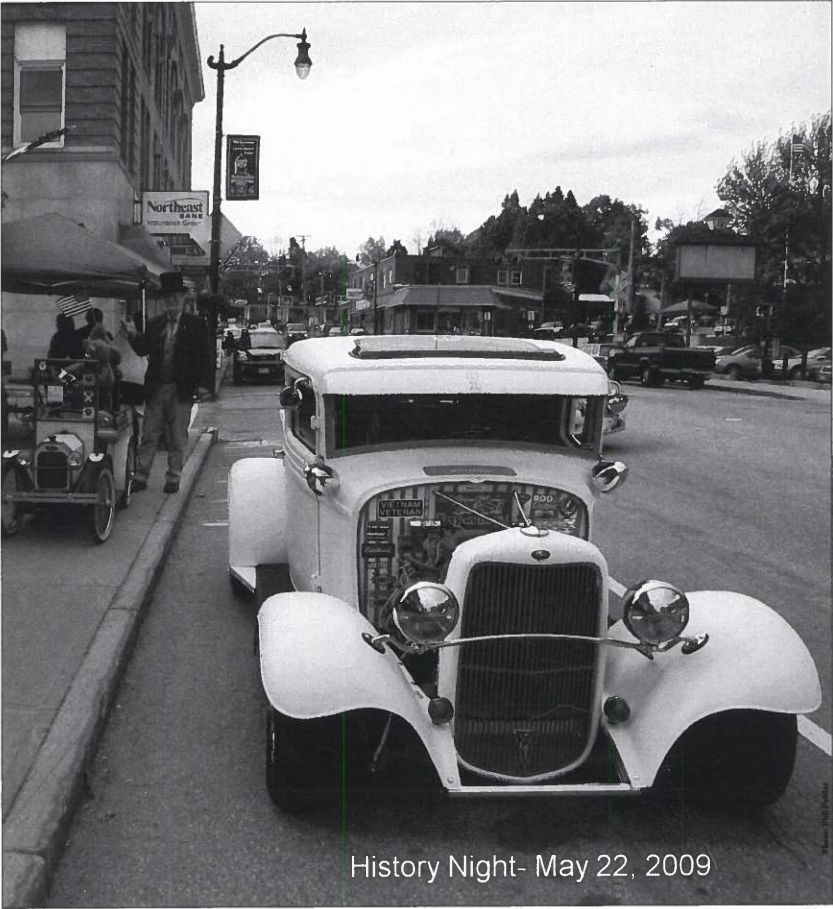

Dear Citizens of Livermore Falls:

In 2008, Mainers entrusted me to serve another term in the U.S. Senate. I am deeply honored and pledge to continue to work with my colleagues, both old and new, and with President Obama to forge bipartisan solutions to the economic crisis and the many other challenges facing our nation. I appreciate this opportunity to report on some highlights of my recent work in the U.S. Senate.

The number one priority continues to be to strengthen our struggling economy. We must look at additional ways to get our economy back on track. Last summer, I introduced an economic recovery bill, which included a proposal for \$50 billion in infrastructure funding to create jobs and improve our nation's aging transportation infrastructure. Anyone who drives in Maine recognizes the deteriorating state of many of our roads and bridges. Investing in our infrastructure not only creates jobs but also leaves communities with lasting and needed assets. My proposal also includes \$1 billion in additional funding for the Workforce Investment Act and tax incentives to help small businesses and to encourage energy conservation.

One of the energy provisions of the legislation was signed into law last year. It provides a \$300 tax credit to help individuals purchase clean-burning wood pellet stoves in order to provide an affordable alternative for heating their homes.

Soaring energy prices throughout much of 2008 highlight the critical need for our nation to achieve energy independence. As a nation, we should set a goal of energy independence by the year 2020—an ambitious goal that will require a multi-faceted approach, but one that can be achieved through resolve and commitment. I joined a bipartisan group of 20 Senators that has developed a comprehensive bill to expand production of American energy, promote conservation, and spur the development of alternative sources of energy. To immediately mitigate the effects of high prices, I fought to increase funding for programs that help our seniors and low-income families such as the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) and the Weatherization Assistance Program.


