Dear Citizens of Livermore Falls:

As we mark the beginning of 2008, I welcome this opportunity to share some of the work I've done during the past year representing Maine in the United States Senate.

Maine plays a critical role in our national security through the men and women who serve in our active duty forces and our National Guard and Reserves and through the skilled employees who work at our defense businesses and installations. As a member of the Senate Armed Services Committee, I successfully supported the vital work at Bath Iron Works, Pratt & Whitney, the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard, and the Defense Finance and Accounting Center, as well as at smaller companies like Hodgdon Yachts and Global Research Technologies.

On the Senate Homeland Security Committee, I have worked to better protect our nation against the threat of terrorist attacks and to strengthen the federal partnership with our emergency managers and first responders in responding to natural disasters. The disruption of terrorist plots last year and the improved federal response to natural disasters, such as the Patriots' Day storm here in Maine and the wildfires in California, demonstrate that these efforts are producing real results. Building on our past successful efforts to reform the intelligence community and to increase security at our nation's seaports and chemical facilities, I worked with Senator Joe Lieberman again, to gain approval of a new law further strengthening our homeland security.

With so many pressing needs in this country, we cannot afford to see taxpayers' dollars lost to waste, fraud, and abuse. Working with the Inspectors General, I have written a bipartisan bill to reform wasteful government contracting practices. The Senate approved this bill in November, and I hope it will become law later this year.

Congress last year passed several bills that I advocated to improve health care, expand aid for education, and protect our environment. These include increased funding for the program to expand access to dental services in rural communities, additional funding for diabetes research, and an extension of a tax deduction for teachers. As a member of the Special Committee on Aging, I worked to create a Task Force on Alzheimer's Disease and introduced a bipartisan bill to block cuts in home health care.

Record-high energy costs are imposing a tremendous burden on our low-income families, truckers, and small businesses. With a bipartisan coalition of Senators, including Olympia Snowe, I fought for increased funding for the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP). We secured a \$400 million increase over lastyear's level and will continue to press for additional funding. I also have called upon the Department of Energy to stop buying oil for the Strategic Petroleum Reserve until prices moderate. There is no compelling justification for the Department to take oil off the market at a time when prices are sky high and consumers are struggling to heat their homes and fill their gas tanks.

We need to embrace the goal of energy independence to reduce our reliance on imported oil by developing bio fuels, such as cellulosic ethanol, by increasing fuel efficiency standards for vehicles, and by supporting research into better technology. The new energy law takes significant steps in the right direction.

Dear Citizens of Livermore Falls:

This year marks the Second Regular Session of Maine's 123rd Legislature and we are facing many challenges. Gasoline and home heating fuel prices are at record highs and people simply cannot spend on other things as they might have in the past - basic needs must come first. State revenues are, thus, much lower than what earlier forecasts had predicted and now we are faced with a huge deficit in the State budget. This means some very difficult, but necessary, cuts in spending must be made.

Even before we found ourselves in this situation, I advocated for cutting programs in state agencies that duplicated the efforts of another agency. Not only do I find such things wasteful, but it often leads to a more cumbersome government. This simply frustrates everyone and doesn't fit with the streamlining of government! Eliminating someone's job is never easy and it is certainly not the "popular" thing to do. Sadly, however, some things must be cut if we are to balance our budget, as required by the State Constitution. In the past year I have spent hundreds of hours going over the State budget, line by line, and have been able to identify more than 50 high-level, supervisory positions that, I believe, can and should be eliminated. I will continue to work with the Legislature's Appropriations Committee to identify other areas where we might find savings. Nobody wants to eliminate a program that keeps our most vulnerable citizens safe and healthy so, while I advocate bringing things into line, I will also fight to ensure that those who need our assistance most get it.

As you gather once again to organize Livermore Falls's government, know that I am available to help the town and its citizens in any way that I can. I can be reached at the State House at 287-1515, 1-800-423-6900 (toll free) or by email at seniohn.nutting@legislature.maine.gov. You can also now watch the legislature live while we are in session by going to http://janus.state.me.us/legis/audio/direct/SenateV.html and, as always, committee hearings are open to the public. It is your State House and your government. I hope you will take time to learn more about it and how you can make a difference!

In the months since my colleagues and I returned to the State House we have resumed negotiations on those bills carried over from the previous session, as well as studied the hundreds of new requests submitted by legislative members.

