Dear Friends:

It is an honor to represent Maine in the United States Senate. I am grateful for the trust the people of our State have placed in me and welcome this opportunity to share some key accomplishments.

Growing our economy by encouraging job creation remains a top priority. The tax relief bill enacted during this last Congress contains provisions I authored to provide small businesses with the certainty that they need to invest, grow, and, most important, hire new workers. The 2017 National Defense Authorization Act includes a provision the Maine delegation worked together to champion requiring that military recruits be provided with athletic footwear made in America, as is required for other equipment and uniform items whenever possible. This is a great victory for our troops and for the 900 skilled workers at New Balance factories here in Maine.

Maine's contributions to our national security stretch from Kittery to Limestone. As a senior member of the Appropriations Committee, I successfully advocated for critical funding for projects at the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard and \$1 billion towards the construction of an additional ship that will likely be built at Bath Iron Works. This funding will strengthen the Navy and our national security, and the additional destroyer will help meet the Navy's goal of a 355-ship fleet.

Maine's growing population of older individuals creates many challenges. That's why, as Chairman of the Senate Aging Committee, my top three priorities are fighting fraud and financial abuse directed at our nation's seniors, increasing investments in biomedical research, and improving retirement security.

The Aging Committee's toll-free hotline (1-855-303-9470) makes it easier for senior citizens to report suspected fraud and receive assistance. Last May, a call to the hotline helped lead to the arrest of a national crime ring targeting seniors, and in June I worked to secure the humanitarian release of a Maine senior who had been imprisoned in Spain after being victimized by an international drug smuggling scam.

The Aging Committee also released an extensive report detailing the findings of our bipartisan investigation into the abrupt and dramatic price increases for prescription drugs whose patents expired long ago.


I advocated strongly for the \$2 billion increase in funding for the National Institutes of Health to advance research on such diseases as diabetes and Alzheimer's. I also championed and authored portions of the 21st Century Cures Act that will further support biomedical innovation and make significant reforms to our mental health system.

The Senate also took steps in the past year to combat the nation's heroin and opioid epidemic by passing the Comprehensive Addiction and Recovery Act (CARA), which I was proud to cosponsor. CARA is a monumental step forward in our effort to address the devastating addiction crisis affecting countless families and communities across the country and right here in Maine.

A Maine value that always guides me is our unsurpassed work ethic. In December 2016, I cast my 6,236th consecutive vote, continuing my record of never missing a roll-call vote since my Senate service began in 1997.

Dear Friends of Livermore Falls,

Since being sworn into the Senate in 2013, I have made it my mission to address at the federal level the most important issues facing our great state. Working closely with my colleagues in the Maine Congressional Delegation, we've been able to successfully secure a number of legislative victories that support our state's economy, our rich traditions, and the hardworking people I am proud to represent.

In an increasingly polarized Congress, my goal as an Independent is to put partisanship aside, build consensus and further common-sense solutions to address the needs of the American people. To this end, I have co-founded the Former Governors Caucus, a group of former state executives who are frustrated with legislative gridlock and eager to find bipartisan solutions. And as always, I aim to bridge the partisan divide by hosting barbeque dinners in Washington with colleagues ranging from Ted Cruz to Elizabeth Warren. If you know a person's children, then you see them as a mother or father and not a rival vote, and working to further personal dialogue and build relationships can lay the foundation for successful legislation.

One of the accomplishments of which I am most proud is the legislative victory that protects our college students and their families from an expensive hike in student loan interest rates. In 2013, as students face a significant spike in interest rates that would have taken thousands of dollars out of their pockets, I brought together colleagues from across the political spectrum to broker compromise legislation called the Bipartisan Student Loan Certainty Act. Thanks to this bill, students will save \$50 billion over the next 10 years by lowering their interest rates, which means that a student in Maine will now save between \$3,000 and \$6,000 over the life of their loan.

Being an Independent in the Senate has allowed me to make calls and vote on policies that are best for Maine, but it has also made it possible to play key roles in finding simple solutions and legislative fixes that make good commonsense to both parties. Of course, much of what we do in the Senate doesn't happen on the Senate floor, or even in committee. Instead, it involves working across all levels of government to ensure the State of Maine receives attention and support from the federal government.

Take, for example, the opioid and heroin epidemic devastating communities across our state. While Congress has passed legislative solutions aimed at expanding access to medical treatment, I've also pressed for other changes that can be accomplished more quickly and make a more immediate difference in Maine. For example, I successfully urged the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services to increase the number of patients to whom a doctor can provide medication-assisted treatment, and in 2015 brought the Director of the Office of National Drug Control Policy to Brewer to meet directly with Mainers and hear their stories. I've also engaged law enforcement - including the Drug Enforcement Agency - to crack down on the production of opioids and work to limit their diversion. Together, Senator Collins and I helped pass the Northern Border Security Review Act to combat drug and human trafficking along our border with Canada.

