

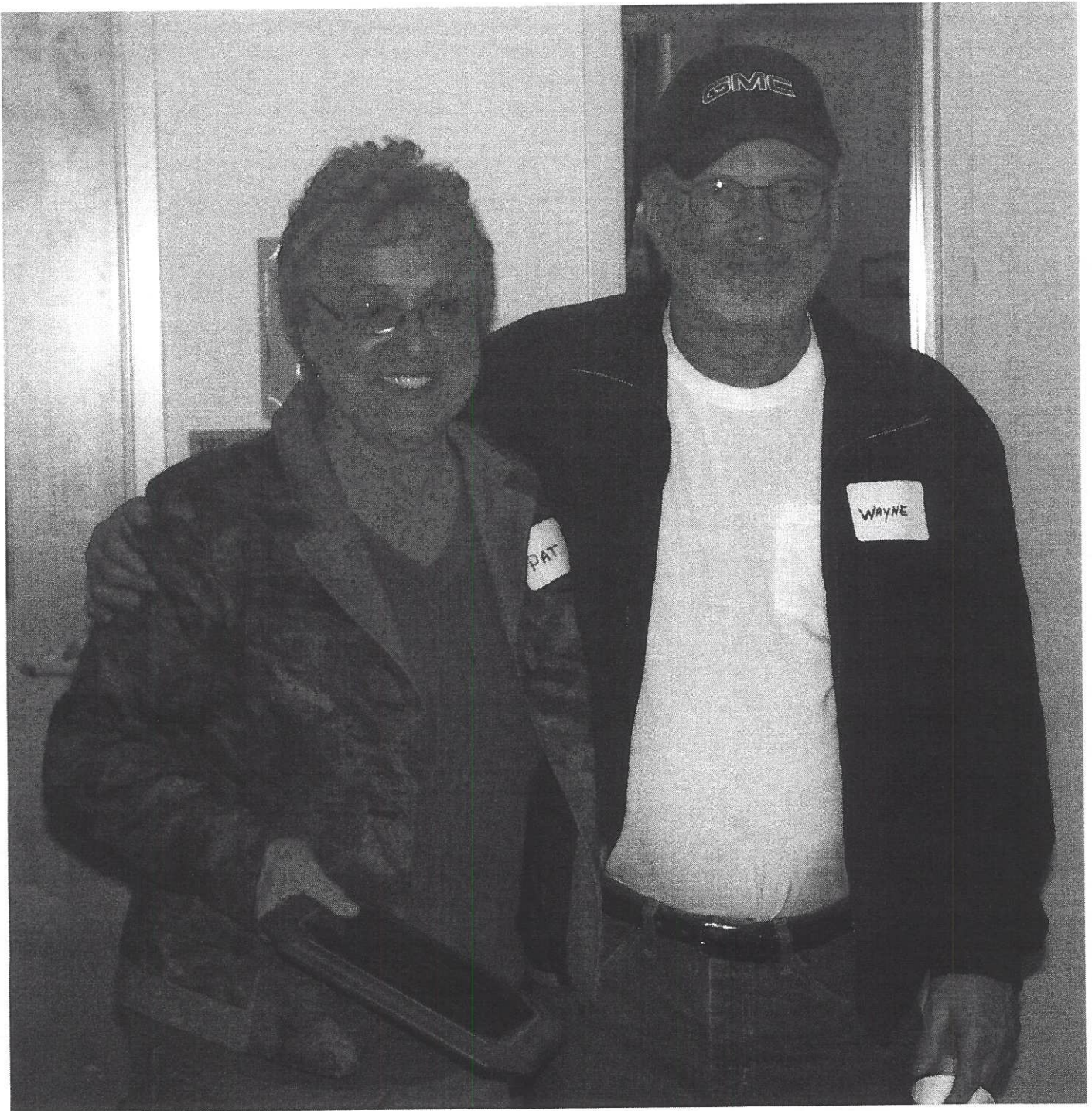

Dear Residents and Friends:

While far from perfect, the legislation passed to avoid December's fiscal cliff embodied a spirit of bipartisan compromise that I hope will carry over to a broader agreement on our nation's finances. The bill ensures that Mainers will not have to pay an estimated \$1.4 billion in additional taxes in 2013, and extends a number of vital programs relied upon by Mainers. I look forward to working on a fiscally sound compromise that avoids burdening our most vulnerable citizens, seniors and veterans.

The gridlock in Washington has not slowed my efforts to fight for Maine's industries on the national and international arena. I have been proud to lead the fight in Congress to protect American manufacturers like New Balance, which employs approximately 900 Maine workers across three factories, from unfair tariff reductions. After presenting President Obama with his own set of New Balance Sneakers, I brought U.S. Trade Representative Ron Kirk to the Norridgewock facility to learn more about the industry. I have also worked with Ambassador Kirk to oppose Nova Scotia's proposed subsidies for its paper mill in Port Hawkesbury.