By the time you read this letter, my fellow Legislators and I will have dealt with such issues as school consolidation, health insurance and tax reform. We will have also handled our most formidable task, passing a supplemental budget to fill the \$200 million budget shortfall. The situation that arose with this budget has shown us that we need to control state spending. Although it is never easy to make decisions knowing that the outcome may negatively impact some constituency, sustainable cost-saving measures are necessary. My goal as your representative is to help reform state government to reduce the bureaucracy while improving the delivery of services to the people of Maine.

Keep in mind that when the Legislature is in session, you may monitor the progress of legislation being worked on at the State House by logging onto the Legislature's website, http://janus.state.me.us/legis/; and I encourage you to do so. Once you are there, you can browse bill summaries, listen to committee hearings or watch live streaming video of the House and Senate while they are in session.

Over this past year you have contacted me with your thoughts and opinions on various topics and I thank you for taking the time to do so. Dear Residents,

There are many undeniable variables that are affecting every community in Maine in the past year that unfortunately spill into the upcoming fiscal year. Our community will continue to strive for high quality sustainable services while evaluating new methods of delivery and new partnerships. It is very easy to fall into a pessimistic trap of focusing only on the situational problems.

The amount of assets in Livermore Falls is incredible! We need to promote our community's identity. Our historic sites, cultural and ethnic groups, and organizations, are all important resources to be celebrated in efforts to improve our community, generate economic opportunities, and address social concerns. These combined elements can be coordinated into a powerful effort that will increase uniqueness, economic vitality, and marketability. Investments in cultural resources produce tangible, visible results.

Industrial and Cultural History: We have an amazing industrial history and thanks to Maine's Paper and Heritage Museum, the heritage of life in a paper-making community can be preserved, as well as to encourage tourism, increase economic activity and showcase the area's distinctive heritage. Combined with the draw to the Washburn-Norlands Living History Center, we are headed in a great direction! Incorporating the important knowledge older residents possess and artifacts relating to the area serve to enhance the overall project. Local students or residents can also compile oral histories about our town's history and culture.

Local Events: Parades, musical performances, arts and crafts constitute an industry in and of themselves. When attendees come for these events, they also visit nearby restaurants, hire babysitters, visit shops- all activities that bring money. Visitors do not simply visit for an event. They might buy souvenirs, eat a meal at a nearby restaurant, and participate in what the neighborhood has to offer. The Livermore Falls History Night Celebration and the Apple Pumpkin Festival augment all these resources and allow us all to enjoy the community and neighbors.

Recreational Activities: Recreational tourism can be great economic development tools to attract local residents, visitors to the town, and passers-by to experience the natural beauty of the area. Many new pedestrian pathways have been created in the area with more to come. Outdoor year-round motorized activities are abundant in the area also. The Androscoggin River is a colossal possession and thanks to its improved health, we are seeing more interest and usage. Cross country and downhill skiing can also be found in the areal

The \$150,000 Community Development Block Grant we recently received is a great economic development tool for our town and will not only boost local pride in the community, but will allow us to promote the all resources we have to offer!

LFDBG Projects- We had a very productive project year. Our projects included a Union Park spring clean up; the creation of Gateway Park (corner of Main and Bridge st.) and the purchase and installation of banners for the downtown. We also created a banner for the JLLF Chamber's Apple Pumpkin Festival, to be used on the brackets that we purchased. The town is using those brackets for Christmas decorations as well. Last year we took on the organization of History Night, and hope to make History Night 2008 better than ever. We took aim at helping local business profit better from the Apple Pumpkin Festival by asking local businesses to create promotional coupons. We then staffed a booth at the Festival at which we gave out those coupons, encouraging festival goers to revisit our downtown. Many of us also worked on the Apple Pumpkin Festival Committee. Members of the Betterment Group repaired and painted the "Welcome to Livermore Falls" sign off the bridge on Rt. 4. We also helped promote the tower clock lighting ceremony.

CDBG-Our community-based efforts were a key factor in the town getting a \$150,000 Community Enterprise grant from the Department of Economic and Community Development. This money will be used for façade improvements throughout the downtown. For every \$1, each business that applies will get a dollar. This means we can hope for up to \$300,000 worth of improvements to our downtown!

Community Feedback- LFDBG created a survey to get important feedback from the Townspeople about what they wanted from their downtown. We hosted a "Holiday Gathering" in Nov 2007 for the business community and another in May for the general community. These gatherings will inform us as we begin work on a strategic plan, using funding from the Maine Downtown Center as part of our "Square One" program.