While the opioid epidemic is certainly our biggest public health crisis, job loss in Maine is still our number one economic problem and that's why we need to focus on bringing good paying jobs back to Maine and protecting the ones we still have. As a member of the Armed Services Committee, I teamed up with Senator Collins and Representative Poliquin to successfully secure a provision in the defense bill that can help domestic shoe manufacturers like New Balance. The three of us also worked together with the Department of Commerce to establish an Economic Development Assessment Team, known as an EDAT, to assist Maine's forest industry in the wake of several mill closures. We have an incredible spirit of innovation and ingenuity in Maine and I believe finding ways to invest in that spirit will reignite Maine's forest products sector and our economy. Part of our economic path forward must also include expanding access to high-speed broadband, which can help connect our businesses and communities to information and economic opportunities.



Dear Citizens of Livermore Falls:

Maine has a long tradition of civil participation in both state and local government, and I thank you for being informed and involved citizens.

My vision for Maine is prosperity, not poverty. For this reason, one of my top priorities continues to be the reduction and eventual elimination of the income tax. Raising the minimum wage is not the path out of poverty; I want Mainers to earn a career wage. Reducing the income tax is the biggest and most immediate pay raise for all hard-working Mainers.

Not only does an income tax cut put more money back in your pockets, but it will also attract businesses that can offer good-paying careers to keep our young people here. It shows the nation that we are serious about wanting people and businesses to come—and stay—in Maine.

Unfortunately, voters approved a referendum question to raise the income tax to 10.15% on successful Maine households and small businesses. Enacting the second highest income tax rate in the country shows the nation we are eager to punish people for being successful. It will drive them out of our state and make it even more difficult to attract much-needed doctors, dentists, scientists, engineers and other professionals to Maine. They can live in neighboring New Hampshire, which takes no income tax from their paychecks. Even worse, there is no guarantee the extra revenue from this tax will go to fund education, as proponents promised.

As successful people leave Maine, state and municipal government will lose the significant amount they pay in property, sales and incomes taxes. This will put even more upward pressure on local property taxes. Municipalities will have to get more creative to provide local services without increasing property taxes. Reforming the tree growth program, collecting property taxes on land in conservation or preservation programs, charging a payment in lieu of taxes on state land that is taken off the property tax rolls and having non-profit organizations pay a two-percent tax on their net revenues are all ways for municipalities to increase revenues.

I first want to begin by thanking all those volunteer members, committees, board members, businesses, citizens and last but not least our employees. To manage the town, a team effort is a must and I appreciate the dedication and loyalty from all of you.

The citizens of Livermore Falls have voted to "re-hab" our current Fire Station instead of building a new one. This will be exciting and is a well needed facility for our community. The strategic effort from everyone to relocate our fire equipment in different locations has been an inconvenience to our fire fighters and our residence. But we have also been very fortunate to be able to house our equipment at the Town of Jay's Fire Station, the Castonguay garage on Rt. #133 and the Wilton Fire Station. A huge thank you goes out for their efforts that these communities and people that responded to our needs.

As usual we will be working with neighboring towns to see where we can share expenses and our employees. We have an equipment share with Jay, Wilton and Livermore. We have mutual aid with other communities for our Police Service and our Fire Service. We will continue to look at ways to benefit the town and save on expenses. We work with these communities to joint purchase heating oil, propane and have in the past worked with the RSU on purchasing office paper. The Sewer Department will be replacing new sewer lines on a few of the streets this summer. A joint effort will be done to coordinate with the Water District and the Highway Department to keep the costs done to extract the pavement, replace lines and repave the streets. This way when a street is completed the pavement along with the water and sewer lines will be new. Our infrastructure is very old and some of our sewer lines are over 100 years old and are the old style clay pipes. The costs of replacing the sewer lines are enormous so the town targets one or two streets a year. The Sewer Treatment plant will be looking at upgrades as well in the very near future. The life expectancy of the plant is 20 years which will be 2018. The board of trustees will be looking at the future needs and will be looking for any grants that may be available for future projects.

It has been a pleasure working for our town as Town Manager and I want to thank all of you for your support and hope I can serve many more years to come.

To: The residents of Livermore Falls, Town Manager Kristal Flagg, and Selectman,

This past year has been very busy for all of us! We have been working very hard to continue the direction of returning to our fire station and hope there will be more progress in the near future. The construction project is near the final stages of blue prints, will be put out to bid, and a contractor hired to complete the renovation.

The station will remain substantially similar as it looks now, though they will be repairing the floor, wall, roof, adding an overhead door, making the office area ADA compliant, some new interior finishes, and if the budget allows; new insulation & siding on the exterior of the building. We are hopeful the work will be completed by November 1st, so that we can return to our home.

The firefighters have done an amazing job dealing with the locations of our fire equipment and still provide good fire protection to our residence and neighbors. This past year was very busy for us with fire calls and included many different types of emergencies. Our department has a wide range of requests as we strive to meet the public safety needs of Livermore Falls. We are in constant need of firefighters who are willing to help us meet our mission, so if you have any desire to come work with us, we would be pleased to have you. (Applications are available at the Town Office.)

