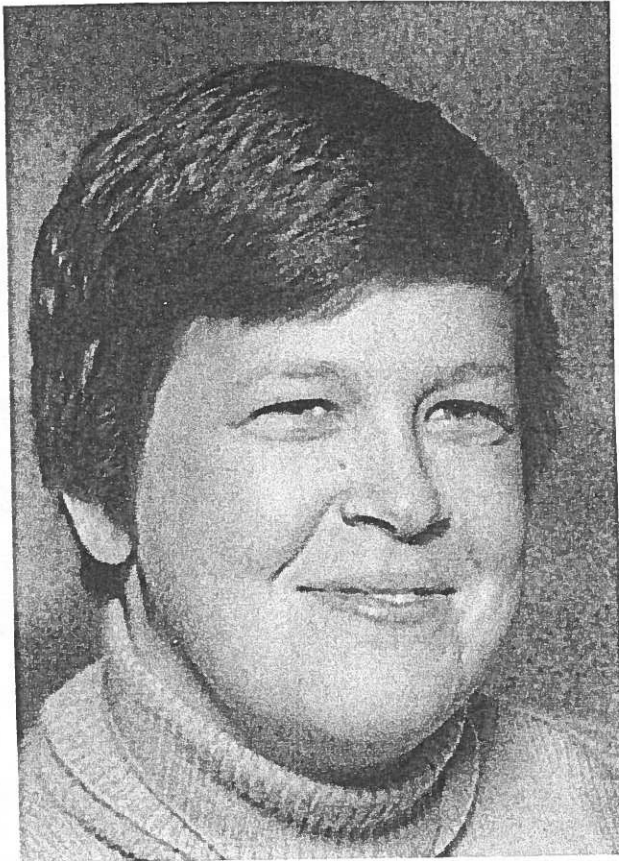
The Town of Livermore Falls would like to remember two past employees who passed away this year; **Maxine Bailey and George (Eddie) Black.**

Dear Friends:

It is a privilege to represent Maine in the U.S. Senate, and I welcome this opportunity to share some of my work from the past year.

Encouraging the creation of more jobs remains my top priority. I have developed a Seven Point Plan for Jobs in Maine, which includes proposals to spur small business investment, ensure robust workforce education and training, reduce regulatory red tape that stifles job creation, support Maine agriculture and manufacturing, and invest in the infrastructure needed to expand our economy. Traditional industries and small businesses remain the backbone of Maine's economy, and innovation will be important for future jobs as well. I have supported Maine's effort to lead the world in deepwater wind technology and was proud when the University of Maine and its private sector partners launched the first prototype this year. This emerging industry has the potential to create thousands of good jobs here in Maine.

BIW remains a major Maine employer and is critical to our national security. I have worked hard to support the Navy's request for a 10th DDG-51 and to continue construction on the DDG-1000s at the shipyard. This year's annual defense policy bill also contains more than 30 provisions to eliminate sexual assault from our military, including several provisions that I authored.

Partisan divisiveness in Washington continues to prevent us from addressing some of our nation's most serious challenges. Gridlock reached a peak in October with the federal government shutdown that pushed our country to the brink of defaulting on its financial obligations and damaged our economy. As the shutdown continued with no end in sight, I presented a proposal I believed both sides could support. Within days, I was leading a bipartisan coalition of 14 Senators that worked night and day to craft a plan to reopen government, avert default, and restart negotiations on a long-term plan to deal with our nation's unsustainable debt of more than \$17 trillion. Known as the "Common Sense Caucus," we will continue to work to develop solutions and bridge the partisan divide.

Earlier this year, across-the-board federal spending cuts known as "sequestration" took effect. These indiscriminate cuts jeopardized priorities from national security to medical research and stand in stark contrast to the thoughtful and thoroughly debated spending priorities set at town meetings throughout Maine. To bring some Maine common sense to this process, I authored bipartisan legislation to allow federal agencies to set priorities in administering the required cuts and wrote a new law to ensure that sequestration would not disrupt air travel, which plays such an important role in fueling Maine's tourism economy.

