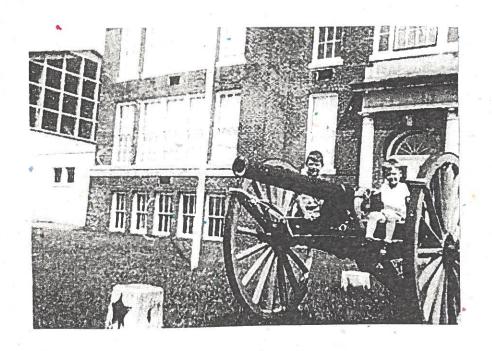
LIVERMORE FALLS TOWN REPORT 2015

The Town of Livermore Falls is pleased to dedicate this year's annual town report to Donald Simoneau. Donald was raised in Livermore Falls and now resides in Fayette with his wife Roberta. He has three children and five grandchildren.

He has been disabled since he was 32 years old but has filled his life with family, communities and volunteering. He has been a veteran's advocate in many ways. He has held almost every office at Post George Bunten American Legion #10 in Livermore Falls. He went on to State level and held all of the offices in line to American Legion State Commander in 2006-2007. He has also held many National titles, Legislative being his most fulfilling. He has spent at least ten years at the Legislative level as a veteran's advocate, testifying on veteran's issues. His Commanders project raised funds to enable a flag be placed on every veteran's grave at the Maine State Veteran's Cemeteries each year for Memorial weekend. This is all done by volunteers.

Donald has also worked on cemeteries in Livermore Falls, Livermore, Jay, Fayette, Canton and several others. He travelled to every cemetery and documented all the veterans and their families to make it easier to find them. He then provided this list to each town and updates it yearly. He helps schedule volunteers to make sure all local veterans in our communities have a flag placed on their graves from May to September.

Donald also heads the Memorial Day Committee which plans and carries out the Memorial Day parades. He spearheaded a project to raise money to engrave the names of World War 2 Veterans on the monument in the Union Street Park. He is currently trying to raise funds to restore the cannon, pictured on our front cover, that is also located in the park.

We want to send our gratitude and appreciation for his dedication and commitment to our community. Don's efforts have inspired many to volunteer and give back to the area and we can't thank him enough.

I would like to express my gratitude to our citizens for allowing me the privilege of serving them as selectman and board chairman for the last three years. I am proud of our town and its citizens for their dedication and all the hours that are volunteered to make our town a success.

I would also like to thank our public highway department for their diligence in keeping our roadways clear this cold, snowy winter despite many equipment issues. The snow was also challenging for our police department and fire department as well as the sewer dept. Thank you all!

Thank you to our tremendously supportive office staff and town manager. They are the ones that keep everything running smoothly including performing janitorial services for the office building.

This year we will finally complete the sidewalk on Park Street from the end of the Foundry Road on the left hand side to Walnut Street allowing our citizens to continue their walk on a main highway in a safe manner.

We once again are struggling to maintain a budget that will not have a huge effect on our mil rate. The Town is at the bottom of the pile when it comes to finances. The school budget and county taxes have a huge impact on the mil rate. Our mil rate increased slightly last year; however it had remained the same for five years which is unheard of. Our Town budget has a slight increase of \$6,000 this year. There will no doubt be a slight increase in the mil rate this year due to our portion of the school's budget increasing \$85,000 and some much needed equipment purchases.

We are struggling with aging equipment and a small equipment reserve account. For many years our equipment reserve account was not funded at a reasonable amount. Our goal is to establish a meaningful reserve so the funds will be there when we need them.

My own personal desire is to have as many citizens at our bi-monthly meetings as possible. I would love to see every chair in the room occupied. It is very helpful to be able to ask those attending their respectful opinion on the discussion at hand. There are times when we have no choice if the situation is a matter required by law. Attendance at public hearings is also desired. This is your town. Choose to make your town a success!!

My three-year term as selectman ends this June and I have made the decision to run again. We have many exciting ideas as well as decisions effecting the fire dept. building this coming year, and I would like to be a part of them. Thank you for your support.

I first want to begin by thanking all those volunteer members, committees, board members, businesses, citizens and last but not least our employees. To manage the town, a team effort is a must and I truly believe we have that dedication and loyalty from all of you.

We seem to always have a few challenges we are faced with for the coming fiscal year and this year is no exception. The changes in reimbursements from the State become a challenge for us to maintain a workable budget to keep taxes at a level we can afford, while maintaining quality service and safety. It may be a difficult task with these budget cuts from the State but every year we are faced with new changes and are hopeful of the outcome.