As the Ranking Member of the Senate Homeland Security Committee, I am committed to ensuring that our nation is as safe as possible and that government is prepared to respond to disasters. Maine certainly has had its share of natural disasters during the past year. This year, my homeland security priorities include renewing a port security law that I coauthored and strengthening security at labs containing dangerous pathogens.

Other priorities include supporting the vital work being done at Bath Iron Works, the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard, and other defense-related businesses throughout Maine – all of which are making significant contributions to our national security. We must also continue to improve and expand access to affordable health care – particularly in our rural communities – expand aid for education, protect our environment.

While this is just a brief summary of my recent work in Washington over the past several months, please know that I will continue to work as hard as possible representing Maine in the U.S. Senate. I am grateful for many blessings, including the opportunity to continue representing Livermore Falls and Maine in the United States Senate.

Dear Livermore Falls residents and friends,

This year, Mainers are facing some of the greatest challenges seen for several generations. As I travel across Maine, I hear from many people worried about losing their jobs, heating their homes, putting food on the table, and getting affordable health care.

The economic crisis affects us all as Americans. Here in Maine, we must continue to create new jobs and help our businesses develop new ideas and products.

In my first three terms as your Congressman, I have found and won funding for research, training, and job development. In 2007, I authored a bill, which became public law, to create a Northern Border Regional Commission. The NBRC will invest federal resources in economic development and job creation projects in the most economically distressed areas of Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, and northern New York. I have supported efforts to restore funding to the Small Business Administration to make sure it can offer Maine businessmen and women the capital they need to start and invest in their businesses. I have also secured substantial investments in federal research and development at the University of Maine, promoting valuable research and creating jobs throughout Maine.

There is still so much else to do. Raising the truck weight limits on Maine's interstate north of Augusta will help our businesses, cut fuel costs and emissions and make so many of our rural and secondary roads safer for our families.

We need to keep our promises to our veterans and make sure that their benefits and health care are there when they need them. As the Chairman of the Veterans Affairs Health Subcommittee, I have worked to make health care more accessible for rural veterans and to increase the overall spending for the Department of Veteran's Affairs. In 2008, I sponsored HR 1824, the Montgomery GI Bill Expansion, to expand the scope of educational assistance under the Montgomery GI Bill so it may be used to obtain a commercial motor vehicle operator license.

Finally, my staff and I remain committed to providing quality constituent services whether it is help with cutting through red tape or a question about federal programs and benefits. ## 2009 Legislative Update from Senator John Nutting



Dear Citizens of Livermore Falls:

As your State Senator from District 17 to the 124th Maine Legislature, it gives me great pleasure to update you once again on some of the issues that are currently being debated at the State House in Augusta.

One of the top priorities I am focusing on this session is our economy. While many other states across the country are experiencing double-digit unemployment right now, Maine's economy is actually stronger than most. Despite our situation, many people are still hurting and need a job or more money in their pockets to make ends meet. Following the efforts I started last session, I am working hard again to eliminate non-essential advisory and political appointee positions in state government and trying to find ways to reduce Maine's overall tax burden. Any work we do to eliminate positions, programs, or services must be thoughtful to the needs of our most vulnerable citizens like the elderly, mentally ill, and the disabled. We must keep a strong safety net to support these citizens who may have no one else to fall back on.

As our state's budget revenue shortfall grows, I am working hard to protect revenue sharing to municipalities. While I fully recognize tough budget choices need to be made, I also believe that it is the state's job to support our local communities during this recession.

As we move forward through this economic downturn, now more than ever it is important for you to stay informed about the decisions your state government is making. Dear Friends and Neighbors:

I would like to thank you for the honor of representing this community at the Capitol during the 124th Maine State Legislature. Being your voice at the State House is an honor and a duty I take very seriously. I will continue to keep you well-informed of legislative matters and please remember that I am always available to address your questions and concerns.

