Dear Town of Livermore Falls:

As the new session of Congress began, I was honored to become the longest, currently serving member of the U.S. Senate to have never missed a roll call vote. As the 111th Congress ended, I cast my 4,563th consecutive vote. It is a privilege to represent you in Washington, D.C. and I appreciate this opportunity to share some of my recent work as we look forward to the opportunities and challenges that lie ahead in the 112th Congress.

Creating jobs and strengthening our economy remain our nation's most pressing challenges. Far too many families and individuals throughout Maine and our nation are still suffering from a sluggish economy and high unemployment. That is why it was so vital for Congress to extend the 2001 and 2003 tax relief laws. I strongly supported a two-year extension because allowing these laws to expire would have resulted in one of the largest tax increases in our nation's history, and job killing tax hikes could well have plunged our economy deeper into recession.

Last year, I spoke to small business owners throughout Maine who told me that a tax increase could result in a loss of jobs and threaten the viability of their businesses. It is good news that Congress passed the two-year extension of these tax relief laws before 2010 came to a close, providing more certainty to businesses and relief for all taxpayers.

After years of repeated but unsuccessful attempts by the Maine delegation to address the federal truck weights law, I authored a successful truck weights pilot program in 2009 that was in effect for one year. The pilot program permitted trucks weighing up to 100,000 pounds to travel on Maine's federal interstates, where these trucks belong, rather than being diverted to secondary roads, through small communities, downtown areas, and school zones. The benefits have been evident: improved safety, lower costs, reduced energy use, and reduced emissions. I was disappointed that the U.S. House of Representatives failed to take action either to extend the pilot program or to make it permanent. Making the truck weights program permanent will be one of my top priorities this year and will be the first bill I introduce in the new Congress.

The President signed into law a number of bills that I authored or coauthored. I was proud to join Senator Joe Lieberman in leading the effort to repeal the so-called "Don't Ask, Don't Tell" law that applied to our armed forces. This long-overdue repeal enables the U.S to join 35 of our closest allies in welcoming the military service of any qualified individual who is willing and capable of serving our country.

My efforts to counter the smuggling of illegal drugs across the Canadian border into Maine, and vice versa, were advanced when the President signed the "Northern Border Counternarcotics Strategy Act." I was the lead Republican sponsor of this law, which requires the Office of National Drug Control Policy to develop a counternarcotics strategy similar to that of the Southwestern border in collaboration with our Canadian partners. The Senate Homeland Security Committee also conducted an extensive investigation into the Fort Hood terrorist attack. We will soon release a report with recommendations on how to reduce the possibility of such an attack in the future.

Former Senator Evan Bayh and I authored a new law that establishes a new Advisory Council to develop a national plan for combating Alzheimer's disease. For the first time, this law charges federal agencies to develop a strategy to advance efforts to fight this devastating disease, at no additional cost to taxpayers. As far too many people know, Alzheimer's disease inflicts pain and hardship on families, and costs Medicare and Medicaid billions, yet our nation has been lacking a national strategy to focus on this disease.

Maine's natural resource industries are essential to our prosperity. Last October, along with other Delegation members, I testified at an International Trade Commission hearing that resulted in a ruling that Chinese and Indonesian paper companies had been engaging in illegal trade that is unfair to our domestic industry. During the debate on the Food Safety Modernization Act, I successfully advocated for an amendment, backed by Maine's small and organic farmers, to protect our small farms from excessive regulation.

In my ongoing efforts to save jobs in Maine, I succeeded in convincing the EPA to rework regulations known as "boiler MACT" in a manner that protects the environment and public health without jeopardizing jobs in the forest products industry. I also authored successful legislation to provide small contractors more time to comply with EPA lead-based paint regulations. The high fines for non-compliance would have put many small contractors in Maine out of business.

Working with the University of Maine, I helped advance the development of deep water, off-shore wind energy. Last summer, Energy Secretary Steven Chu visited UMaine at my request, which resulted in an announcement that the Department would dedicate \$20 million to develop and test deepwater offshore wind technologies. UMaine remains on the cutting edge of this work, which has the potential to create 15,000 jobs.

I secured funding for a number of important transportation projects in 2010. For example, following my request, U.S. Transportation Secretary Ray LaHood announced that the Department would award \$10.5 million for Maine's effort to save freight railroad service in Northern Maine, and \$20 million for the rehabilitation of the Memorial Bridge between Kittery and Portsmouth.

