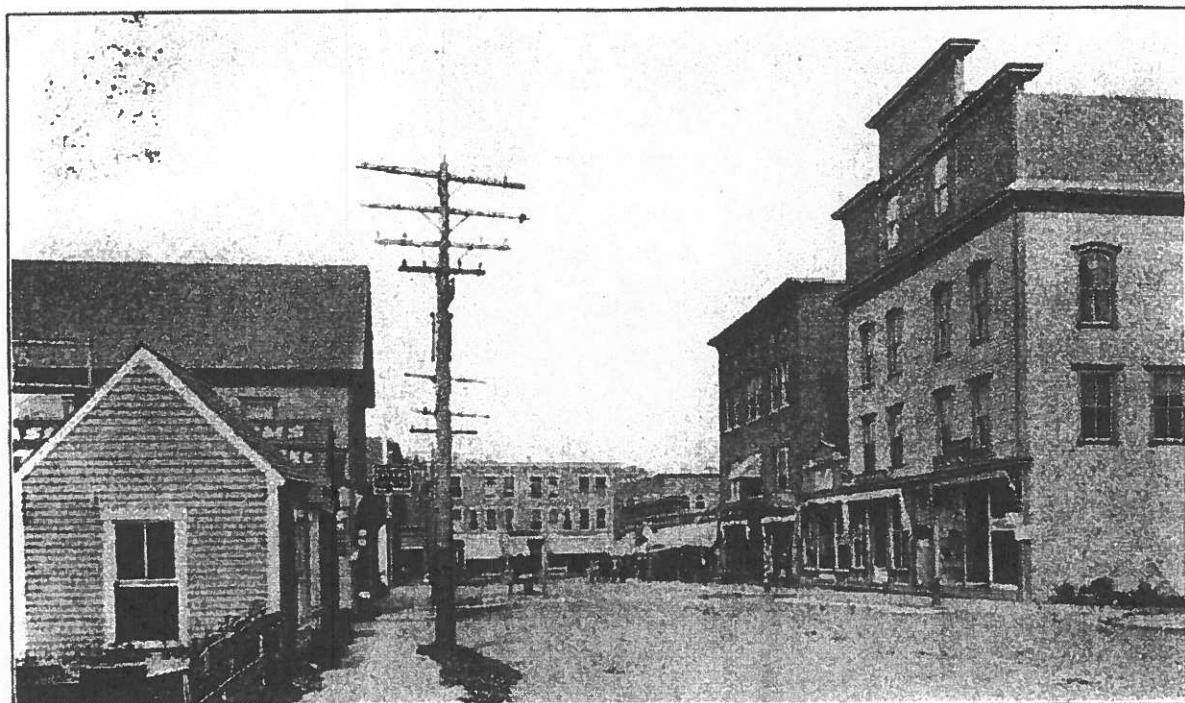

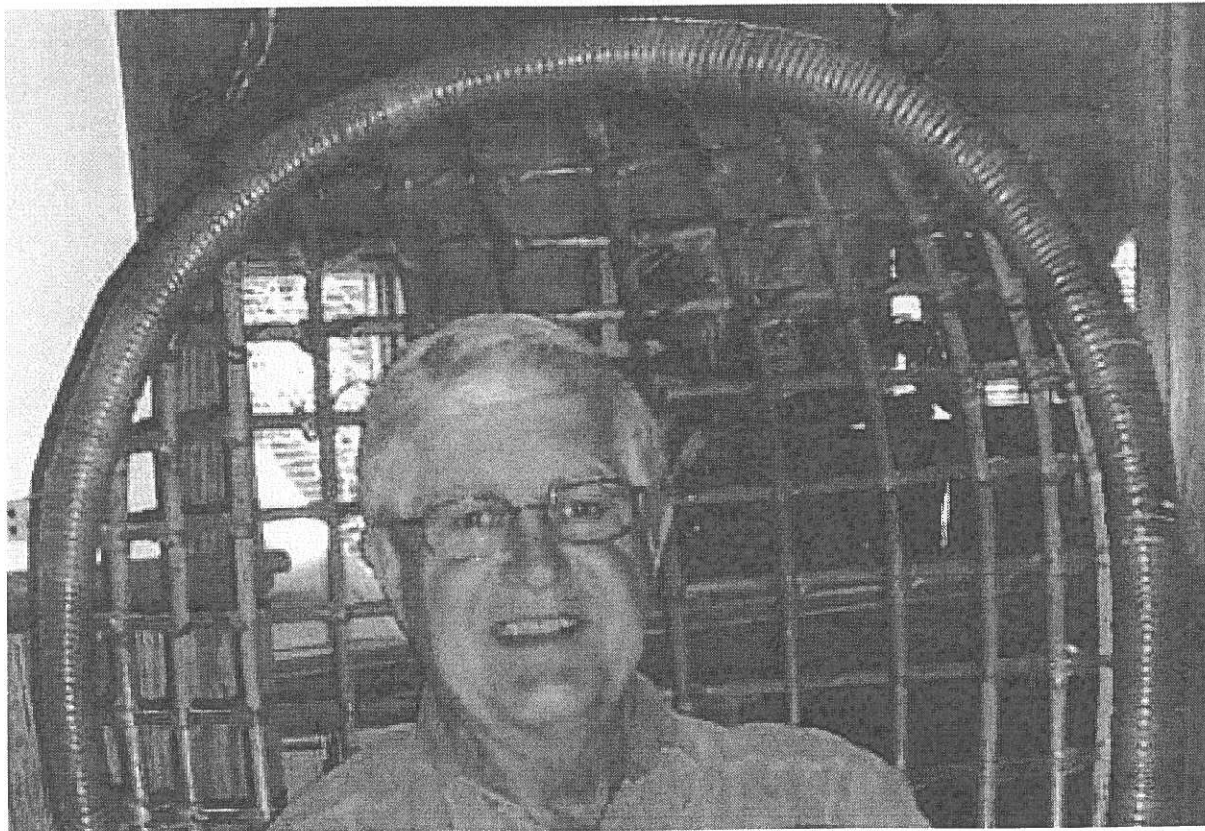



I share that frustration and anger. And I hope you will work with me to forge a brighter future worthy of the greatest nation on Earth, bearing in mind as we move forward that economic and homeland security cannot be mutually exclusive. In that light, we remember today – and every day – the extraordinary service and sacrifice of our brave servicemen and women in Iraq, Afghanistan, and around the world who comprise the finest defense force on the planet.

Dear Friends,

As we begin a new year, I welcome this opportunity to share some of my recent work for the people of our great state.

The economy and jobs remain my highest priorities. More efficient transportation is essential to our economic growth. After a years-long, hard-fought battle, I successfully pushed through Congress a bill I wrote to allow the heaviest trucks to travel on Maine's federal interstates, instead of forcing them to use our secondary roads and downtown streets. This will make our streets safer, reduce fuel consumption, and allow our businesses to be more competitive. I was pleased to have the support of many Maine groups, from the Maine State Police and the Parent-Teacher Association to the Maine Motor Transport Association and many others that helped me advocate for this sensible change.

I was also successful in my efforts to prevent the federal government from limiting certain vegetables, including Maine's potatoes, in school meal programs. Nationwide this ill-conceived proposal would have cost our schools, the states, and families an estimated \$6.8 billion over five years. I built support from both sides of the aisle and from across the country to ensure that schools maintain the flexibility they need to serve students healthy and affordable meals. This proposed rule was a prime example of excessive Washington regulation.

In my effort to protect jobs, I also introduced bipartisan legislation to ensure that the proposed EPA regulations known as the "Boiler MACT" rules protect the environment and public health without jeopardizing jobs in our state, particularly in the forest products industry. I also continued to help advance the development of deep water, off-shore wind energy at the University of Maine, which has the potential to provide clean energy and to create thousands of new jobs.

On the Armed Services Committee, I worked to secure funding for shipbuilding at Bath Iron Works, submarine overhauls at Portsmouth Naval Shipyard, and the manufacturing of aircraft engines at Pratt and Whitney, as well as to strengthen the 101st Air Refueling Wing in Bangor and the Maine Military Authority in Limestone. The new defense funding bill also includes my amendment to expedite the claims of veterans with



severe disabilities like the soldier I met who is suffering from ALS, also known as Lou Gehrig's disease.