For my second legislative term, I have been reappointed to the Joint Standing Committee on Taxation. My top priority is to implement a template for real tax reform, which would include lowering the income tax from 8.5% to a flat tax of no more than 6%. This plan would double the Homestead Exemption and lower property taxes. In addition, I have sponsored several pieces of legislation aimed at reducing the tax burden for Mainers, such as exempting military pensions and the proceeds of severance pay for displaced factory workers from Maine's income tax. I have also submitted a bill to have the motor vehicle excise tax be based on 90% of the manufacturer's suggested retail price rather than the full amount in order to more closely reflect what folks actually pay for their vehicles.

Additionally, there is another issue that all of us in Livermore Falls would like to see resolved. The rebuilding of Rt. 4 needs to get underway so we can deal with not only the horrible condition of the road, but also the problems with the antiquated sewage lines. This is a matter that is definitely at the top of my agenda.

I would like to thank our Town Office Staff, Police and Dispatch, our volunteer Fire Dept., Highway Department, Sewer Dept. and Transfer station for the fine job that they do. I want to also thank them for working safely, for again this year we received a rebate from our workers compensation insurance for a good safety record. We should also acknowledge our Superintendent of Schools, teachers and staff of SAD #36 and the School Board for providing an excellent education for our children.

We also have a great group of volunteers who are willing to share their time and talents for the benefit of us all. Thank you to our Budget Committee and Planning Board and the Downtown Livermore Falls Betterment Group as well as special task committees. Volunteer!! It's good for our town and will give you a different perspective on town affairs.

We have some great things happening here in Livermore Falls! The façade grant committee is working with the architect on the CDGB grant that was recently awarded to our Town. You will soon be seeing a new face on some of our downtown buildings. 1-2-3- Copies and Learning Center has opened in the bank building and provides some great services. Be sure to check them out! A bakery will be opening on Depot Street in the Mason block, and a new pizza shop will open their doors on the opposite side of the street. Some of our Betterment Group Committee members have been busy working with vendors to develop a mini-mall on the second floor of the bank building. Now is a great time for all of us to "*take pride*" in our community and take advantage of what we have here in our town. We all need to work together to make our community successful. 

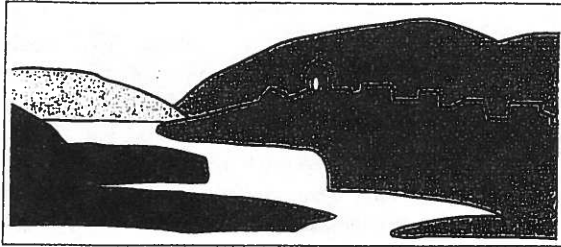

I would like to begin by thanking every member of the Livermore Falls Fire Department for the immense dedication and commitment they have given to our community over the past year. With full time jobs and families at home the members still make time to do the numerous hours of training that is required. They put their personal lives on hold in order to respond to emergencies for the safety of our community. I would also like to thank the Town Manager, Select board, Town Clerk, Dawn Young, Susan Sapiel, Police Department, Dispatchers, Northstar Ambulance, Highway Department, Water District, Mutual Aid Departments and Citizens. Last but not least, the families of the Fire Dept. members for their involvement & continued support of the Fire Dept. and its members.

In the past year, we sponsored Danielle Leclerc, Chris Remington, and Jayde Purington in the Firefighter 1 & 2 Training Program at the Mt. Blue Vocational Training Center. We also sponsored Nixon Ortiz in a Firefighter 1 & 2 Program given by the Lakes Region Mutual Aid Fire Depts.

The Department has 8 members that have achieved Firefighter 1 State Certification and some of those members achieved Firefighter 1 & 2 State Certification this past year. This is a tremendous accomplishment given the Hundreds of unpaid hours it took for the Certifications. The Fire Department is now 100% compliant with the National Incident Management System.

