot and owner of the Lamb Block, David Sanders – Attorney at Law, Gary Knight – State Representative, Dist. 81 and John Ross – Kimber & Ross Inc.. Members at Large: Alison Hagerstrom – Exec. Dir. For Greater Franklin Dev. Corp., Matt McCourt – Professor of Geography at UMF and Tanya Swain – Exec. Dir. Western Mountains Alliance.

### **To The Citizens of Livermore Falls,**

As in the past, I would like to start by thanking my Officers for a job well done, especially Assistant Chief Leclerc. Along with the entire Fire Department Members, Town Manager, Selectman, Town Clerk, Police Chief & Officers, Dispatchers, Highway Crew, Mutual Aid Departments and Citizens. Last but not least, my Wife and Family for allowing me to commit to the many hours involved with the department.

As most remember, we started the fiscal year in chaos, with the Town officially shut down. This left the Department scrambling to determine if emergency response would continue to be rendered during this crisis. Fortunately the department was able to continue its services through this precarious time.

At the same time, the long hard fought journey began with the bargaining for Farmington's Aerial Truck. Emotions, politics and bargaining have played out and with no further hurdles; we should receive this unit in May. The \$105,000 bid was finally accepted and the unit recently passed a certification inspection. This is certainly a major step forward in updating this piece of equipment. We are currently conducting necessary repairs of our 1974 unit in hopes to get the highest possible dollar amount when the unit goes out for bid.

In October, we were very pleased to receive word for the second year in a row, the 2006 Assistance to Firefighters Grant being awarded to us. The total amount of the grant is \$198,000, with a 5% match included from the municipality. We applied for such funding to update our current conversion tanker with a new unit. The government sees such units as being unsafe as statistics have shown number of fatalities associated with home made tankers.

This past year, we again sponsored two students Curtis Cloutier and Dylan Couturier in the Firefighter I Training Program at the Mt. Blue Vocational Training Center. A total of nine students have completed this training in the past four years through this department. Levi Gould also completed the course and has since joined our department.

We continue to work with regionalization, hoping to improve on effective dispatching, adequate response and offer all the required expertise associated with any given incident.

As a reminder, I strongly encourage all residents to have a **working smoke detector** on all levels of the homes and to change the batteries at least once a year.

**Also, all outside burning requires a permit**, other than a contained campfire that is used for cooking or warming on your own property. We continue to have illegal burning of trash, debris and larger fires other than camp fires. Currently you can only burn clean wood (no paint, stain, etc.) and wood debris such as leaves, trees, brush, etc. You may not burn any paper or cardboard. Any questions call one of the following:



To the Town Manager, Selectmen and Citizens;

The Livermore Falls Police Department has received and responded to 4008 calls for emergencies and/or assistance this year. In addition, 238 arrests were made, 463 criminal summonses issued, 418 traffic summons issued and 1916 traffic warnings and/or defects issued.

\*\* It should be noted that this year was our first year working with the new IMC software purchased through the Androscoggin County Consolidation Grant. We are all still learning the proper way to enter information so we can retrieve proper statistics from it. At some point this software will become one of the key elements of sharing information between departments and communicating through a joint dispatch center. Dispatch consolidation meetings are still ongoing and it is anticipated that recommendations from the committee will be ready at the end of August.

As most of you are aware Officers Brock Caton and Kenneth Bryant were both called to military duty at the end of December 2005. Officer Bryant returned to work 1/1/2007 and Officer Caton returned home from Iraq 3/10/2007. Fortunately in their absence we found 2 reserve officer that were willing to work on a fulltime basis with their only benefit being an opportunity to go to the 18 week Basic Police Academy. Officers Anthony Duvall and Adam Sage are both good officers and kept the department from becoming overwhelmed by lack of personnel. Thank you Tony and Adam, and welcome home Ken and Brock.

Thank you to all the Citizens that have supported the Officers and Dispatchers in the past. I would also like to thank the Selectmen, Town Manager and area Departments for their assistance, cooperation and understanding.





## 2007 Highway Report

Hello to Livermore Falls Taxpayers.

Another year has past, and with the help of taxpayers and the board of selectmen we have had a successful year at the Highway department.

All projects funded at last year's town meeting were completed on time, and under budget. Paving of over one mile of Moose Hill road went well. This road had the old pavement recycled, and used as new road base. Almost two feet of old pavement, and liquid seal were ground, and graded into road base. With good weather in October pavement was laid at the accurate temperatures. Over the past three years all cross culverts, and most driveway culverts were replaced on this road with no extra money being raised at town meetings. We are in hope that this road will be maintenance free for several years to come. With a newly paved road less winter sand and salt were used, and less abuse of plow equipment was obvious.