Last year, the President signed legislation I coauthored creating a national plan for combating Alzheimer's disease, which affects more than five million Americans and their families. In another health-related development, at my urging, the Food and Drug Administration allowed clinical trials to begin on the artificial pancreas, a device that could dramatically improve the health and quality of life for people with Type I diabetes.

Many Mainers have contacted me to express concern about the Postal Service, which is the linchpin of a nearly \$1 trillion mailing industry that employs 8.6 million people. I've sponsored bipartisan legislation to rescue the U.S. Postal Service from financial failure next year. This bill provides flexibility to the USPS to restructure itself in an effort to save billions of dollars and preserve universal postal service for all Americans, no matter where they live.

In December, I cast my 4,825th consecutive vote, making me the longest currently serving Senator never to have missed a vote. I am grateful for the opportunity to serve the Town of Livermore Falls and Maine in the United States Senate.

Dear Livermore Falls residents and friends,

These days I'm as frustrated as anyone with the partisan gridlock in Washington. Even the most routine congressional functions, such as passing budgets, are caught up in irresponsible political games. One way to stop this is a bill I am pushing that would make sure members of Congress wouldn't get paid if they fail to pass budget and appropriation bills on time. It is time for Congress to get serious and show some common sense.

Yet, despite congressional dysfunction, I'm pleased to report progress on a number of initiatives important to Maine. Last year, Congress passed the Small Business Jobs Act, which included my amendment to ensure Maine small business lending agencies qualified for funding under the bill. As a result, Maine received \$13.2 million last September to support small business development. Since a requirement of the funding was to match every federal dollar with 10 additional dollars, that one investment is expected to spur \$132 million in small business lending in our state.


My work in support of our nation's veterans continues to be very important to me. Last October, the House passed a measure I authored to ensure that severely disabled and elderly veterans are able to get the care they need at Maine's state veterans' homes. I'm pleased that it passed unanimously in the House, and I'm hopeful the Senate acts on it soon.

We still have much work to do to create jobs and grow our national and state economies. Last year, I visited many Maine manufacturers and received a tremendous amount of valuable feedback. After these visits, and having heard back from over 85 Maine companies that filled out an online survey I created, it was made clear to me that legislative action is needed at the federal level to do more to boost our manufacturers and the positive impact they have on our economy.

My highest priority has always been ensuring that Mainers receive timely and quality constituent services. A Message from Senator Garrett P. Mason

January 2012

Dear Friends and Neighbors:

I am grateful for the trust you have placed in me to work for the citizens of Livermore Falls and our region. Representing your interests in the Maine State has been truly rewarding. Thank you for allowing me the opportunity to be your voice in Augusta.

When Republicans took their oath of office last December, we promised to move Maine in a new direction and to make our state more prosperous and affordable to all Mainers. Lawmakers also faced dire budget projections of a billion dollar shortfall. Many doubted we could attain anything substantive with the obstacles before us. Instead of looking at quick-fix solutions to the problems before us, we met our challenges head on by rolling up our sleeves and working together. Over the months that ensued, the Legislature approved a number of significant reform measures to our health insurance market, tax policies, and state regulations.

Looking back at the results of the First Regular Session, I believe legislators made significant strides in addressing Maine's most pressing needs during extremely difficult times. We did so while avoiding a government shutdown and the polarizing situations that occurred in other states. Leadership made the decision early on in the session that we would insist on a two-thirds budget and we would create a culture of inclusion, respect and consensus. We increased state funding to local schools by \$65 million, brought solvency to the retiree pension system, insisted on more transparency and accountability at the Maine Turnpike Authority, and paid back our local hospitals millions of dollars that had been owed to them for years. We worked hard to deliver the changes we promised, and we succeeded.

Though important progress has been made, lawmakers have a great deal of work ahead them when they return to Augusta in January. The most daunting task will be addressing a staggering \$120 million shortfall within the Department of Health and Human Services and its MaineCare program. In terms of all spending, MaineCare accounts for 32 percent of the state budget and enrollment is expected to grow at more than three times the rate of our revenues over the next four years. Difficult structural changes to the MaineCare program must be made soon; but I am confident that if we continue to work together as we did last year, we can return MaineCare back to a sustainable and quality system that protects Maine's most at-risk citizens.

2012

In the past year we have witnessed more than a 50% turnover in Board membership, as long-time members of the group have 'retired'. The past year has been one of Officers learning new roles and the Board learning to work team.