**REMINDER**, It is strongly encouraged all residents have a working smoke detector on all levels of the home and to change the batteries at least once a year.

Other than a contained campfire that is used for cooking or warming on your own property, all outside burning requires a permit.

To the Town Manager, Selectmen and Citizens;

In 2008 the Livermore Falls Police Department received and responded to 4114 calls for emergencies and/or assistance. In addition, 257 arrests were made, 373 criminal summonses issued, 506 traffic summons issued and 1572 traffic warnings and/or defects were issued.

Our dispatch center handled over 5612 radio calls for police service and 812 for fire/rescue in 2008. This does not include the phone calls that initiated the radio traffic or calls and inquiries of none emergency nature that are handled by the dispatchers, as well as walk in inquiries at the dispatch center.

Officer Stephen Allen of Livermore was hired 4/20/2008 to fill the vacant position of Officer Caton who left to take a full-time position in the National Guard. Officer Allen graduated the Maine Criminal Justice Academy 12/19/2008 first in his class. Officer Stephen Allen was originally hired 11/27/2007 as a reserve officer.

To the Citizen's of Livermore Falls,

Well another tough winter this year also, like Maine winters used to be, the highway department had a tough year again with break downs, we had to put a new transmission in one truck, and keep repairing a couple others to get through the winter.

Our paving we did last fall came out very well, we put the base coat on the last section of Moose hill rd, Reclaimed 2900 ft. on the Haines corner road and put down cold mix, reclaimed the Jug hill rd. and put cold mix on this road also.

In August there was a wash out on the Haines corner rd. We had the existing box culvert slipped lined and then we repaired the damage this was very expensive but fortunately F E M A reimbursed the town 90% of the cost.

The paving request this year is to put the surface coat on the tree st. and Moose hill rd. We started to rebuild part of Strickland loop rd. last fall we want to finish this spring and pave the first 1000'.

Our request for capital improvement's includes final funding for the purchase of two new plow truck this year, these truck would replace three of our oldest truck's a 1989 GMC wheeler, 1989 Ford L-8000 4x4 and 1991 GMC plow truck. These two new truck would be used year round instead of sitting in the shop all summer like the 1989 and 1991 do right now.

Our participation in the SOLAR program since March of 2006 has made a big difference in the book circulation statistics at Treat Memorial Library.

Since joining the Van Delivery service in 2006, we have been receiving one delivery per week on Thursday. This lets us send and receive material for a fraction of the cost of mailing them through the U.S. Postal Service. We pay an estimated \$600.00 per year for the van, compared to approximately \$2.50 per book through the Postal Service. We feel this is a big advantage for the library.

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## TAX COLLECTORS REPORT

Under the July 1 through June 30 fiscal accounting period, annual reports must be prepared and printed prior to the end of the fiscal period and before the post annual audit can be started. May 1st through April 31st has been selected as the most reasonable reporting period that can be offered to the voters for comparative information purposes.

Taxes are committed to the Tax Collector at the time the annual bills are mailed out and at the expiration of eight to twelve months any unpaid balances are placed on lien and turned over to the Treasurer for collection. Any liens which are not paid in full with interest and recording fees foreclose after eighteen months and become the property of the Town. The Treasurer and the Tax Collector accept partial or installment payments in order to assist taxpayers to avoid liens and foreclosures.

## 2008 Sewer Department Report

This past year we treated 226 million gallons of wastewater and achieved a 93% removal of all pollutants. Repairs are increasing as our new plant approaches 10 years old. This summer we will have to rebuild several pieces of equipment that have over 40000 hours of use.

The cost of replacing old sewer lines has risen from being around \$40 per foot just a few years ago, to around \$80 per foot. This has put a severe strain on our sewer budgets and has made it necessary to raise rates. Last year we had the misfortune of having the Franklin Street sewer line collapse directly under the railroad tracks. The process started in June to get the line repaired. It was the beginning of December when we finally got permission to replace the pipe. All it took was 6 months and around \$20000 to get this project completed. We replaced the entire length of Pearl Street, with the help of the highway department, for under \$10000. Main Street which was supposed to be done with the help of stimulus money was once again put on hold for a future date.