I have also enjoyed my work as the ranking member of the Senate Special Committee on Aging where, with Senator Bill Nelson of Florida, we work on issues of critical importance to Maine seniors. The committee has created a toll free hotline (1-855-303-9470) to make it easier for senior citizens to report fraud and scams and to receive assistance. I also serve as the Senate Co-Chair of the task force on Alzheimer's, a devastating disease that takes a tremendous personal and economic toll on more than five million Americans. Better treatment for Alzheimer's and ultimately finding a cure should be an urgent national priority.

Finally, I am proud to reflect our famous Maine work ethic by completing another year of service without missing a single roll call vote. I have not missed a vote since I was elected – a streak that stands at more than 5,300 in a row.

May 2014 be a good year for you, your community, and our great State of Maine.

Last year saw some of the most bitterly partisan political fighting in Washington in recent memory. I continue to be committed to making that happen, and continue to regularly meet with Democrats, Republicans, and Independents to forge a way forward.

As we move forward into a new year, my highest priority remains ensuring that Mainers receive timely and quality constituent services. 
Since arriving to the U.S. Senate last January, I have been looking for ways to provide Mainers with improved access to federal services through the use of digital technology and on the ground outreach initiatives. Maine is a rural state and I know that traveling to our offices can present both logistical and financial challenges.

To help overcome those obstacles, I launched our signature **Your Government Your Neighborhood** outreach program in June 2013. Every other week members of my staff in Maine travel to different towns - ensuring that all 16 counties are served each month - to hold constituent office hours for local residents.

Over the past eleven months my work in Washington has been largely shaped by the four committees that I serve on: Armed Services, Intelligence, Budget, and Rules. These appointments allow me to engage on issues important to Maine and help craft legislation before it comes to the Senate floor. On the Armed Services Committee I work with my colleagues to honor our obligations to members of our armed forces both past and present, as well as ensure the continued strength, efficiency, and sustainability of our military. On the Intelligence Committee I work to effectively mitigate security threats facing our country while also establishing measures to guarantee that the privacy rights of U.S. citizens are protected. On the Budget Committee, I am working to ensure that necessary spending is tempered with fiscal responsibility, and my position on the Rules Committee allows me to push for procedural reforms that remove institutional inefficiencies and help move the country forward.

I am tremendously grateful for the opportunity to serve you and determined to keep you informed of my activities in Maine and Washington. Annual Report to the Town of Livermore Falls
A Message from Senator Garrett Mason

Dear Friends and Neighbors:

Thank you for the opportunity to represent Livermore Falls in the Senate during the past three years. It has been an honor working on your behalf to make Maine an even better place to live, work and conduct business.

The year began with a difficult task: covering an \$880 million shortfall in the two-year budget that was caused mainly by cost overruns in the MaineCare program. We were able to close this gap without reversing the income tax cuts passed by the previous Legislature, which has benefitted low and moderate-income residents the most. Eliminating those cuts would have represented a big step back for a state that has historically had one of the highest tax burdens in the country. Unfortunately, there were many proposals in the budget that I could not support that ultimately led to my voting against it. The budget included a 10 percent sales tax increase and a 14 percent hike in the meals and lodging tax. Maine's "Circuitbreaker" property tax relief program was replaced with the Property Tax Fairness Credit, which provides smaller refunds for homeowners and renters.

One of the Legislature's most significant achievements this session was finally paying off Maine's massive debt to its hospitals, which totaled \$484 million at the beginning of this past session. Through a joint effort between the Veterans and Legal Affairs Committee and the Appropriations Committee, the Legislature approved a plan that allowed the state to use a revenue bond to pay off the debt and use the proceeds from a renegotiated state liquor contract to pay off the bond. The debt was the result of Medicaid services provided by 39 Maine hospitals for which they were never reimbursed, dating back to 2009. The skyrocketing debt coincided with the State's decision to rapidly expand eligibility for MaineCare. An earlier effort to link paying back Maine's hospitals with enlarging the State's welfare system by expanding MaineCare to 70,000 additional people failed passage.

