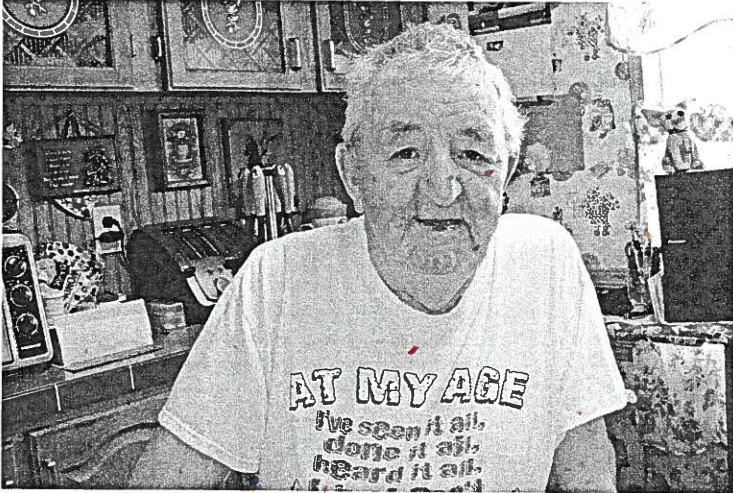

Dear Friends:

It is an honor to represent Maine in the United States Senate. I am grateful for the trust the people of our State have placed in me and welcome this opportunity to share some key accomplishments from 2015.

Growing the economy by encouraging job creation was and remains my top priority. The tax-relief bill signed into law at the close of last year contains three key provisions I authored to help foster job creation and provide small businesses with the certainty they need to invest, grow, and, most important, hire new workers. Another provision I authored that became law last year gives a boost to both Maine's economy and traffic safety. This provision permanently changed the federal law that previously had forced the heaviest trucks onto our country roads and downtown streets, rather than allowing them to use Maine's federal Interstates. In addition, I was glad to help secure another significant award for the University of Maine's deepwater offshore wind initiative, which has the potential to advance an emerging industry and create thousands of good jobs in our state.

Maine's historic contributions to our nation's defense must continue. In 2015, I secured funding toward a much-needed additional Navy destroyer, likely to be built at Bath Iron Works. Modernization projects at the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard that I have long advocated for were also completed, as were projects for the Maine National Guard.

I was also deeply involved in crafting the new education reform law to better empower states and communities in setting educational policy for their students. The law also extends a program I co-authored that provides additional assistance to rural schools, which has greatly benefitted our state. A \$250 tax deduction I authored in 2002 for teachers who spend their own money on classroom supplies was also made permanent last year.

As a result of a scientific evaluation of the nutritional value of potatoes required by a law that I wrote, the wholesome fresh potato finally was included in the federal WIC nutrition program. I also worked on other issues important to Maine's farmers and growers, including research on wild blueberries and pollinating bees.


As Chairman of the Housing Appropriations Subcommittee, I have made combating veterans' homelessness a priority. This year's housing funding law includes \$60 million for 8,000 new supportive housing vouchers for homeless veterans. Since this program began in 2008, the number of homeless veterans nationwide has dropped by one third. Maine has received nearly 200 vouchers to support homeless veterans.

Last year, I became Chairman of the Senate Aging Committee. My top three priorities for the committee are retirement security, investing more in biomedical research, and fighting fraud and financial abuses targeting our nation's seniors. I advocated for the \$2 billion increase in funding for the National Institutes of Health to advance research on such diseases as diabetes and Alzheimer's. The Senate also unanimously passed my bill to support family caregivers. The Aging Committee's toll-free hotline (1-855-303-9470) makes it easier for senior citizens to report suspected fraud and receive assistance and has already received more than 1,000 calls.

A Maine value that always guides me is our unsurpassed work ethic. As 2015 ended, I cast my 6,072nd consecutive vote, continuing my record of never missing a roll-call vote since my Senate service began in 1997.

I appreciate the opportunity to serve Androscoggin County and Maine in the United States Senate. Dear Friends of Livermore Falls:

It has been a privilege to serve the State of Maine since being sworn into the U.S. Senate.

Much of my time in Washington this past year has been devoted to the Senate Armed Services Committee and the Select Committee on Intelligence. Protecting our homeland and the people of Maine from terrorism and violence remains one of my top priorities. Through my work on the Armed Services Committee, I was able to secure several provisions in the 2016 National Defense Authorization Act that benefit Maine. The legislation authorizes the construction of an additional DDG-51 Arleigh Burke Class Destroyer that could be built at Bath Iron Works and expands the HUBZone program to stimulate economic growth at former military installations like the former Brunswick Naval Air Station.