The Downtown Betterment Group sponsored History Night, coordinated by member-at-large Kenny Jacques. The theme was this year highlighted the key role sports has played in Livermore Falls. Those who walked the downtown also enjoyed sidewalk food, viewing enticing antique automobiles, wagon rides from the downtown to the Maine Paper and Heritage Museum, lively music, a display of hats of past and present local residents, a clogging performance and friendly visiting with neighbors.

At the Apple Pumpkin Festival, the Betterment Group had a booth which fielded questions about development plans for the downtown, conducted a fund-raising multi-ticket raffle from the generous donations of items from areas businesses and individuals, and administered a verbal resident survey which had been developed by the Economic Restructuring Committee.

The Economic Restructuring Committee of the Board is developing a Comprehensive marketing plan to communicate to entrepreneurs the current growth opportunities, to strengthen existing businesses, and to promote the special events and attractions in Livermore Falls.

Improvements from funds from the CDBG façade grant monies were implemented and others will be put into place in the coming months: glass covered bulletin boards at the entrance of the town office, an information board at Gateway Park, bicycle racks and new weather-resistant benches at the town office.

The Betterment Group participated in the Chisholm Trails initiative to further a multi-use trail system connecting Livermore Falls to Farmington.

One important function of the LFDTBG is to lend support to private initiatives which will benefit the downtown. One example of this during the past year is members attending a special town meeting on plans to develop the Lamb block.

Town Manager Kristal Flagg nominated the Betterment Group for an award which promotes volunteerism, the Spirit of American Award. We were honored to receive it.

On a personal note, I extend sincere appreciation to the Board members and friends, who at a cost to personal and family time have chosen to invest their time, energy and heart in Livermore Falls

To the Town Manager, Selectmen and Citizens;

In 2011 the Livermore Falls Police Department received and responded to 3177 calls for emergencies and/or assistance. In addition, 107 arrests were made, 187 criminal summonses issued, 73 traffic summons issued and 1038 traffic warnings and/or defects were issued.

This is the first full year the police department has been fully intergraded with the County Dispatch. With this and the loss of support staff the activity numbers have dropped. The records keeping is no longer automatic, unless it is a call assigned by County dispatch, many are unlogged. The Administrative Assistant is funded only 8 hours a week so patrol time suffers to do reports and maintain services. We are still trying to adapt to the ever changing needs of the public.

Remember, ALWAYS call 911 in an EMERGENCY

Stephen Allen was promoted to Sergeant this year and Daniel Chabot was hired 5/15/2011 to fill the vacancy left by Sergeant Joseph Sage. Officer Chabot is currently attending the 18 week Police Academy and will be graduating in May 2012. We have also lost Reserve Officers Thomas Plourde and Kenneth Bryant, they both have left to concentrate on there full time careers.

As always, we are dedicated to providing safe and effective public safety services to the citizens of Livermore Falls. I encourage you to contact me with any comments or concerns regarding the police department that you might have.

2011 Public Works Report

The Highway Department had a very successful year with getting our road projects completed. We replaced a large culvert on the Tucker Road along with several other culverts throughout town. Rampart Bituminous shimmed and overlaid a mile on the Campground Road and this came out very well.

This winter has been a challenge with having all the sleet and freezing rain. The crew is doing an excellent job on taking care of the roads and the equipment. We have used 1000 yards of sand and 450 tons of salt to date.

Residents of Livermore Falls have benefited from some joint services we have with our surrounding communities. For the past couple years we have joined with Jay and Wilton on purchases of road culverts, paint for our cross walks and winter sand. All three Towns shared equipment and manpower on street sweeping. This benefited our Town with having the ability for our small crew to complete more tasks.

This year we would like to replace a dump body that goes on our Ford 550 with a side dump body like our other large trucks. This will save us alot of time in the winter months by not having to put the hopper sander in and out in between snow storms.

Our road and paving projects this year will be rebuilding Richardson and Bemis Streets along side the Water and Sewer Departments. Also putting chip seal on Record Road and Strickland Loop Road.

Capital improvements is something we have to start doing in Livermore Falls such as sidewalk replacement and storm drains. This is all very expensive but is something that has to been done in the very near future.