LFDBG Advocacy Efforts- LFDBG brought Livermore Falls Rt. 4 project to the attention of Maine DOT's planning staff after LF was left off the latest biennial plan for the Rt. 4 project. Our months-long effort culminated in a very productive meeting with the Commissioner and his aides here in Livermore Falls. The result: The Livermore Falls/Jay Route 4 project is now back in the biennial plan, with a possibility of work beginning as early as 2010.

Members of the LFDBG brought the extremely poor condition of the railroad crossings in Livermore Falls to the attention of Pan Am, the operators of the railroad. Through persistent effort we were able to schedule a meeting with the Vice-President of Pan Am, show him the dangerous state of our three crossings, and to get a commitment to repair them. **The result:** The railroad crossings have been repaired with cold patch with a promise from Pan Am to come back and permanently fix them with hot top and rubber grade crossings.

To The Citizens of Livermore Falls,

As in the past, I would like to start by thanking my Officers for a job well done, especially Assistant Chief Parker. Along with the entire Fire Department Members, Town Manager, Selectman, Town Clerk, Police Chief & Officers, Dispatchers, Highway Crew, Mutual Aid Departments and Citizens. Finally, my lovely wife Laurie and Family for allowing me to continue the numerous hours required to be a call department Fire Chief.

In November we where very pleased to receive our new Tanker. This is on a Freightliner cab with a chassis manufactured by E-One. It has a 2000 gallon poly tank warranted for life time, three 10" electric dumps, 1250 gpm single stage pump, two portable dump tanks, hand lines and ample room for storage. This was purchased with the 2006 Assistance to Firefighters Grant which was awarded to us back in September 06. The total amount of the grant is \$198,000, with a 5% match included from the municipality. This replaced our 1987 conversion tanker which failed to meet current N.F.P.A. Standards.

This past year, we sponsored Danielle Leclerc to the Firefighter I Training Program at the Mt. Blue Vocational Training Center. A total of ten students have completed this training in the past five years through this department.

The department members have volunteer numerous hours in training this past year. Several members completed the 40 hour basic firefighter course which is required by the Sate of Maine. We also have 7 members in training for their firefighter 1 & 2 certification. Firefighter 1 level and the National Incident Management System will be mandated training for the department to apply for grants in the future.

On April 2, Firefighter Richard Wells retired from this department in which dedicated 56 years to this community. This individual truly went above and beyond the call of duty for a call department. In his time served, he missed only two month meetings, sacrificing counts hours and held every position within the department to the best of his ability. Thank you Richard, you will be missed!

We continue to work on regionalization, which includes training, response, joint purchasing and the combining of departments.

As a reminder, I strongly encourage all residents to have a working smoke detector on all levels of the homes and to change the batteries at least once a year.

Also, all outside burning requires a permit, other than a contained campfire that is used for cooking or warming on your own property. Currently you can only burn clean wood (no paint, stain, etc.) and wood debris such as leaves, trees, brush, etc. You may not burn any paper or cardboard. Any questions call one of the following:

To the Town Manager, Selectmen and Citizens;

The Livermore Falls Police Department has received and responded to 3740 calls for emergencies and/or assistance this year. In addition, 235 arrests were made, 576 criminal summonses issued, 484 traffic summons issued and 1619 traffic warnings and/or defects issued.

Our dispatch center should be certified to receive call direct from the Androscoggin County P.S.A.P. (Public Safety Answering Point) soon. This will allow us to have 911 calls transferred directly to us as they were before the new regulation went in effect. Dispatch consolidation meetings are still ongoing for a county wide dispatch center. It is not known at this time when a proposal will be ready for the Towns to consider.

Officer Maurice Drouin went to work as a Deputy for Androscoggin County 8/23/2007 after nearly 6 years of service to the Town. Officer Cortney Hladik of Buckfield was hired 11/26/2007 to fill the vacant position. Officer Hladik is presently attending the Maine Criminal Justice Academy and scheduled to graduate 5/23/2008. He is first in his class at the time of this report. Officer Stephen Allen of Livermore was hired 11/27/2007 as a reserve officer and is currently filling in for Officer Hladik while he is at the academy.

As always we are dedicated to providing public safety services to the citizens of Livermore Falls. I encourage you to contact me at the department with any comments or concerns regarding this department you might have.