As a member of the Senate Armed Services Committee, I worked to ensure that our men and women in uniform have the resources and support they need to protect our freedom. In 2010, I supported efforts to improve health care and other services for our military personnel and veterans, and authored key provisions to strengthen our national defense by supporting the vital work at Bath Iron Works, the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard, Pratt & Whitney, the Maine Military Authority, and other Maine industries. Following my letter last year to the President's top budget official urging him to include increased funding for the DDG-51 program in next year's budget, Defense Secretary Gates recently announced that the Pentagon would seek an additional DDG-51 in its five-year budget.

The 112th Congress will bring extraordinary challenges as we work to improve the economy, lower the unemployment rate, seek ways to reduce federal spending to bring the federal debt under control, and debate a host of other important issues. I am grateful for the opportunity to serve the Town of Livermore Falls and Maine in the United States Senate. Dear Livermore Falls residents and friends,

Maine continues to face many challenges. As I travel across our state, I am inspired by stories of innovation and entrepreneurship, yet there is much more we need to do to improve our economy and create jobs.

That is why I am working so hard to improve our nation's trade policies and ensure that Mainers are competing on a level playing field. I was especially pleased that the International Trade Commission found in favor of U.S. paper manufacturers and their workers who filed a petition against Chinese and Indonesian companies that illegally dumped subsidized paper into our market. I worked hard to support this petition, and the tariffs that now apply to these imports will help keep Maine companies competitive and allow them to create and retain good paying jobs.

Our state is also making important strides in developing the types of jobs and economic opportunities that can only be done here in Maine. For example, when Eastport partnered with a U.S.-based company to act as an embarkation port for 500 dairy heifers heading to Turkey, congressional efforts were able to help cut through red tape and bureaucratic challenges. Moreover, the entire bipartisan congressional delegation has successfully urged the federal permitting agency to begin the process for a long-term certification of the Port of Eastport as a livestock exportation facility.

To that end, I cosponsored and helped pass into law last year the "America COMPETES Act," which will create jobs through innovative technology loan guarantees for small and mid-sized manufacturers. I was pleased that two amendments I offered also made it into the final bill ensuring that when implementing the bill federal agencies work together to prioritize the needs of small businesses and that those communities most hurt by our trade agreements will be given special consideration. There are too many small businesses that are struggling to survive, and we must listen to these independent owners when they tell us what they need to grow and create jobs.

Annual Report to the Town of Livermore Falls A Message from Senator Garrett P. Mason

Dear Friends and Neighbors:

It is an honor to represent you in the Maine Senate, and I am grateful for the trust you have placed in me to work for the betterment of our region.

The State of Maine, like many of us, is experiencing tough economic times. Currently the state is facing an estimated \$800 million revenue shortfall for the next two-year budget. In order to bring the budget into balance, the Governor, along with the Legislature, must make some significant changes in the way state services are delivered and how taxpayer money is spent. We are committed to crafting a budget that reins in the unsustainable growth of state government, prioritizes core services like public health and safety, education, a safety net for our most vulnerable citizens, and our transportation infrastructure. Despite the challenges we face, this is an opportunity to make state government more efficient, reduce the size of the bureaucracy, carefully review the effectiveness of current programs, and set Maine on a new course.

One of our first orders of business when the 125th Legislature convened in December was the passage of LD 1, An Act To Ensure Regulatory Fairness and Reform. The bill recognizes that one of the biggest impediments to job creation and keeping our young people in Maine is the regulatory burden the state currently imposes on business. Given this, LD 1 proposes to reach out to businesses and workers to identify duplicative and unnecessary regulations and eliminate or propose changes to these regulations in order to improve the business climate and encourage job creation and retention and expand opportunities for Maine people.

I am hopeful that by reining in state spending, prioritizing our wants and needs and developing strategies for improving our business climate, we can put Maine back on track toward prosperity and create the opportunities that will keep our young people here in Maine.