On a more positive note, we are always looking for ways to attract revenue and pool resources with other communities. We have obtained a T.I.F. agreement with the State of Maine. It will able us to expand our ability in our community for economic growth. This is a tool that municipalities use to shelter money from a project that would otherwise increase our valuation, but loose State Revenue, School Subsidy and increase our share of County Taxes. We will be expanding our sidewalk from the Foundry Road to the existing sidewalk on Park Street. This work should begin sometime this summer. There is a lot of use from spring to late fall and was received as a "Safe Walk to School Grant". We have worked in the past with other communities to share in services, such as equipment sharing and a joint collaborative effort for purchasing heating oil, propane and office paper, just to name a few. The more our town's share and participate together, the cost savings measures benefit all our community tax payers.

It's been a pleasure working for our town as Town Manager. Thank you all for your support and hope I can serve many more years to come.

To the Town Manager, Selectmen and Citizens;

In 2014 the Livermore Falls Police Department received and responded to 2907 calls for emergencies and/or assistance. In addition, 87 arrests were made, 162 criminal summonses issued, 139 traffic summons issued and 990 traffic warnings and/or defects were issued.

Reserve Officer Bruce Benson officially retired this year and Reserve Officer John Furr has retired and moved to a warmer climate. Stephen E. Gould was hired 6/24/2014 to fill the vacant patrol position left when Officer Stephen Wilkinson resigned 6/9/2014. David Tyrol has joined our departments as a reserve officer; he is the Training Director at the Maine Criminal Justice Academy. 3 new recruits were hired on our department as a Reserve Officer and are presently in our departments' field training program. All 3 officers have recently completed the pre-service school at the Academy; their names are listed on the next page.

We continue to update the equipment we can with grant money that's available to us. This year we are presently updating our server system with a homeland security grant and waiting for radios to arrive from the joint County wide grant. We are also waiting for equipment from a JAG grant purchase for the officers' weapons systems. These grants require no matching funds from the Town.

As always, we are dedicated to providing safe and effective public safety services to the citizens of Livermore Falls. I encourage you to contact me with any comments or concerns regarding the police department that you might have.

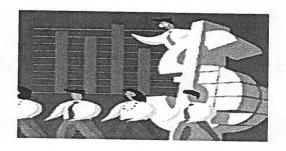

To The Town Manager, Selectmen and Citizens of Livermore Falls,

As most of you know we have had some major amounts of snow this winter with a couple freezing rain storms. We have used much more sand this year than in previous years due to the amounts. The crew did an excellent job keeping up with all the events and keeping the Towns aging fleet going.

Paving consisted of a complete rebuild of the Dodge road, we removed all the old pavement and new gravel installed in a few sections of it and then was paved with a base and surface coat. Bruce Manzer got the bid last year and did an excellent job.

Other projects included installing large culverts on Moose Hill road along with several other smaller culverts throughout the town

2014 Transfer Station Report

All the changes that have taking place at the transfer station since 2010 have made up a \$105,328.00 reduction in the budget for the tax payers of Livermore Falls. Our recycling and household trash is fairly close to the same tonnage as the previous year. We are currently paying \$57.13 a ton for household waste and we did pay \$15.00 a ton fee on recyclables for several months.

The biggest change in volumes this past year has been demolition and brush, they were up by 46 ton over the previous year.

We are trying to get maximum compaction in the containers to save on hauling costs, sometimes we can not get a truck here soon enough to swap out the containers so we have to put trash or recyclables in the old building until we get a new container swapped out.

Treat Memorial Library Librarian's Report 2014

Patrons saved \$190,577.50 in 2014 by using their library instead of purchasing materials themselves. This total does not include the inter-library loan items that were borrowed from other Maine libraries and out of state, the Large Print collection from the Maine State Library, nor all the eBooks and audio books of the Download Library.

The handicapped parking area is well underway. Patrons are already able to use it even though it isn't paved yet. Last summer's weather didn't have a long enough dry spell for the crew to pave. Hopefully, this summer will be better.

A mold issue was discovered in the room used by the King's Daughters. The room was stripped floor to ceiling and cleaned by ServPro. This Spring ServPro will check the room again to verify the problem has been resolved.

Brianna Rush was hired as the new Assistant Director. She has overseen the library's programs and even started some new ones, in addition to all her day-to-day duties.

Nick Berry was hired as a Library Aide. Being a recent college graduate, he brings current insight into the changing role of a library.

This was another year our library was able to receive a grant from the Libri Foundation. Thanks to them and their generous supporters we received 87 juvenile books worth in excess of \$1,400. Titles included math and science, as well as picture and chapter books.

The Summer Reading Program was "Book a Trip." Participants were taken around the world through stories, crafts, and discussions. Of the 28 registrants 8 completed the program. We celebrated their success with a program by Odds Bodkin, master storyteller and musician, who told and sang "Awesome Tales."

For other programming, we hosted the Maine State Library's "Petting Zoo", a chance for patrons to have hands-on experience with a variety of e-reader devices. For our staff, we held a book repair workshop and invited staff from other interested libraries. Our regular programming still includes Wednesday's Story Time, Saturday's Family Story Time, and Tuesday's Knit & Crochet Group. New to the lineup is a book discussion group for adults.