Another project completed in October was a Forty two inch culvert replaced on the Souther road. The road was widened by ten feet at this point, and raised about one foot, with about one thousand feet paved. My compliments go out to the highway crew for such an efficient job, and also attention to detail. This job was completed a few thousand dollars under expected budget. New water main was also replaced above this culvert, and thank you to The Livermore Falls Water co.

We continue to plan other much needed projects, but can only do what taxpayers can fund. As I write this report we are in the process of planning sewer replacement on many streets adjacent to Park Street to coincide with the water company water line replacement. Our hope is to replace all infrastructures under these streets, and pave at the end of the projects. Again this is still in the planning stage, and funding is our biggest issue.

Infrastructure repairs such as sidewalks, and more erosion control such as driveway culverts and old culverts that are rusted though is on everyone's mind. As we plan future budgets this will be discussed and priorities will be set for all of this work. Infrastructure is always important, and the sooner repairs are made the less they will cost. The cost of culverts has almost doubled in the past four years, and paving costs have also become a burden as have fuel costs. Inflation is part of what we do. With the help of the crew,

select board, and budget committee our budget has not risen to the rate that other costs have.

I want to thank taxpayers for allowing us to replace our very tired 1995 one ton with a 2002 F550 Ford. This newer truck is much more capable of doing the work we ask of it.

With a warmer than normal winter our biggest challenges were ice storms as opposed to snow. The crew is becoming more conscious of winter material used, and the budget, and repairs are showing this improvement. As of March 24 we have had several large snow events, and as usual the crew is doing an excellent job in treating roads. Since December we have had 20 events that needed some type of road treatment. We have used 794.5 yards of sand, 378 tons of salt, 490 gallons of calcium, and about 70 gallons of Magnesium Chloride. Magnesium chloride does the same work that Calcium does, but seems to be less corrosive. The cost comparison, and reliability are still being studied, and we may convert to Magnesium chloride in the future.

We have not as yet had major break downs with the aging fleet. This is another example of good operators, and good preventive maintenance.

## 2006 Transfer Station Report

Hello

Another year has past, and although many ideas have been shared about trash disposal we continue to have increases for municipal solid waste. The Town of Jay was forced again to pass on an increase for our solid waste.

We had an increase from \$80.50 per ton to \$82.50 per ton as of January 1 2007. Our cost per ton for recycling has stayed at \$30.00 per ton.

We completed our 2006 report to the state planning office last month and our recycling was up slightly, but so was our weight for municipal solid waste.

On the report we totaled 1,593.30 tons of solid waste, up from 1,521.63 in 2005. This is a slight increase but still cost taxpayers an extra \$5,912.78 over 2005.

We were able to compensate for this by trying different ways to place our recyclables and also adding a bigger roll off for municipal solid waste. The bigger roll off has allowed us more room to compact the trash, thus having less roll offs to haul. Since 2004 we have reduced our roll off hauls from 8 per month to 5 per month by increasing tonnage from two to three to four or six tons. At \$90.00 per haul that has been a cost savings of \$270.00 per month , or \$3,240.00 per year. This savings does not seem like allot, but it is a start at finding ways to save money.

The income from recycling was up slightly due to the increase in steel prices. Thus we were paid slightly more for tin cans, and our metal pile.

The universal waste program is working well and remember this is now law. If you have questions as to what universal waste is Fred Nadeau has a complete list of these items at transfer station.

Again the best way to save cost is to recycle. Remember it costs \$30.00 per ton to dispose of recycling and \$82.50 per ton to dispose of Solid waste.

## TREAT MEMORIAL LIBRARY

### Librarian's Report 2006-2007

I am pleased to submit my second annual report to the Trustees and other members of the Livermore Falls Library Association.

We began our fiscal year with the library being closed by the town for the first week of July. This was due to the town's budget problems. We were allowed to re-open July 11<sup>th</sup>, and were very glad to begin serving our patrons again.

Our summer reading program, "Paws, Claws, Scales and Tales" had started before the shut-down, but the readers were wonderful and continued reading until we were open again. The six-week program was a success, with many events scheduled for the children. The grand finale was a marvelous "Dr. Seuss" presentation by "Lady Elaine" Wilcox and her talented assistants.

We were pleased to host a program in September, "Scales and Tails", presented by the Chewonki Foundation. The audience was small that evening, but they enjoyed learning about all the live creatures and their habitats. Chewonki had with them live animals, a crocodile, a large turtle and a huge iguana for everyone to touch and learn about.