Thank you to all the Citizens that have supported the Officers and Dispatchers in the past. I would also like to thank the Selectmen, Town Manager and area Departments for their assistance, cooperation and understanding.

We would like to start off by thanking all of the residents for their patience with us over this past winter. It was a very tough winter for all of us.

The paving done last fall of most of the tree streets, Sewall Street and part of the Campground Road came out very well. This is just a binder for right now as we would like to wait one more year before we put on the surface coat, just to make sure all the new water and sewer lines hold up.

The paving request for this year is to finish the Moosehill Road, which will be grinding the old pavement for a new base and putting down a new hot top binder. We also want to grind 2900 feet on the Haines Corner Road, then put down mulch and chip seal. We would like to just mulch and chip seal the Jug Hill Road, as we put down a lot of patch on this road and patch is very expensive.

I would like to thank the Highway crew for the excellent job they have done this winter. It was a very trying winter with all the snow storms we had and the time they had to spend away from their families.

With all the new snow we did use a lot more material. As of March 28 we have used 1175 yards of sand and 522 tons of salt. This isn't bad considering how many snow events we had. We did have some major repairs but that is to be expected with an aging fleet.

Our request for Capital Improvements includes partial funding for the purchase of a new plow truck in the next year or two. This truck would replace two of our older trucks – the 1989 GMC wheeler and the 1991 GMC plow truck. The new truck would be used year round instead of sitting in the shop all summer like the 1991 does right now.

I would like to personally thank the entire Highway crew, the Town Manager, Treasurer, Office Staff, Selectmen, all other Departments, the citizens and Mr. Johnson from Jay Public Works. Everyone has been very helpful in making the transition to foreman go very smoothly.



200/ Transfer Station Report

To the residents of Livermore Falls:


Our municipal solid waste tonnage increased to 1635.28 tons, last year we produced1593.30 tons, according to reports from the Jay Transfer facility. That is a 2.7% increase in weight. When compared to the increase two years ago of 4.7% and three years ago of 3.4%, it shows we are moving in the right direction of slowing the level of increase. We currently pay \$82.50 for tipping and hauling per ton, the same cost as last year.



While the 2008 report from the State Planning Office is not yet available, we have been gaining ground on meeting the 50% recycling goal for the State of Maine. Recyclables include not only common recycled materials like paper, plastics, cardboard, and glass; but other material like brush, large metal, demolition wood, and other material diverted from the waste stream. These other materials cause recycling rates to fluctuate more than solid waste. Common recyclables constitute over 300 tons each year. Remember the best way to save money at the transfer station is to recycleit is also mandatory! We have noticed more and more black bags and colored bags. Clear bags are the only type we accept; please remember next time buying them at the store.



TAX COLLECTORS REPORT

Under the July 1 through June 30 fiscal accounting period, annual reports must be prepared and printed prior to the end of the fiscal period and before the post annual audit can be started. May 1st through April 31st has been selected as the most reasonable reporting period that can be offered to the voters for comparative information purposes.

Taxes are committed to the Tax Collector at the time the annual bills are mailed out and at the expiration of eight to twelve months any unpaid balances are placed on lien and turned over to the Treasurer for collection. Any liens which are not paid in full with interest and recording fees foreclose after eighteen months and become the property of the Town. The Treasurer and the Tax Collector accept partial or installment payments in order to assist taxpayers to avoid liens and foreclosures.

This year the Selectmen are not offering the discount and we are hoping to get the tax bills out by August in order to get revenue in sooner. The due dates will remain the same. This year, if passed by the voters, the first half will be due on October 22, 2008 and the second half will be due April 15, 2009.

2007 Sewer Department Report

Our society has embraced the idea of using biodegradeable and flushable products, which infers that they will break down and not cause problems in the collection and treatment systems. The fact is that there is nothing acceptable to dispose of in the sewer system except normal wastewater. Some of the items that cause problems to us are cleaning wipes, paper towels, feminine hygiene products, scrubbers, grease, and "flushable" toilet cleaning pads. All the above mentioned items can cause sewer line blockages, they can plug pumps, and interfere with the sludge disposal process. One example this winter was a stainless steal scrubber that got caught on a pump impeller. It ruined the shaft of the pump, destroyed the pump seal, and cost the sewer users of Livermore Falls over \$3000 to fix. Please use the collection carefully, it can save you money.