On behalf of the Board of Directors, thank you for your generous support of the Livermore Falls Downtown Betterment Group. Through the membership of over 23 individual and business members and with citizen approval of \$1000 from the town, we have a bank balance of just over \$4000. Our goal is to reinvest every penny of it into the town, in part, through a program launched this year called, "Take Pride Initiative." One thousand dollars has been put aside in matching funds for downtown businesses to access when they invest in the beautification of their properties. This year also saw the growth of our relationship with the Androscoggin Land Trust through Chisholm Trails (www.chisholmtrailsmaine.org) and other community groups to push for a multi-use trail system connecting the Whistle Stop Trail to downtown Livermore Falls. As an off shoot to this project, we supported the town's Safe Routes to Schools grant application to MDOT. This grant would allow us to build sidewalks that will connect the high school and middle school to the trails.

Our Economic Development committee has been hard at work gathering data and designing a marketing plan which includes the "Doing Business in Livermore Falls" promotional brochure that is available in the town office, online and through the JLLF Chamber of Commerce. Their next item of business is to conduct a space analysis, mapping assets and vacancies to use for business attraction.

Several members of the Betterment Group sat on the Public Facilities Committee; formed to ask needed questions and to ultimately lend support to Franklin Memorial Hospital's bid to expand services in this area through a new Medical Arts Center. I took the Fire Chief's position at the end of June 2010, since then we have examined our operations, fleet, and building. We have taken steps to improve our management team to run our department that consist of 31 employees. We improved our radio communications to better serve you and for the safety of the employees serving in the Public Safety Departments. We have realigned our fleet and deleted obsolete equipment. We are planning for future fleet purchases to provide the same services with fewer vehicles. We have examined our retention and hiring for the department and have reinforced a strong harmonious work place environment for current employees while attracting new candidates. We are creating interdepartmental infrastructure that will continue supporting the Fire Department to keep evolving with the changing times and continually delivering high quality service. We have strengthened our relationship with all town departments with in our community. Lastly, we have become major supporters of creating policies and emergency ground tactics used regionally with our neighboring communities to provide safe and seamless response to incidents.

To the Town Manager, Selectmen and Citizens;

In 2010 the Livermore Falls Police Department received and responded to 3954 calls for emergencies and/or assistance. In addition, 115 arrests were made, 203 criminal summonses issued, 114 traffic summons issued and 1662 traffic warnings and/or defects were issued.

The dispatching for the police department has been fully intergraded with the County Dispatch and we are now connected to the county dispatch record system. This conversion to the County Records system has created some issues in the attached activity report. The bottom line totals are accurate but the categories had to be blended with the new ones. The other problem was that half the records this year were on the in house system and had to be converted to match the County System then added to it.

Sergeant Joseph Sage resigned 11/7/2010 as a full-time officer to go to work at Rumford PD. We are currently reviewing applications to fill his position. He has asked to remain on this department as a reserve officer. In order to keep costs down and maintain an adequate Police response, the Administrative Assistants' position has been removed from the next budget. As of <u>July 1, 2011 THE LOBBY WILL BE CLOSED IF YOU COME TO THE OFFICE TO SEE AN OFFICER, USE THE CALL BOX ON THE WALL AT THE RAMP ENTRANCE.</u>

2010 Public Works Report

The Highway Department had a very successful year with getting our road projects completed. We replaced the culverts on the Record Road and Rampart Bituminous reclaimed the existing road in place and put cold mix asphalt on. We also reclaimed Strickland Loop Road and put cold mix asphalt on this road.

This winter has been a challenge with having the work force reduced; fortunately we have some great spare drivers to help out with plowing and hauling snow. The crew is doing an excellent job on taking care of the roads and the equipment. We did have a break down on the snow blower which set us back a couple weeks, but that has been the only major break down we have had this winter. We have had 22 events to date and have used 1600 yards of sand and 500 tons of salt.

Residents of Livermore Falls have benefited from some joint services we have with our surrounding communities. For the past couple years we have joined Jay and Wilton on purchases of road culverts, paint for our cross walks and winter sand. All three Towns shared equipment and man power on street sweeping; this benefited our Town with having the ability for our small crew to complete more tasks.

This year we would like to replace our 1994 backhoe, it has 8000 hours on it and is need of some major repairs. I believe it will still bring some value for trade-in to save a little money on a purchase of a new machine. Our paving this year will be a shim and overlay on the Campground Road. starting at the Jug Hill Road and going as far as we can with the funds we have.

Capital improvements is something we have to start doing in Livermore Falls such as sidewalk replacement and storm drains. This is all very expensive but is something that has to been done in the very near future.