Circuit Rider, Susan Strout, helped us install two re-conditioned computers we purchased to help upgrade our system. Solar, our on-line database program, is working well, but required more speed and power than we had available. We joined the Van Delivery Service in July. This service is a fraction of the cost of mailing books through the U.S. Postal Service. We receive one delivery per week, on Thursday, and are no longer charging our customers postage for inter-library loans.

I was able to attend several conferences and workshops this year, accompanied to some of them by Myra Rosenbaum or Elaine Wilcox. I learned a lot at the Rural Sustainability Workshop about small area libraries staying connected and supporting each other. It is essential that we keep improving our services, and help solve our small library problems by working together.

Our small but enthusiastic knitting/crocheting group, Busy Fingers, enjoyed making mittens this year, and donated them to the school to hand out to children who come to school unprepared for the cold weather. We didn't meet during the summer, but started meeting again the first Saturday of the month and will continue until summer again. Anyone is welcome to join in, beginner or expert.

Our "Lady Elaine" Wilcox has been working again this year with County Extension agent, Terry Berry and her organization in presenting the pre-school children with a special story and crafttime twice a month. The children listen to stories, make a small

craft and enjoy a nutritious snack, all co-ordinated to inform them about good foods. This year we are pleased to have the local Head Start children attending "Food, Fun and Reading".

We want to take this opportunity to thank all our volunteers. Doris DeMillo for nineteen years of work as library aide and substitute. "Lady Elaine" Wilcox for her dedication to the programs for our youngest patrons and substituting as needed. Elizabeth Rosenbaum for helping keep our webpage up-to-date, and lending a hand as needed. Diane Maurais and her students deserve a thanks for cleaning the library every week, and Sherry Zlotnick for vacuuming Wednesdays. We will miss Sherry, as her organization has rescheduled and she is no longer available.

We want to thank all the people who helped with our summer reading program: Theresa Timberlake for a story and craft; Lindsay Timberlake and Brittany Castonguay for their craft and storytime; Julie Farmer for bringing her ferret, Cocoa, to meet all the children; Elaine Wilcox for story and crafttime, and librarian, Fran Goodine for making puppets.

Thank you to all the people who remembered us with gifts of books, videos and DVDs to add to our collection. Books we couldn't add to our shelves were put into our Book Giveaway in September, which was very successful. Finally, thank you to our patrons who have made our year so special. We enjoy each and every one of you.

### SOLAR and Interlibrary Loans

In September 2005, the process was started for Treat Memorial Library to add its catalog records to the online database known as SOLAR. Technical difficulties arose during the upgrades necessary to joining SOLAR, causing records and statistics for November, December 2005, and part of January 2006 to be lost. The Library Staff did an amazing job of recovering records, and by March 2006, Treat Memorial Library was an active participant in SOLAR.

Being part of this database allows the Library to request Interlibrary Loans online on behalf of our patrons, as well as allowing other libraries to request items from Treat's collection. Our catalog may now be browsed online, along with catalogs from libraries statewide at the MaineCat website: <http://130.111.64.9/>. To browse just the Treat Memorial Library collection, go to the SOLAR website: <http://solar.maine.edu/search>. After entering search information, there will be an option of selecting Treat Memorial Library. The Librarians will gladly assist anyone with this process.

In July 2006, Treat Memorial Library joined the Van Delivery Service that is available to all libraries, for Interlibrary Loan books. The Van Service is a fraction of the cost of sending books through the U. S. Postal System, and, because of this, we no longer charge our patrons for Interlibrary Loans. Treat receives one delivery per week on Thursdays.

## TAX COLLECTORS REPORT

Under the July 1 through June 30 fiscal accounting period, annual reports must be prepared and printed prior to the end of the fiscal period and before the post annual audit can be started. April 1 through March 31 has been selected as the most reasonable reporting period that can be offered to the voters for comparative information purposes.

Taxes are committed to the Tax Collector at the time the annual bills are mailed out, usually in September, and at the expiration of eight to twelve months any unpaid balances are placed on lien and turned over to the Treasurer for collection. Any liens which are not paid in full with interest and recording fees foreclose after eighteen months and become the property of the Town. The Treasurer and the Tax Collector accept partial or installment payments in order to assist taxpayers to avoid liens and foreclosures.





## 2006 Sewer Department Report

Since the treatment plant upgrade in 1999 we have treated 1.5 billion gallons of wastewater from the towns of Livermore Falls and Jay. We have had no violations of our State and Federal discharge licenses and have averaged a 90% removal of all pollutants. We generated 1,149,759 pounds of bio-solids, which was sent to Little River Compost Facility and turned into a renewable loam product.