2011 Transfer Station Report

The single sort recycling has gone very well. Our recycling has increased. Our amount of household trash has dropped by another 18 tons per month and we are currently paying \$57.97 a ton for household waste and there is no tipping fee on recyclables. We are trying to get maximum compaction in the containers to save on hauling costs, sometimes we can not get a truck here soon enough to swap out the containers so we have to put trash or recyclables in the old building until we get a new container swapped out.

The reduction for household trash is due in part to not taking dumpsters and being able to monitor the contract haulers at our facility. Last year we did a Household Hazardous waste collection day with the Town of Jay, we had several residents participate in this program.



TAX COLLECTORS REPORT

Under the July 1 through June 30 fiscal accounting period, annual reports must be prepared and printed prior to the end of the fiscal period and before the post annual audit can be started. May 1st through April 31st has been selected as the most reasonable reporting period that can be offered to the voters for comparative information purposes.

Taxes are committed to the Tax Collector at the time the annual bills are mailed out and at the expiration of eight to twelve months any unpaid balances are placed on lien and turned over to the Treasurer for collection. Any liens which are not paid in full with interest and recording fees foreclose after eighteen months and become the property of the Town. The Treasurer and the Tax Collector accept partial or installment payments in order to assist taxpayers to avoid liens and foreclosures.

2011 Sewer Department Report

The treatment plant ran well this year with no violations of our State and Federal licenses. Most of the plant equipment is reaching its half-life of 10 years. Some of the pumps and aerators that run 24-7 have over 100000 hours on them. Future projects for replacement and rebuilds will be evaluated and done as funds are available.

Main Street sewer replacement was mostly completed this summer and should serve the town for the next 100 years. Some manhole grading, paving, and sidewalk work will complete the project by early summer.

Our old collection system is bothersome on an almost weekly basis. Some of the problems are unavoidable root infestation, but more frequently the problem is caused by material that is flushed down home drains. Sewer users should put nothing down their drains but normal waste. No handiwipes, no feminine hygiene products, no flushable toilet pads, no paper towels, no grease. Just water and waste period!! The cost to take care of these unwanted materials is significant and is passed on to the sewer users. So save yourself money and use the waste system wisely.

I am retiring in May of 2012 and would like to thank everyone in the Town of Livermore Falls for the opportunity to have worked for you for 35 years. If I had it to do over, I would do it again.

The Trustees of the Livermore Falls Water District hereby submit this annual report for the year ending December 31, 2011.

Infrastructure upgrades:

This past year we finally accomplished the water main replacement portion included in the Main St. project under a MDOT contract. This contract was originally expected to be completed by the fall of 2012 with the final completion in the spring of 2013. Pratt & Sons pushed hard and completed the full length of the new water main installation by November 2011. This project as you know was long overdue and included 1.1 miles of 12" & 8" water main. The feedback I have received thus far from the customer base of both Livermore Falls and Jay has been very positive.

In House projects:

The one in-house project we had scheduled this year was to replace 500ft of 1 1/4" copper on Duboard St. in Jay. This was pushed back to 2012 due to the demand of the Main St. project.

Community outreach programs:

This year worked out well during National Drinking Water Week. On the 3rd of May we were able to schedule 3 performances done by Matt Loosigian of Earthjams.com. Matt performed a array of youth based comedy and musical talents to bring about an educational awareness as to the importance of conservation and water quality to youth threw out our communities of Livermore Falls, Livermore and Jay. We hope to continue to support, sponsor and expand these programs as much as possible.

To: Ernest N. Steward, Jr., a constable of the Town of Livermore Falls, in the County of Androscoggin, in the State of Maine:

Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the voters of the Town of Livermore Falls in the County of Androscoggin, in the State of Maine, qualified by law to vote in Town affairs, to meet at the Livermore Falls Municipal Building in said Town of Livermore Falls on Tuesday, the 12th of June 2012 at 8:00 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles to wit:

Article 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Article 2. To choose by secret ballot in accordance with Title 30, M.R.S.A. Section 2061 all necessary Town Officials including one Selectman/Assessor for a two year term; one Selectman/Assessor for a three year term and two RSU #73 School Board Directors each for a three year term.

Note: The polls will open at 8:00 o'clock in the forenoon and close at 8:00 o'clock in the evening.