The Legislature also approved the bipartisan Omnibus Energy Bill, which addresses reducing the cost of energy in Maine, cutting back on greenhouse emissions, and making money available to insulate Maine homes. The enacted law will increase natural gas capacity and improve connection to underserved areas of Maine, provide funding to help companies cut back on greenhouse emissions and give rebates to homeowners who switch from oil to natural gas or other more efficient heating systems, and provide funding to help homeowners improve insulation.

Dear citizens of Livermore Falls:

As a state, we have taken great strides over the course of the past years.

Growing our economy, decreasing our energy costs, and improving our educational system are the priorities of my administration. Maine needs to create a pro-growth environment that encourages our businesses to create jobs. It is critical that we focus on promoting policies which support and attract new investment. To achieve this, we need to keep taxes low on our families and businesses, and find ways to increase efficiency in government while protecting our most vulnerable citizens.

We have made great progress toward these endeavors. We passed **the largest tax cut in Maine's history**. Two-thirds of Maine taxpayers will get income tax relief, and 70,000 low-income Mainers will no longer pay income tax. My goal is to continue to drive down Maine's income tax.



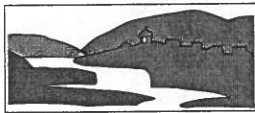
We seem to always have a few challenges we are faced with for the coming fiscal year. With the changes in reimbursements from the State it becomes a challenge for us to maintain a workable budget to keep taxes at a level we can afford, while maintaining quality service and safety. It may be a difficult task with these budget cuts from the State but we are hopeful of the outcome.

On a more positive note, we are always looking for ways to attract revenue and pool resources with other communities. We are in the process of obtaining a T.I.F. agreement. This is a Municipal Tax Increment Financing agreement with the State of Maine. It will able us to expand our ability in our community for economic growth. This is a tool that municipalities use to shelter money from a project that would otherwise increase our valuation, but loose State Revenue, School Subsidy and increase our share of County Taxes. The project is the upgrade construction project of the Central Maine Substation on Moosehill. This will be an estimated 14 million dollar project. We are also looking at expanding our sidewalk from the Foundry Road to the existing sidewalk on Park Street. This gets a lot of use from spring to late fall and was received as a "Safe Walk to School Grant". We also are looking at Natural Gas coming to our area in 2015. These are positive accomplishments we have all worked so hard to achieve.

It's been a pleasure working for our town as Town Manager. Thank you all for your support and hope I can serve many more years to come.

To the Town Manager, Selectmen and Citizens;

In 2013 the Livermore Falls Police Department received and responded to 2966 calls for emergencies and/or assistance. In addition, 79 arrests were made, 165 criminal summonses issued, 168 traffic summons issued and 1097 traffic warnings and/or defects were issued.

Note: I corrected an oversight in the call reasons this year and added the Wellbeing/Mental/Medical category to the list. We spend a significant amount of our time and resources' dealing with these calls and the number of them continues to increase.

Lieutenant Thomas Gould resigned this year to take a position as Police Chief in Fairfield; we wish him well and already miss him. Joseph Sage was promoted to Lieutenant and is doing well adjusting to the new position. Devon Bohacik was hired 8/26/2013 to fill the vacant patrol position and Bradlee Gallant a full-time Rumford Officer was hired on our department as a Reserve Officer.

We continue to update the equipment we can with grant money that's available to us. This year we are presently updating our server system with a homeland security grant and waiting for funds to be released from a JAG grant to purchase body cameras for the officers. These grants require no matching funds from the Town.

Snowfall to date has totaled 101 inches along with a couple major freezing rain storms and a few other smaller freezing rain events. We have used much more sand and salt then in previous years due to the amounts.