2010 Transfer Station Report

The single sort recycling has gone very well. Our recycling has increased. Our amount of household trash has dropped by 25 ton per month and we are currently paying \$56.85 a ton for household waste and there is no tipping fee on recyclables. We are trying to get maximum compaction in the containers to save on hauling costs, sometimes we can not get a truck here soon enough to swap out the containers so we have to put trash or recyclables in the old building until we get a new container swapped out.

I believe the reduction for household trash is due in part to the new hours and being able to monitor the contract haulers at our facility. Last year we did a Household hazardous waste collection day with the Town of Jay, we had several residents participate in this program and have just set the date for this year of June 4 at the Jay transfer station.

TAX COLLECTORS REPORT

Under the July 1 through June 30 fiscal accounting period, annual reports must be prepared and printed prior to the end of the fiscal period and before the post annual audit can be started. May 1st through April 31st has been selected as the most reasonable reporting period that can be offered to the voters for comparative information purposes.

Taxes are committed to the Tax Collector at the time the annual bills are mailed out and at the expiration of eight to twelve months any unpaid balances are placed on lien and turned over to the Treasurer for collection. Any liens which are not paid in full with interest and recording fees foreclose after eighteen months and become the property of the Town. The Treasurer and the Tax Collector accept partial or installment payments in order to assist taxpayers to avoid liens and foreclosures.

2010 Sewer Department Report

In 2010 the Livermore Falls Treatment Plant treated 200,000,000 gallons of wastewater with no violations of our State or Federal discharge license. The State requires 85% of all pollutants be removed. We averaged over 93% removal. We processed 1,786,800 gallons of sludge, which resulted in 198.5 tons of dewatered material. This was transported to New England Organics in Unity to be composted and recycled into useable topsoil. We also used over 2000 gallon of hypochlorite to reduce bacteria levels in the effluent to meet discharge limits. All in all the plant ran very well. I have two great helpers in Tom and Nels, which makes my job much easier.

Everything is now in place for the Main Street sewer project to proceed this summer. The only thing to say is, "better late than never".

We had a dry summer with lower than average river flows. It was feared that the river would have some algae blooms caused by the higher concentration of phosphorus during low flow conditions. The blooms did not happen and we don't look for any changes in our phosphorus limits. This is good news but we would still like to see sewer users buy the low phosphorus

products for home use.

Our old collection system is bothersome on an almost weekly basis. Some of the problems are unavoidable root infestation, but more frequently the problem is caused by material that is flushed down home drains. Sewer users should put nothing down their drains but normal waste. No handiwipes, no feminine hygiene products, no flushable toilet pads, no paper towels, no grease. Just water and waste period!! The cost to take care of these unwanted materials is significant and is passed on to the sewer users. So save yourself money and use the waste system wisely.

The Trustees of the Livermore Falls Water District hereby submit this annual report for the year ending December 31, 2010.

This past year we did not take on any major water main replacement contracts but instead focused our attention on in house projects. The next expected replacement and/or upgrade is the 1.1 miles of water main included in the MDOT Main St. project which is projected to go out to bid in February of 2011.

In House projects:

-Installed three new 6" gate valves on Millet, Green and Monroe Streets.

These are valves needed for isolation purposes to minimize distribution of service in preparation for the Main St. Project was at it is accomply hed -Installed a new hydrant at the VFW on Rt. 133 in Jay. Free flow was increased due to the fact that the old existing hydrant was off a 6" of main and the new hydrant was tapped into a 12" AC main.

- Removed an old existing hydrant and replaced it with a new one on Spring Street in Livermore Falls.

Operational upgrade projects:

- Replaced the existing 800ff. of faulty underground electrical service to the Baldwin Hill storage tank with a new overhead service. This upgrade was accomplished through the cooperation of New England Telephone Company who abandoned and transferred ownership of their existing line poles to the District.

Community outreach programs:

- Unfortunately again this year we were unable to retain the services of the National Children's Theater Group during National Drinking Water Week in May. We have used there talents in the past with great success to bring about an awareness as to the importance of conservation and water quality to youth threw out the communities of Jay and Livermore Falls. The DWP's rules are that a community that request the services of this theater group for the first time are put at the top of the list so we lost out. We will continue to support, sponsor and expand these programs as much as possible.