Returning control to teachers, school districts, and states has also been a primary concern of mine. I am encouraged that the Every Student Succeeds Act has become law. It eliminates the burdensome requirements of the No Child Left Behind Act and ensures access to a quality education for all students. A provision I helped author in the bill will give states the opportunity to pilot the use of their own proficiency-based assessments in lieu of federally-mandated standardized tests. Also included in the bill are several measures I secured to promote local input, fund education technology initiatives, and explore new strategies to increase student access to the internet outside of school.

Communities across Maine have taken bold action to improve their broadband connectivity, and I have been proud to foster federal support for these types of projects. My amendments to the Every Student Succeeds Act will promote the type of work already occurring in Washington County, where students who lack broadband access are able to check out mobile hotspots from their local libraries. Additionally, a bill I cosponsored, the Community Broadband Act, helped pave the way for the FCC to enact rules protecting the ability of municipalities to invest in better broadband. I am excited by Maine's leadership on this important economic development issue and will continue to support local efforts in this area.

After extensive negotiations, the Senate passed a five-year transportation bill that will increase highway and transit funding in Maine and provide stability to improve our transportation infrastructure. The legislation contains provisions I cosponsored to cut red tape and improve predictability and timeliness by streamlining the federal permitting process for large infrastructure projects. Also incorporated in this bill are my provisions to relieve financial regulations on Maine's community banks and credit unions and to reauthorize the Export-Import Bank, a critical tool that supports communities and small business across the state.

Following my inquiries in the Energy and Natural Resources Committee, the National Park Service has announced they will begin exploring strategies to allow park visitors to purchase electronic passes online and will pilot the program at Acadia National Park. These passes would improve access to our nation's most treasured landscapes and would generate resources for years to come. I remain deeply engaged in preserving Maine's natural beauty and strengthening our outdoor recreation economy.

It is with solemn responsibility that I have focused my energy addressing the opioid epidemic in Maine. This work includes convening roundtables with a wide-range of health care and law enforcement professionals to combat addiction; introducing a proposal to safely dispose of excess prescription drugs; cosponsoring a



Senate-passed bill that addresses mothers struggling with addiction and the alarming effect it has on newborns; cosponsoring the TREAT Act, which expands the ability of medical specialists to provide life-saving medication-assisted therapies for patients battling heroin and prescription drug addiction; and calling on the Commander of U.S. Southern Command to increase efforts to stop the flow of heroin at our southern border.

I like to think of Maine as a big small town – and in a small town, the leaders are accessible and eager to listen. In that spirit, I've made it a priority to stay connected with people from all over Maine who e-mail, write, and call with suggestions or questions. 

To Kristal Flagg, the Board of Selectmen, the residents of Livermore Falls, and Livermore Falls Firefighters

I would like to start by thanking you for the opportunity to serve you as Fire Chief for the Town of Livermore Falls. This past year has been a difficult challenge as the fire department has undergone major change. For those who are not aware, in 2014 there was a significant structural deficiency with the fire station which led to many constructive conversations about how to proceed. As the process has moved along we were forced to move out of the fire station and now have trucks located in three locations. Engine 3 and Ladder 3 are located at a rented garage on Route 133, the Utility truck is located in a bay at the town garage, and Engine 1 & Engine 2 are located at the Chisholm Fire Station in Jay. While this completely divides our equipment, it provides us the ability to function until our home can be repaired.

In February, there was a special town meeting where residents voted to authorize exploring two options for our station. One option would make the required repairs so we can move back in. The second option would repair our station and fix the front bays of our current station to allow room to house our fire apparatus. Currently, due to the size of the building we are forced to park the Ladder truck, Engine 1, and Engine 2 in the single rear bay. This makes it difficult to select apparatus without having to move these vehicles around just to fit out the door.

In the coming year we are looking forward to the communities support to help rebuild our home and get our equipment back in town. This will help build our teams' spirit by bringing them back together and help us move forward to protect the residents and assets of our community.

Our department remains very active with emergency calls. We average about 5 calls per week and provide emergency services for all fires, EMS calls as requested, and rescue incidents as needed. We accomplish this with about 20 firefighting personnel. We like many departments, are faced with the challenge of our personnel working out of town. For this reason, we are constantly working to spark interest in personnel and need this help so we can meet our department mission. If you have any interest in joining we would encourage you to apply. Applications can be obtained at the Town Office during normal business hours or calling the fire station.

I would like to thank the residents and taxpayers of Livermore Falls for your financial support of our organization, the board of selectmen for advocating our service, Town Manager Kristal Flagg for your leadership and help managing our department this year, the Highway Department for helping to maintain our equipment and making room for us, Jay Fire Rescue for providing us space for our two engines, and the Livermore Falls Firefighters who make this organization what it is today. I would also like to thank all of our mutual aid partners and community members who have come together to help our department this year.