Article 3: Shall the Town fix dates of October 24, 2012 and March 20, 2013 when taxes shall be due and payable and shall the Town fix a rate of 7% interest to be paid on taxes unpaid after said date?

Recommendation: That 7% per annum be charged commencing on October 25, 2012 on all ½ year payments not paid on or before October 24, 2012 and that 7% per annum be charged commencing on March 21, 2013 on all second ½ year payments not paid on or before March 20, 2013.





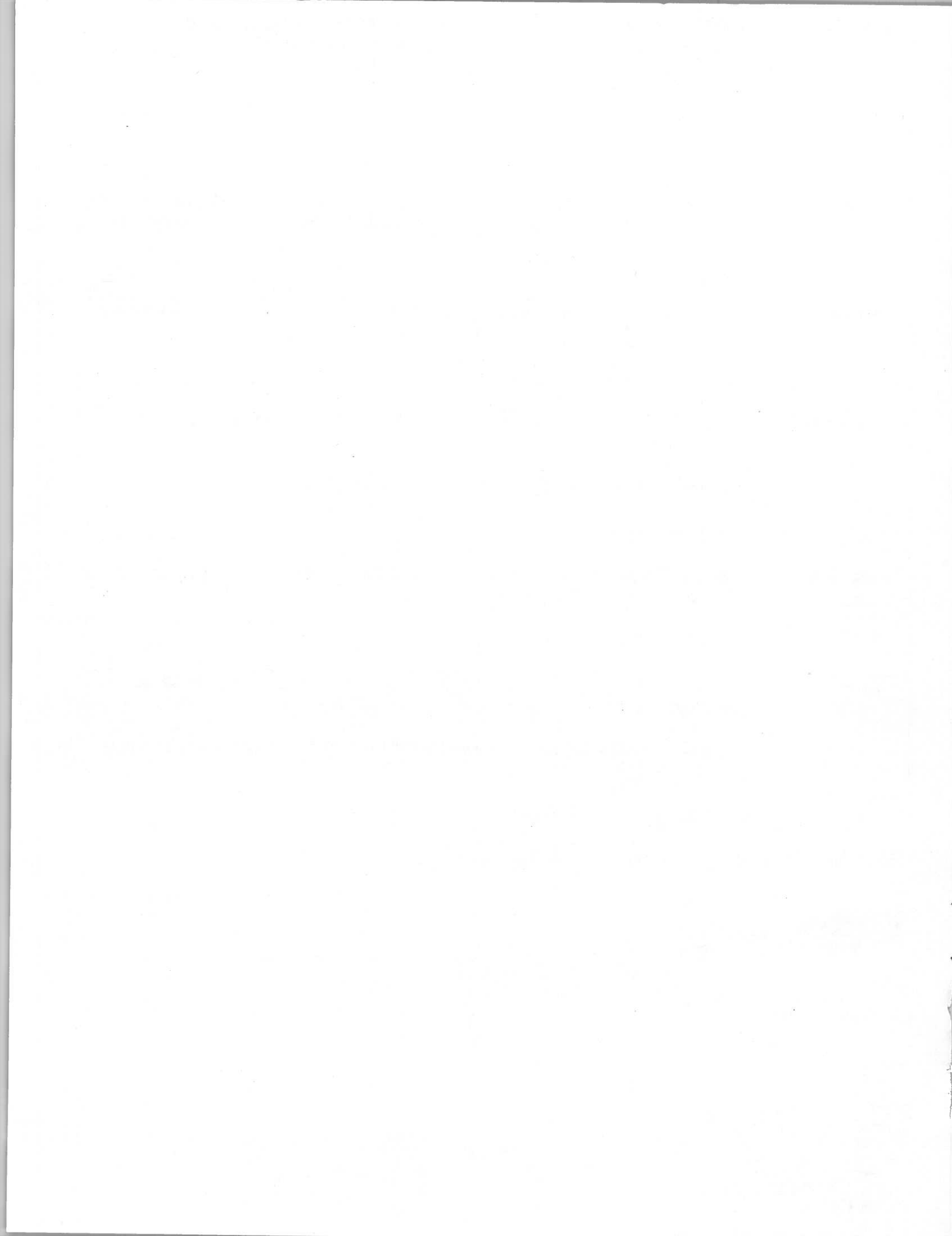