Paving consisted of a shim and over lay on Campground and Old County road, Page road had to have the old pavement removed and new gravel installed in a section of it and then was paved with a base and surface coat of pavement. All States Material got the bid last year and did an excellent job.

Other projects included installing a large culvert on Campground road along with several other smaller culverts. Also we installed the new dump body on the 550 in house instead of subbing it out.

2013 Transfer Station Report

All the changes that have taking place at the transfer station since 2010 have made a \$105,328.00 reduction in the budget for the tax payers of Livermore Falls. Our recycling and household trash is fairly close to the same tonnage as the previous year. We are currently paying \$55.85 a ton for household waste and we did pay \$15.00 a ton fee on recyclables for several months.

The biggest change in volumes this past year has been demolition and brush, they were up by 94 ton over the previous year.

We are trying to get maximum compaction in the containers to save on hauling costs, sometimes we can not get a truck here soon enough to swap out the containers so we have to put trash or recyclables in the old building until we get a new container swapped out.

Librarian's Report 2013

Patrons have saved \$229,216.19 this year by using their local Library instead of purchasing materials for themselves. This total does not include the inter-library loan books that were borrowed from other libraries in Maine and out of state, the Large Print collection from the Maine State Library, nor all the eBooks and audio books of the Download Library.


Repairs and updates to the Library:

- Existing lights inside have been retrofitted through the Efficiency Maine Program.
- Outdoor timer/motion lights have been replaced with energy efficient units.
- A new light has been put in the cupola to match the other outside lighting.
- A water heater timer has been installed.
- The entire building has been pressure washed. The exterior fascia and soffits, gable ends and metal basement vents were scraped and painted. All windows and doors have been painted.
- The flagpole has been painted.
- A project to refinish the solid oak Library tables has begun. One table has been refinished and returned to the Library. A second table was taken to begin the process.
- The chimney has been water sealed. Work has begun on taking the chimney down to below the roof level, capping it off, and then building the roof over it. Several rows of loose bricks in the upper part of the chimney, that were considered a danger, have been removed.
- Last fall, a large maple tree was removed from the front lawn to prepare the site for a Parking Project in the spring.

This summer's Reading Program was Scurry Up and Read. Of the 48 registrants, 31 completed the Program. Congratulations! Thanks to everyone who made it possible – volunteers, local businesses, staff, and all the participants! Saturday's Family Story Time and Wednesday's Preschool Story Time (both at 10:30) are still being enjoyed by one and all. The Knit and Crochet Group officially meets on the fourth Tuesday of the month at 5:30, but we invite everyone to come any Tuesday. We thank the regulars for their continued attendance and our volunteer instructors for giving of their time!

Unfortunately, in October Director Elaine Smith went out on Medical Leave due to kidney cancer. She has since resigned from the Library. We thank her for everything she has done for the benefit of the Library and its patrons during her time as Director. We also thank everyone for their amazing support for Elaine!

Mother nature gave us some challenges over the last yr with far more rain than usual and then winter setting in early and staying with us. We had to replace our SCADA system because one of the windy storms this summer knocked the power out and at some point it destroyed our SCADA system. Our total treated flow for 2013 was 203.4 million gals. an increase of 16.99 million gals compared to the year before. Our BOD removal for the yr averaged 90% and Totals suspended solids removal of 92%.

We dewatered 1.3 million gals resulting in 210 tons of solids removed.

Warren Smith came to work as a new operator in May and Willard Parker came in as a new operator in October. Both men got there grade II wastewater license that they tested for in Nov.

The old Muffin Monster grinder was replaced with a new 3/8" mechanical bar screen in August and it is working very well. We built a temporary building around it for the winter and plans are to put a permanent building over the whole structure this year.

We applied for and was granted an amendment on our wastewater license allowing us to accept septage from haulers and dump them into a designated area upstream from the plant. We are now licensed to accept up 6,000 gals per day.

Cooking oil/grease, clothing, plastic's, hypodermic needles and anything that doesn't break down in water should not be flushed. Those items are causing costly unnecessary break downs, sewer plugs, disposal fees and risk hazards to employees. Please think before flushing.