There has been recent information about problems with fish in receiving waters being exposed to outdated medicine that has been disposed of in the sewer system. When we run our grit removal equipment at the plant it is amazing how many pills are present. To avoid future expenses relating to these discarded drugs, it would be a good idea to carefully dispose of these in your trash.

One other item worthwhile to mention is the use of low phosphorus cleaning supplies. We now meet our phosphorus limit, but the debate about the river is still going on and any change in our permit could make us start an expensive removal program. The less phosphorous we have in our system the better position we will be in.

The plant ran well again this year with no violations. Our biggest concerns for the future are increasing energy costs and an aging collection system. These two items will be the driving force in sewer rates in the next few years.

To the Citizens of Livermore Falls:

The Trustees of the Livermore Falls Water District hereby submit their report for the year ending December 31, 2007.

This past year we completed the Park Street Project. This project was part of our 20 year comprehensive improvement plan that was designed to improve fire flow and resolve the issues of old rusty cast iron mains. The footprint of this project included the installation of approximately 2.2 miles of new 12, 8 & 6 inch water mains along Park Street from Route 17 at Shuy Corner to the intersection of Main & Union, also included the upper Tree Street areas. We replaced 9 existing hydrants and added 2 for a total of 11 new hydrants, also forty new valves were installed. This was accomplished jointly by the efforts of the Livermore Falls Highway and Sewer Departments. The Jewell Street Project was also completed in 2007. This included replacing 1350 feet of 6"main, two new hydrants and six new valves. This was the completion of a two year project that was accomplished jointly by Jay Highway and Sewer Departments.

Throughout the year the following services were provided:

6 new services were installed.7 services were repaired.7 mains and hydrants were repaired.

2008 Annual Town Meeting Warrant

To: Ernest N. Steward, Jr., a constable of the Town of Livermore Falls, in the County of Androscoggin, in the State of Maine:

Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the voters of the Town of Livermore Falls in the County of Androscoggin, in the State of Maine, qualified by law to vote in Town affairs, to meet at the Livermore Falls Municipal Building in said Town of Livermore Falls on Tuesday, the 10th of June 2008 at 9:000'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles to wit:

Article 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Article 2. To choose by secret ballot in accordance with Title 30, M.R.S.A. Section 2061 all necessary Town Officials including one Selectman/Assessor for a two year term; one Selectman/Assessor for a three year term; three MSAD #36 School Board Directors for three year terms; one Clerk/Treasurer for a two year term.

Note: The polls will open at 9:00 o 'clock in the forenoon and close at 8:00 o'clock in the evening.

Article 3:	Shall the Town fix dates of October 22, 2008 and April 15, 2009 when taxes shall be due and payable and shall the Town fix a rate of 11% interest to be
	paid on taxes unpaid after said date?

Recommendation: That 11% per annum be charged commencing on October 23, 2008 on all ½ year payments not paid on or before October 22, 2008 and that 11% per annum be charged commencing on April 16, 2009 on all second ½ year payments not paid on or before April 15, 2009.

Article 4:	Shall the Town fix an interest rate of 5% on all taxes abated that have been paid in full, amount to be paid from the date the taxes were paid?
Article 5:	Shall the Town charge a 11% interest rate to any sewer assessments not paid within 60 days of the quarterly billing date?

Article 6:

Shall the Town authorize the Selectmen on behalf of the Town to retain, sell or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town for non-payment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they may deem advisable and in the Town's best interest, and to execute quit claim deeds for such property?

Article 7: Shall the Town authorize the Selectmen acting in their capacity as Sewer Trustees, to on the Town's behalf, retain, sell or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town for non-payment of sewer assessments thereon, on such terms as they may deem advisable and in the Town's best interest, and to execute quit claim deeds for such property?

Article 8: Shall the Town authorize the Selectmen on behalf of the Town, to accept or reject any and all gifts as they deem advisable, and to expend any monetary gifts on the designated purpose of that gift?

Article 9: Shall the Town authorize the Selectmen on behalf of the Town to apply for and accept State and Federal grants in the interest of improving the Town?

Article 10: Shall the Town authorize the Selectmen on behalf of the Town to dispose of excess surplus, or broken and unrepairable real and personal property of the Town, at their discretion? If the property has a value of over \$500.00, disposal must be a competitive bid process or auction. The Selectmen reserve the right to accept or reject any and all bids. The authority granted herein shall continue until revoked.