To the Town Manager, Selectmen and Citizens;

In 2015 the Livermore Falls Police Department received and responded to 2814 calls for emergencies and/or assistance. In addition, 97 arrests were made, 183 criminal summonses issued, 191 traffic summons issued and 1479 traffic warnings and/or defects were issued.

Officer Stephen E. Gould has completed basic training at the Maine Criminal Justice Academy and Officer Michael Pina will have completed his basic training on May 20th 2016. Michael Pina was hired 8/23/2015 to fill the vacant patrol position left when Officer Daniel Chabot resigned 6/15/2015 to work at Auburn PD. He will be remaining with us as a reserve officer. Reserve Officer Connor Willard was hired 10/16/2015 and has completed his field training. We also would like to announce that Roger Labbe completed Law Enforcement Chaplain Certification training on 2/27/2015 at the Police Academy and is the Police Chaplain for our Department.

We continue to update the equipment as we can with grant money that's available to us. This year we are presently updating our security system with a homeland security grant. We also upgraded equipment from a JAG grant purchase for the officers' weapons systems. These grants require no matching funds from the Town.

2015 Highway Report

To The Town Manager, Selectmen and Citizens of Livermore Falls,

We have had the easiest winter in several years with 41” of snow and a couple freezing rain storms. We have used less sand this year than in previous years due to the amounts. The crew did an excellent job keeping up with the storms.

Paving consisted of a complete rebuild of Gilbert Street. We removed all the old pavement and new gravel installed in a few sections of it and then was paved with a base and surface coat. Also there was surface pavement installed on Water, Green and Heritage Ave. Spencer Group got the bid last year and did an excellent job.

Other projects included cutting brush, ditching and repairing a section of the Jug Hill Road, along with ditching and several small culverts were changed throughout the town.

Another good project that was done last year was mapping all the street signs and culvert crossings throughout Livermore Falls, They are all located online at AVCOG’s website along with several other area Town’s.

2015 Transfer Station Report

All the changes that have taken place at the transfer station since 2010 have made a very large reduction in the budget for the tax payers of Livermore Falls. Our recycling and household trash is fairly close to the same tonnage as the previous year. We are currently paying \$57.13 a ton for household waste and we now pay \$15.00 a ton fee on recyclables until the markets start to rise again.

We are trying to get maximum compaction in the containers to save on hauling costs. Sometimes we can not get a truck here soon enough to swap out the containers so we have to put trash or recyclables in the old building until we get a new container swapped out.

Librarian's Report 2015

Patrons saved \$181,547.08 in 2015 by using their library instead of purchasing materials themselves. This total does not include the inter-library loan items that were borrowed from other Maine libraries and out of state, the Large Print collection from the Maine State Library, nor all the eBooks and audio books of the Download Library.

The parking area at the front of the Library is now paved. There are two spaces – one designated handicapped and the other for quick visits to drop off materials in the bookdrop, pick up materials and/or people. Our older and handicapped patrons greatly appreciate this additional parking.

A mold issue was discovered in the room used by the King's Daughters in 2014. The room was stripped floor to ceiling and cleaned by ServPro. It has been repainted and a new ceiling and new flooring installed. Other improvements to the Library include the replacement of an exterior door that accesses our used book store. It has made it weather proof, which our volunteers greatly appreciate.

Nick Berry was hired as Library Director for Hartland Public Library and we wish him well. Alana Knapp was hired as his replacement as Library Aide.

The Summer Reading Program was "Every Hero has a Story." Participants learned that there are more heroes than just "Super" ones. Of the 39 registrants 32 completed the program. We celebrated their success with a program by Farmer Minor and his pig Daisy, where Brianna kissed the pig!

Our regular programming still includes Wednesday's Story Time, Saturday's Family Story Time, Tuesday's Knit & Crochet Group, and a book discussion group for adults. We also offer a Teen Writers Group young aspiring authors and poets.

Elsie's Reread Used Book Emporium is doing well. Donations of books are received all year long from the generous public. Thank you.

2015 Sewer Report

The sewer treatment plant ran very well throughout most of the year with mostly routine maintenance. We received 685,550 gallons of septic waste. The flows were much lower than in the past. We treated 138.65 million gals of wastewater and averaged a 94% removal in BOD and 95% in Total Suspended solids. One thing that helped reduce the flows was, when doing a sewer main repair we removed 4 storm drains that were still tied into the sewer system. Items that need repairs at the plant are the chain and sprockets on the grit system and chains and wear plates on the Primary clarifier's.