Elsie's Reread Used Book Emporium is doing well. It has recently been restocked with no-longer circulating items weeded from the library's collection. Donations of books are received all year long from the generous public. Thank you.

Our new building around the bar screen is completed with the exception of some electrical work.

In Feb of 2014 after working with the DEP we got licensed to receive 6,000 gpd of septage. From Feb. – Dec. we took in 530,750 gals of septage resulting in a revenue of \$53,750.

The total treated flow for 2014 was 187.7 million gals.

We removed 1.5 million gals of sludge that produced 295.7 tons of dry solids equaling 351 yds.

The plant ran very well throughout the year. The average BOD removal was 92% and TSS 94%.

We hired Ted Berry to video approximately ¼ of the town's sewer lines, starting on the North end of town and found that many of the lines were in need of repair. We made repairs on the line's that had the more serious problems, those being Cargill St. Searles St, Vine St, Bailey St and Marion Ave. There are still more repairs needed but funds are not there to complete them all.

In ending I will say that I understand money is a concern for everyone and I have tried my best to come up with ways of cutting operating costs and ways to bring in money. Our power bill has stayed about \$1,000.00 less per month with the installation of the Primary effluent pump VFD's and the septage income has certainly helped. Mark Holt and I are looking into a less expensive way of getting rid of our dewatered sludge so that will hopefully be another savings to report in the future.

The treatment plant is open Monday – Thursday from 5:30 am to 4:00 pm and Friday 5:30 am to 2:00 pm. We will give anyone a tore of the facility that stops's by. You might be impressed at seeing the results from what comes in and what is discharged back to the river.

To the Town Manager, Selectmen, and Citizens:

The Code Enforcement Department is responsible for protecting the public health, safety, and general welfare of all the citizens and visitors of the Town of Livermore Falls through the administration of local, state, and federal laws and ordinances. In the Code Department I issue building permits, septic system permits, internal plumbing permits, and electrical permits. I also serve as the Secretary to the Planning Board and Board of Appeals.

This past year the Planning Board met to review Site Plans, drafted some new ordinances, and worked on updating the Comprehensive Plan. The Planning Board & Board of Appeals has vacancies and

if anyone is interested in either please contact myself or the Town Manager.

In 2014 the Code Office issued 15 Building Notification Permits and 12 Electrical Notification Permits. In Livermore Falls a Building Notification Permit is required if you are creating or expanding anything larger than 200 square feet. An Electrical Notification Permit is needed if you are replacing, upgrading or it's just a new electrical system. Both of these permits are free and are currently just intended for notification to the Town. Plumbing Permits are required when adding new or replacing existing plumbing. This is a State Mandate and we follow that fee schedule. If you have any questions regarding permitting please don't hesitate to contact my office.

The Town of Livermore Falls website is continually updated with Ordinance updates, permit forms, and other important messages. Please be sure to check it out at www.lfme.org. I continue to attend trainings, workshops, and code conference's to stay current on rules and laws which affect the Town. I am required to attend and obtain so many credit hours annually to maintain my certification as a State of

Maine Code Enforcement Officer & Plumbing Inspector.

The Goal of the Code Enforcement Department is to gain compliance though voluntary compliance. If this cannot be reached, the matter is brought before the Selectmen and the violation will then go to court if necessary. The mission of the Code Enforcement Department is to educate, prevent, and assist in all matters that are brought forward. I am proud to serve the Town of Livermore Falls and excited for the future and look forward to serving for many years to come. If I can be of any assistance please feel free to contact me.

The Trustees of the Livermore Falls Water District hereby submit this annual report for the year ending December 31, 2014.

Infrastructure upgrades & In House projects:

In the year 2014 we accomplished three In House projects. The Highland and Marcello Street projects in Jay and the Gordon Street project in Livermore Falls.

These projects were required as upgrades to improve existing infrastructure.

The Highland project consisted of discontinuing 895ft. of existing 6"&8" AC main and replacing it by installing 429ft.of 6" and 466ft. of 8" Ductile iron water main which included 3 new gate valves and 192ft. of water services to 7 different properties along Highland Street in Jay. This project was accomplished during the months of June and July.

The Gordon Street project consisted of discontinuing 200ft. of existing 11/4" copper main and replacing it by installing 200ft. of 2" SDR 21 plastic. This project included new services to 3 different properties in Livermore Falls. This project was accomplished during the months of July.

The Marcello Street consisted of discontinuing 400ft. of existing 11/4" copper main and replacing it by installing 400ft. of 2" SDR 21 plastic. This project included new services to 5 different properties in Jay. This project was accomplished during the months of August.

All work included in these projects was completed under and by joint participation efforts with both the town departments of Jay and Livermore Falls.