As the plant is now 7 years old and operates 24 hours a day, some of our equipment has over 50,000 hours of use. The maintenance, grounds care, and sewer calls had increased to more than 2 people were able to do. After careful consideration we hired a new treatment plant helper (Nels Hawkins). We now have the necessary personal to keep up with our aging collection system and the daily operation of the plant, and pump stations.

Our limit for phosphorus is still being contested with the DEP, in the appeals process. Some time this spring there will be hearings on all the discharge licenses for the Androscoggin River. So far, politics have won out over science and common sense, and only time will tell the final outcome.

Collection system work this summer will be coordinated with work being done by the water district. We will replace sewers on most of the streets that are getting new water mains. Some of these streets are Park, Chestnut, Walnut, Sewall, and Highland. We will also try to fit in some upgrade work on Pearl Street.

2 new services were installed.


4 old services were replaced with new services.

## 2007 Annual Town Meeting Warrant

To: Ernest N. Steward, Jr., a constable of the Town of Livermore Falls, in the County of Androscoggin, in the State of Maine:

### Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the voters of the Town of Livermore Falls in the County of Androscoggin, in the State of Maine, qualified by law to vote in Town affairs, to meet at the Livermore Falls Municipal Building in said Town of Livermore Falls on Tuesday, the 12<sup>th</sup> of June 2007 at 9:00 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles to wit:

**Article 1.** To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

**Article 2.** To choose by secret ballot in accordance with Title 30, M.R.S.A. Section 2061 all necessary Town Officials including one Selectman/Assessor for a two year term; one Selectman/Assessor for a three year term; three MSAD #36 School Board Directors for three year terms; one MSAD #36 School Board Director for a one year term.

Note: The polls will open at 9:00 o'clock in the forenoon and close at 8:00 o'clock in the evening.

**Article 3:** Shall the Town fix dates of October 24, 2007 and April 16, 2008 when taxes shall be due and payable and shall the Town fix a rate of 12% interest to be paid on taxes unpaid after said date?

**Recommendation:** That 12% per annum be charged commencing on October 25, 2007 on all ½ year payments not paid on or before October 24, 2007 and that 12% per annum be charged commencing on April 17, 2008 on all second ½ year payments not paid on or before April 16, 2008.

**Article 4:** Shall the Town fix an interest rate of 5% on all taxes abated that have been paid in full, amount to be paid from the date the taxes were paid?



**Article 5:** Shall the Town authorize a tax discount of 1% of the entire tax bill, if the bill is paid in full within 30 days of commitment of taxes, and use overlay funds to cover such discount?

**Article 6:** Shall the Town charge a 12% interest rate to any sewer assessments not paid within 60 days of the quarterly billing date?

**Article 7:** Shall the Town authorize the Selectmen on behalf of the Town to retain, sell or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town for non-payment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they may deem advisable and in the Town's best interest, and to execute quit claim deeds for such property?

**Article 8:** Shall the Town authorize the Selectmen acting in their capacity as Sewer Trustees, to on the Town's behalf, retain, sell or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town for non-payment of sewer assessments thereon, on such terms as they may deem advisable and in the Town's best interest, and to execute quit claim deeds for such property?

**Article 9:** Shall the Town authorize the Selectmen to accept or reject any and all gifts as they deem advisable, and to expend any monetary gifts on the designated purpose of that gift?

**Article 10:** Shall the Town authorize the Selectmen to apply for and accept State and Federal grants in the interest of improving the Town?

**Article 11:** Shall the Town authorize the Selectmen to dispose of excess surplus, or broken and unrepairable real and personal property of the Town, at their discretion? If the property has a value of over \$500.00, disposal must be a competitive bid process or auction. The Selectmen reserve the right to accept or reject any and all bids. The authority granted herein shall continue until revoked.

**Article 12:** Shall the Town carry the balances forward in the following accounts: Recreation, Street Paving, and Municipal Roof?

**Article 13:** Shall the Town appropriate \$28,776.00 from general revenue for the following overdrafts: \$3,423.00 for Fire, \$8,378.00 for Ambulance, \$3,978.00 for Street Lights, \$6,219.00 for Transfer Station, \$6,678.00 for Buildings, \$11.00 for Grounds Care and \$89.00 for Debt Service?

**Article 37:** Shall the Town authorize the Selectmen to use future Airplane Excise Tax Refunds for the benefit of the Bowman Field Flying Club for carrying out airfield improvements?

**Article 38:** Shall the Town authorize the Selectmen to use future snowmobile registration fees for the benefit of the Jug Hill Riders Snowmobile Club? Said fees to be used by the Club, within the boundaries of the Town of Livermore Falls.


**Article 39:** Shall the Town appropriate Ordinance Fees to the Code Officer/Planning Board Account?