My 2<sup>nd</sup> annual tour of Maine's manufacturers to hear firsthand about their success and challenges was very helpful. These tours are an important part of my ongoing "Make it in Maine" agenda which consists of initiatives to boost domestic manufacturing. The feedback I received has been invaluable in helping to identify legislative action needed to support job growth in the industry.

It will also be my great honor to continue serving our nation's veterans as the new Ranking Member of the House Veterans Affairs Committee. While I am proud of my accomplishments helping to improve services for our brave men and women in uniform, I know there is still so much to do. As Ranking Member of the full Committee, I will fight for new advances in areas such as veteran employment, VA claims backlogs, and veterans' health care.

My highest priority has always been ensuring that Mainers receive timely and quality constituent services. **Annual Report to the Town of Livermore Falls**  
A Message from Senator Garrett Mason

Dear Friends and Neighbors:

It is an honor to represent you in the Maine Senate for a second term. I am grateful for the trust you have placed in me to work for the betterment of this community and all of Androscoggin County.

Looking back at the results of the 125<sup>th</sup> Legislature, I am proud of the work accomplished by lawmakers during an extremely difficult fiscal climate. We increased state funding to local education by \$63 million, brought solvency to the retiree pension system, created more transparency and accountability within state agencies, and paid millions of dollars back to our state hospitals. More importantly, we improved Maine's business climate. According to the 2012 CNBC annual rankings of America's top states for business, Maine climbed five spots from the previous year. The improvements made in education funding and test scores, the state's cost of doing business, infrastructure and transportation, and business friendliness all led to this higher ranking. It is vital that we keep the changes that were made during the 125<sup>th</sup> Legislature. They are necessary steps to setting us on the course toward a brighter future.

Lawmakers have a great deal of work on their plates for the first session of the 126<sup>th</sup> Legislature. The most pressing issue before us will be how to address a \$100-plus million shortfall within the Department of Health and Human Services and its MaineCare program. Additionally, there is a \$35 million revenue shortfall in the budget that ends June 30<sup>th</sup> and a projected \$880 million gap in the next two-year budget. Lawmakers will have some very difficult choices to make during the upcoming months on how to address this financial dilemma.

During the 126<sup>th</sup> Legislature, I will serve as Republican Senate Lead on the Veterans and Legal Affairs Committee. We must make it a priority to do everything we can, as a legislative body, to help our veterans obtain the benefits they are due for their service to our country. As a member of this committee, I look forward to not only advocating for our veterans and military, but also working on issues pertaining to liquor laws; lottery and gaming; election laws; campaign practices and financing; voter registration; initiatives and referenda.

Again, thank you for entrusting me to represent you in Augusta. Please feel free to contact me if you need my help in navigating the state bureaucracy. 

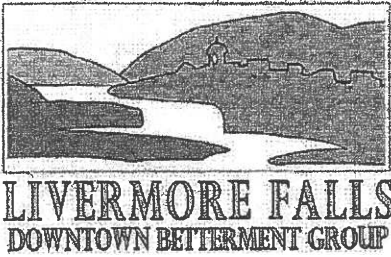

The past year has witnessed our involvement in a variety of activities.

In October we created the Livermore Falls Downtown Betterment Facebook Page, to highlight local businesses;, share the rich history of the town and area;, and promote local events and assets.

History Night 2012 honored current and former members of the military from our community. 'Dreamland Theater' showed actual news clips from WWII. This celebration retains a neighborhood feel—with music, street food, a clogging exhibition, antique cars displayed, and historical memorabilia.

He was a long-time Board Member of The Paper and Heritage Museum of Maine—to name just a few. Some Group members attended the Androscoggin County festivities when Dennis received the award in June. His enthusiastic and heartfelt presence is deeply missed.

Our Economic Development Committee has worked to develop a comprehensive marketing plan which outlines possible initiatives for the Group. The next step is to prioritize and set timelines for projects that match our financial and personnel resources.

The department has continued another busy year responding to calls for service in our community and assisting our neighbors. The members of our department have been actively involved in training classes and fire prevention programs in the community. We had 3 Firefighters complete Firefighter 1 & 2 certification and 3 firefighter complete structural firefighter training certification.

At the end of 2012 Fire Chief Gerry Pineau has resigned from the Chief's position after serving as fire chief since 2010 to go back to college. The department would like to thank Chief Pineau for his service to the community and wish him the best in his future endeavors.

The department continues to work on improving our operations to optimize our efficiency and provide a cost effective service to our community. Along with keeping up with the always changing standards the fire service must comply with. This past year the department became licensed as a first responder service through Maine EMS. This license allows our members to assist with treating ill and injured patients on medical calls and vehicle accidents.