When a cleaning product is labeled as flushable or biodegradable it promotes the idea it should be flushed when disposed of. These products are not treatment plant or collection system friendly and cause damage and many expensive problems in the system. Please help save money and only dispose of wastewater in the sewer. One other helpful thing sewer users can do is to use low or no phosphorus cleaning products. This will help prevent the installation of expensive phosphorus removal equipment at the treatment plant.

There are some environmental groups that would like you to believe that the Androscoggin River should be reclassified as class-B. As long as Gulf Island Dam is in place the river has zero chance of meeting class-B standards. This would be a huge financial problem for not only our treatment plant but for all the dischargers that provide jobs and money for the local economy. Let your representatives know that common sense and science do not support the change in class of the river. This is my 34<sup>th</sup> year working on the river and the improvements have been dramatic. Very little odor, no more foam, an improvement in color, and the fishing is great. The river can now be enjoyed by all, and we don't need to let special interest groups turn it into a liability.

To the citizens of Livermore Falls:

The Trustees of the Livermore Falls Water District hereby submit their annual report for the year ending December 31, 2008.

This past year we did not take on any major water main replacement contracts but instead focused our attention on smaller in house projects.

- Pearl Street in which 200ft. of both water and sewer main were replaced. This was accomplished jointly by the Highway Department, Sewer Department and Water District personnel.
- Bean Street was another project accomplished jointly where 400ft. of water main was replaced.
- School Street where 600ft. of 6" water main was replaced to discontinue old cast iron main and to improve fire flows.

These projects were part of our comprehensive plan in which to date we have replaced about ten miles of old water main with approximately six miles remaining.


Additional services provided throughout the year:

- 2 new water services were installed.
- 8 existing water services were replaced.
- 16 existing water services were repaired.
- 4 water mains were repaired.
- 3 hydrants were replaced.

Community outreach programs have continued to grow:

- This year during National Drinking Water Week in May the National Theater for Children was retained for performances. We sponsored one showing at the Jay Elementary facility and two showings at Livermore Elementary.
- In September of this year we resumed tours of the treatment facilities. These tours were discontinued for a time due to security reasons after 9/11. Our hope is to continue with these types of outreach programs.

To: Ernest N. Steward, Jr., a constable of the Town of Livermore Falls, in the County of Androscoggin, in the State of Maine:

### Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the voters of the Town of Livermore Falls in the County of Androscoggin, in the State of Maine, qualified by law to vote in Town affairs, to meet at the Livermore Falls Municipal Building in said Town of Livermore Falls on Tuesday, the 9<sup>th</sup> of June 2009 at 9:00 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles to wit:

**Article 1.** To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

**Article 2.** To choose by secret ballot in accordance with Title 30, M.R.S.A. Section 2061 all necessary Town Officials including one Selectman/Assessor for a two year term; one Selectman/Assessor for a three year term; one Selectman/Assessor for a one year term; two MSAD #36 School Board Directors for a three year term and one MSAD #36 School Board Director for a one year term..

Note: The polls will open at 9:00 o'clock in the forenoon and close at 8:00 o'clock in the evening.

<b>Article 3:</b>	Shall the Town fix dates of October 21, 2009 and March 24, 2010 when taxes shall be due and payable and shall the Town fix a rate of 9% interest to be paid on taxes unpaid after said date?
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**Recommendation:** That 9% per annum be charged commencing on October 22, 2009 on all ½ year payments not paid on or before October 21, 2009 and that 9% per annum be charged commencing on March 25, 2010 on all second ½ year payments not paid on or before March 24, 2010.

<b>Article 4:</b>	Shall the Town fix an interest rate of 5% on all taxes abated that have been paid in full, amount to be paid from the date the taxes were paid?