To the Town Manager, Selectmen, and Citizens:

The Code Enforcement Department is responsible for protecting the public health, safety, and general welfare of all the citizens and visitors of the Town of Livermore Falls through the administration of local, state, and federal laws and ordinances. In the Code Department I issue building permits, septic system permits, internal plumbing permits, and electrical permits. I also serve as the Secretary to the Planning Board and Board of Appeals.

This past year we saw an increase in building permits and plumbing permits which means upgrades were made to existing property's, new homes were built, and mobile homes were moved and replaced. New this year we started issuing Electrical Connection Notification Permits. This was done to track new service installs, relocation of service, and upgrades in service. This also involves a municipal approval through Central Maine Power. This has improved permitting for mobile home relocation and helps keep track of Owners moving mobile homes in and out of Town. We issued 19 Electrical Connection Notification Permits this year. Many dilapidated structures were torn down this past year and complaints pertaining to Rental Housing Code Ordinance reduced.

The Planning Board was busy early in 2013 drafting Ordinances and processing Site Plan Review Applications. Volunteers are needed on the Planning Board and also the Board of Appeals. If anyone is interested in either please contact myself or the Town Manager.

The Town of Livermore Falls website is continually updated with Ordinance updates, permit forms, and other important messages. Please be sure to check it out at www.lfmc.org. I continue to attend trainings, workshops, and code conference's to stay current on rules and laws which affect the Town. I am required to attend and obtain so many credit hours annually to maintain my certification as a State of Maine Code Enforcement Officer & Plumbing Inspector.

The Goal of the Code Enforcement Department is to gain compliance though voluntary compliance. If this cannot be reached, the matter is brought before the Selectmen and the violation will then go to court if necessary. The mission of the Code Enforcement Department is to educate, prevent, and assist in all matters that are brought forward. I am proud to serve the Town of Livermore Falls and excited for the future and look forward to serving for many years to come. If I can be of any assistance please feel free to contact me.

Infrastructure upgrades:

This past year we accomplished the Green St. Project under a contract for services with C.H. Stevenson Inc. This project consisted of installing just over 600ft. of 6" Ductile iron water main and 350ft. of water services to 10 different properties along Green Street.

In House projects:

This year four in-house projects were accomplished within both the town limits of Jay & Livermore Falls.

-In June, Griffin Field Road was completed with 300ft. of 1" copper being replaced with CTS plastic along with two new water services.


-In July, Beaulier Street was completed with 70ft. of 1" copper being replaced with CTS plastic.

-In April, Duboard Street was completed with 420ft. of 2" water main being replaced along with 245ft. of water services to 7 different properties.

To: Ernest N. Steward, Jr., a constable of the Town of Livermore Falls, in the County of Androscoggin, in the State of Maine:

Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the voters of the Town of Livermore Falls in the County of Androscoggin, in the State of Maine, qualified by law to vote in Town affairs, to meet at the Livermore Falls Municipal Building in said Town of Livermore Falls on Tuesday, the 10th of June 2014 at 8:00 in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles to wit:

Article 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Article 2. To choose by secret ballot in accordance with Title 30, M.R.S.A. Section 2061 all necessary Town Officials including one Selectman/Assessor for a two year term; one Selectman/Assessor for a three year term; and one RSU #73 School Board Director for a three year term.

Note: The polls will open at 8:00 o'clock in the forenoon and close at 8:00 o'clock in the evening.

Article 3: Shall the Town fix dates of October 22, 2014 and March 18, 2015 when taxes shall be due and payable and shall the Town fix a rate of 7% interest to be paid on taxes unpaid after said date?

Recommendation: That 7% per annum be charged commencing on October 23, 2014 on all ½ year payments not paid on or before October 22, 2014 and that 7% per annum be charged commencing on March 19, 2015 on all second ½ year payments not paid on or before March 18, 2015.