To the Town Manager, Selectmen and Citizens;

In 2012 the Livermore Falls Police Department received and responded to 2773 calls for emergencies and/or assistance. In addition, 106 arrests were made, 211 criminal summonses issued, 98 traffic summons issued and 1065 traffic warnings and/or defects were issued.

I want to congratulate Lieutenant Thomas Gould, as of last October he has dedicated 25 years of service to this department and the community. Vernon Stevens was promoted to Sergeant this year and Joseph Sage was hired 12/01/2012 to fill the vacancy left by Sergeant Stephen Allen. Officer Allen will remain on the department as a Reserve Officer.

We continue to update the equipment we can with the grant money that's available to us for things such as bulletproof vests, tasers, radios etc. We are doing what we can to continue to serve the community and keep the budget costs down. We are also interested in researching the possible cost savings in becoming part of Franklin County. At first glance the saving for the police department in travel alone is huge. Having a full service dispatch in one location is another plus, for the safety of the community as well as the emergency personnel. Once the Town has had a chance to fully explore the pros and cons of this, it may create future cost savings.

## 2012 Highway Report

To: The Citizens of Livermore Falls,

Last year's snowfall totaled 59 inches with January being the snowiest month.

Construction projects last year included Free Street which was a joint effort with the Water District, Sewer Department and Jay Highway crew. A new water, sewer and storm drain line was installed and a complete rebuild of the street with a new base coat of pavement.

The Water and Sewer Departments installed new water and sewer lines on Richardson Ave. and Bemis Street and then had new gravel and pavement installed.

The Highway crew rebuilt the side walk on Richardson Ave. when all the utility work was done.

Heritage Lane had a section dug out and new gravel installed along with new pavement on the entire road. Other roads that had paving done were Water Street, Otis, Prospect and Monroe Street. Chip seal was placed on the Record Road and Strickland Loop Roads also.

Other projects included slip lining a storm drain from the intersection of Depot and Searles Street to Park Street, and a new fuel pump was installed at the garage, both of these projects came in under the budgeted amount.

## 2012 Transfer Station Report

All the changes that have taken place at the transfer station since 2010 have made a \$105,328.00 reduction in the budget for the tax payers of Livermore Falls. Our recycling has increased and our amount of household trash has dropped by another 156 tons per year. We are currently paying \$59.02 a ton for household waste and we did pay \$15.00 a ton fee on recyclables for 3 months.

We are trying to get maximum compaction in the containers to save on hauling costs. Sometimes we can not get a truck here soon enough to swap out the containers so we have to put trash or recyclables in the old building until we get a new container swapped out.

The reduction for household trash is due in part to not taking dumpsters and being able to monitor the contract haulers at our facility. We are working on dates for Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day with the Town of Jay.

Through a grant the Library was able to replace the old furnace with a new one, install heat pumps and air conditioning.

There was a flood (broken pipe) that damaged the auditorium downstairs, but insurance covered most of the repairs. Some of the repairs are still going on. We hope to have it back to normal in time for our 2013 Summer Reading Program.



## TAX COLLECTORS REPORT

Under the July 1 through June 30 fiscal accounting period, annual reports must be prepared and printed prior to the end of the fiscal period and before the post annual audit can be started. May 1st through April 31st has been selected as the most reasonable reporting period that can be offered to the voters for comparative information purposes.

Taxes are committed to the Tax Collector at the time the annual bills are mailed out and at the expiration of eight to twelve months any unpaid balances are placed on lien and turned over to the Treasurer for collection. Any liens which are not paid in full with interest and recording fees foreclose after eighteen months and become the property of the Town. The Treasurer and the Tax Collector accept partial or installment payments in order to assist taxpayers to avoid liens and foreclosures.

Kent Mitchell retired in May and I was hired in April to take over Kent's position as the new superintendent. The primary side of the treatment plant is in need of major repairs. The treatment plant has two primary clarifiers and there was only one drive that operated both of them. We installed a complete new drive system for the #2 primary and had to put in a new drive for the #1 because it was so badly worn that it would have cost more to rebuild than to buy a new one. The motor was rebuilt free of charge.

We made up lifting devices to open and close slide gates that weighed upwards to 200 lbs for the Primary's and secondary's.

We added 1 ft onto the disinfection tank gate's. The reason for this was, when one of the tanks was taken off line, the water was still flowing over the top.

We installed a variable frequency drive unit on one of our Primary effluent pumps along with a digital humus pump timer to maintain a more stable flow to the trickling filters and a more steady feed back to the Primary's. This was at no cost to see how it would work. By doing this the system is running more stable and we have been able to cut the humus pump run time. The energy savings has shown about \$1,000 per month plus the unneeded wear and tear on the pumps.