We had a major problem at the Redwater brook pump station that resulted in replacing the pumps and electrical system. Now all of the stations are in pretty good shape. Sewer Mains are a different story. Many of the sewer mains need to be replaced. They are old clay pipes and are cracking and falling apart. We are getting estimates to replace the Sewer Main on Reynolds Ave. This line has cracks in it from Knapp St to Main St and has one of the highest flow rates in the town. Other mains that need to be replaced ASAP are Cargill, Searles, and Union streets.

I have been asked why the Sewer bill is so much higher than the water bill. The answer to that is, it takes a lot more equipment to clean up wastewater. We encourage you to stop by and we will give you a tour so that you can see what is involved. Each yr. Rob Taylor brings some of his students from High School down for a tour. It must be worth doing because this will make the third yr. of them coming.

Remember if water doesn't break down an object, or if it is flammable, poisonous or sharp, it should not end up in a sewer drain. Hope to see some of you for a tour.

The Trustees of the Livermore Falls Water District hereby submit this annual report for the year ending December 31, 2015.

Infrastructure upgrades:

This past year we assisted in the start of the Main St. Project which was under contract services with RJ Grondin & Sons. This project went differently than expected in that it was started on the Jay side and we had assumed that it would start at the bottom of Pineau St. where we had ended in 2011. All in all, things went well. Approximately 400ft of 8" AC main was replaced starting at the Jay Meter Pit and ending at the bottom of Quellette St. One hydrant was replaced along with three services. The remainder of the project will be accomplished in 2016

In House projects:

This year six in-house projects were completed. Two within the town limits of Jay and Four within Livermore Falls.

Livermore Falls area:

-In February at Moose Hill Pond we replaced 100ft of 1" copper water service with 1' CTS at the Finish water pump station.

- In June, Gilbert St. was completed with 125ft of 1" copper being replaced with 1" CTS. This was accomplished in coordination with the Towns paving plan.

Also in June at the intersection of Bailey and Marion we replaced 40ft of 1 1/4" copper with 1 1/4" CTS.

-In September on Gagnon St. we replaced 100ft of 1 1/4" copper with 1" CTS.


Jay area:

-In June we replaced and installed a new Waterous fire hydrant at 129 Franklin Road.

- In August we replaced 165ft of 1 1/4" plastic with 1 1/4" CTS across Community Drive in Jay to service the Head Start Bld.

2016 Annual Town Meeting Warrant

To: Ernest N. Steward, Jr., a constable of the Town of Livermore Falls, in the County of Androscoggin, in the State of Maine:

Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the voters of the Town of Livermore Falls in the County of Androscoggin, in the State of Maine, qualified by law to vote in Town affairs, to meet at the Livermore Falls Municipal Building in said Town of Livermore Falls on Tuesday, the 14th of June 2016 at 8:00 in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles to wit:

Article 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Article 2. To choose by secret ballot in accordance with Title 30, M.R.S.A. Section 2061 all necessary Town Officials including one Selectman/Assessor for a two year term; one Selectman/Assessor for a three year term; and one RSU #73 School Board Director for a three year term.

Note: The polls will open at 8:00 o'clock in the forenoon and close at 8:00 o'clock in the evening.

Article 3:	Shall the Town fix dates of October 20, 2016 and March 16, 2017 when taxes shall be due and payable and shall the Town fix a rate of 7% interest to be paid on taxes unpaid after said date?
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Recommendation: That 7% per annum be charged commencing on October 21, 2016 on all ½ year payments not paid on or before October 20, 2016 and that 7% per annum be charged commencing on March 17, 2017 on all second ½ year payments not paid on or before March 16, 2017.

Article 4:	Shall the Town fix an interest rate of 5% on all taxes abated that have been paid in full, amount to be paid from the date the taxes were paid?
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Article 5:	Shall the Town charge a 7% interest rate to any sewer assessments not paid within 60 days of the quarterly billing date?
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Article 6:	Shall the Town authorize the Selectmen on behalf of the Town to retain, sell or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town for non-payment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they may deem advisable and in the Town's best interest, and to execute quit claim deeds for such property?
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Article 7: Shall the Town authorize the Selectmen acting in their capacity as Sewer Trustees, to on the Town's behalf, retain, sell or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town for non-payment of sewer assessments thereon, on such terms as they may deem advisable and in the Town's best interest, and to execute quit claim deeds for such property?

Article 8: Shall the Town authorize the Selectmen on behalf of the Town, to accept or reject any and all gifts as they deem advisable, and to expend any monetary gifts on the designated purpose of that gift?

Article 9: Shall the Town authorize the Selectmen on behalf of the Town to apply for and accept State and Federal grants in the interest of improving the Town?

Article 10: Shall the Town carry the balances forward in the following accounts: Recreation, Landfill, Contingency, Capital Improvements, Street Paving, CEO and Fire Dept.?