A new sewer main was replaced on Free Street by the Jay and Livermore Falls sewer and Rd crews.

A new sewer main was installed on Richardson Ave and Bemis St by Jordan Excavation.

Tom Mitchell retired on Dec 21 st

We treated a total of 186.37 million gallons with an average BOD removal of 92.6 % and an average total solids removal of 94.8 %. resulting in 212.26 tons of solids after dewatering.

We welcome anyone to stop by and take a tour of the facility. Our normal working hrs are 6:00 am to 2:30 pm. We look forward to seeing you.

The Code Enforcement Department is responsible for protecting the public health, safety, and general welfare of all the citizens and visitors of the Town of Livermore falls through the administration of local, state, and federal laws and ordinances. In the Code Department I issue building permits, septic system permits, internal plumbing permits, and electrical permits. I also serve as the Secretary to the Planning Board and Board of Appeals.

This past year has been a very busy and promising year here in Livermore Falls. Development within the Downtown area has really come to life and continues to encourage more and more projects to break ground and make Livermore Falls a service center to its citizens and its neighboring communities. In early 2012 the Livermore Falls Medical Arts Center was completed and has become a great new neighbor in the downtown area. Also the Bank Building renovation wrapped up its extensive rehabilitation bringing the building into the 21<sup>st</sup> century. Lastly the Lamb Block Redevelopment project was completed which turned an old outdated building that was falling in and vacant, to a beautiful renovated building that again has daily visitors. This year the Livermore Falls Planning Board has had a very busy year hearing many proposals for business in town. The Code Enforcement Department took on more responsibility this year as well, after Kent Mitchell retired after 36 years of service to the Town of Livermore Falls the Town needed a Licensed Plumbing Inspector to replace Kent. I was appointed as Licensed Plumbing Inspector and got certified through the Department of Health & Human Services. So now when citizens need to file for a building permit they can also file for their plumbing permits that are required. The Town of Livermore Falls website is continually updated with Ordinance updates, permit forms, and other important messages. Please be sure to check it out at [www.lfme.org](http://www.lfme.org). I continue to attend trainings, workshops, and code conference's to stay current on rules and laws which affect the Town. I am required to attend to obtain so many credit hours annually to maintain my certification as a State of Maine Code Enforcement Officer & Plumbing Inspector.

The Goal of the Code Enforcement Department is to gain compliance though voluntary compliance. If this cannot be reached then the matter is brought before the Selectmen, then violation goes to court if necessary. The mission of the Code Enforcement Department is to educate, prevent, and assist in all matters that are brought forward. The Trustees of the Livermore Falls Water District hereby submit this annual report for the year ending December 31, 2012.

Infrastructure upgrades:

This past year we accomplished the Richardson Neighborhood Project under a contract for services with Jordan Excavation. This project consisted of just over a mile of 6" & 8" Ductile iron pipe installed along Richardson, Otis, Bemis, Gagnon, Prospect & Monroe Street. 4 New hydrants were installed along with new water services to 80 properties. As usual some customers were not happy during the construction but when all was said and done with new pavement laid, all was good.

In House projects:

This year two in-house projects were accomplished. Free street was completed under joint participation with crews from both Jay and Livermore Falls. 800ft of new 2" main was installed with 10 new services.

Lavoie Street was accomplished jointly with the Town of Jay. The existing 1800ft of 8" AC was replaced with 12" Ductile iron, one hydrant was replaced and 18 existing services. The increase in the size of water main will improve fire flow in this area. On another positive note, both of these projects came in under budget.

Community outreach programs:

This year during National Drinking Water Week in May. We were maxed out due to the workload of both In-house projects and were unable to bring about any of the youth environmental educational programs normally offered by the Drinking Water Program. We hope to be able to continue these programs next year.

### Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the voters of the Town of Livermore Falls in the County of Androscoggin, in the State of Maine, qualified by law to vote in Town affairs, to meet at the Livermore Falls Municipal Building in said Town of Livermore Falls on Tuesday, the 11th of June 2013 at 8:00 in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles to wit:

**Article 1.** To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

**Article 2.** To choose by secret ballot in accordance with Title 30, M.R.S.A. Section 2061 all necessary Town Officials including one Selectman/Assessor for a two year term; one Selectman/Assessor for a three year term; one Selectmen/Assessor for a one year term and one RSU #73 School Board Director for a three year term.

Note: The polls will open at 8:00 o'clock in the forenoon and close at 8:00 o'clock in the evening.

<b>Article 3:</b> Shall the Town fix dates of October 23, 2013 and March 19, 2014 when taxes shall be due and payable and shall the Town fix a rate of 7% interest to be paid on taxes unpaid after said date?