Some of you may have seen a green colored fire truck parked outside our fire station. This past year, the Maine Forest Service helped us acquire a former rescue truck through the Military Surplus Property Program, which reutilizes federal surplus property. We are hoping to make this 1995 Ford into a forestry truck with an onboard water tank for remote firefighting needs. This truck was given to the department and the only costs are to make this truck operational.

In the coming fiscal year we are asking residents to consider creating a fire equipment reserve account to help us better prepare for large capital purchases such as fire trucks. This will not increase our financial requests from previous years because the capital reserve account for SCBAs has sufficient funds to replace our air bottles, which means we are no longer requesting reserve account funds for SCBAs. Our current trucks are a 2007 Tanker Truck, 2005 Utility Truck, 1993 Fire Engine, 1988 Ladder Truck, and a 1981 Fire Engine. Our goal is to eventually update our older engine with a newer truck through either local funding, grants, or military surplus. Our immediate plans are to open the discussions about this replacement as we seek funding or search for less costly options.

Thank you to the residents and taxpayers of Livermore Falls for your financial support of our organization, the Police Department for helping to set me up with a temporary office, the board of selectmen & Town Manager for your guidance, the Highway Department for helping to maintain our equipment, Jay Fire Rescue for working so closely with us, and the Livermore Falls Firefighters who continue to work so hard for our department. I would also like to thank all of our mutual aid partners and community members who have come together to help our department this year.

In 2016 the Livermore Falls Police Department received and responded to 2837 calls for emergencies and/or assistance. In addition, 94 arrests were made, 179 criminal summonses issued, 186 traffic summons issued and 1431 traffic warnings and/or defects were issued.

Officer Troy Reed was hired 8/3/2016 to fill the vacant patrol position left when Officer Devon Bohacik left on 6/30/2016 to work at Auburn PD. Officer Darian Nadeau will have completed his basic training on May 19th 2017. Officer Nadeau was hired 9/26/2016 to fill the vacant patrol position left when Officer Michael Pina resigned 7/23/2016 to work at Bangor PD.

We just finished updating our vehicle computer systems with a Homeland Security Grant. These grants require no matching funds from the Town we are only responsible to cover any cost of a project above the grant allotment. This grant came at an opportune time as the old system was out of compliance with State and Federal standards.

We had a normal Maine winter this year with around 100" of snow and a couple freezing rain storms. We have used approximately 1500 yards of sand and around 500 tons of salt to date. The crew did an excellent job keeping up with the storms.

Paving consisted of a complete rebuild of Reynolds Ave, we removed all the old pavement and Sidewalk, new gravel and pavement installed along with new ADA sidewalk, also there was shim and surface pavement on Pomeroy Hill, Brookside, Parkview and Legendary LN. Spencer Group got the bid last year and did an excellent job.

Other projects included cutting brush, Along with ditching and several small culverts were changed throughout the town.

2016 Transfer Station Report

All the changes that have taking place at the transfer station since 2010 have made up a very large reduction in the budget for the tax payers of Livermore Falls. Our recycling and household trash is fairly close to the same tonnage as the previous year. We are currently paying \$57.13 a ton for household waste and we now pay \$15.00 a ton fee on recyclables until the markets start to rise again.

We are trying to get maximum compaction in the containers to save on hauling costs, sometimes we can not get a truck here soon enough to swap out the containers so we have to put trash or recyclables in the old building until we get a new container swapped out.

Patrons saved \$167,281.16 in 2016 by using their library instead of purchasing materials themselves. This total does not include the inter-library loan items that were borrowed from other Maine libraries and out of state, the Large Print collection from the Maine State Library, nor all the eBooks and audio books of the Download Library.

This year we were able to replace and update some of the Library's furniture to increase comfort for our patrons and add color to our reading areas. We now have "emotional" cushions (with faces) for Story Time. For the Auditorium, there are now 6 new folding tables and 50 new chairs.

This past summer and fall the Library received countless compliments on our front garden. We thank John Beaudoin and his crew of volunteers for their continuing efforts that produce such beautiful results.

The 2016 Summer Reading Program was "Ready, Set, Read." Of the 24 registrants 5 completed the program. For the finale we had Conjuring Carroll, the magician, to entertain.

We now offer a Saturday LEGO Club for future engineers and architects. As part of our "Makerspace" (activities to promote STEM) we also offer 3D pens that can be used at the Library. (For those not familiar with STEM, it stands for Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics.) The 3D pens print out plastic to create three dimensional objects. Look for photos of some completed projects on the Library's Facebook page.

Our regular programming still includes Wednesday's Story Time, Tuesday's Knit & Crochet Group, a monthly book discussion group for adults, and a bi-weekly Teen Writers Group for young aspiring authors and poets.

Elsie's Reread Used Book Emporium is doing well. Donations of books are received all year long from the generous public. Thank you all.

2016 Sewer Report

We struggled most of the year because there was so little rain and that led to extremely low flows which led to solids setting in the lines and going septic. The plant did not run well through more than half of the year and we had to stop taking in septic waste. That means less revenue was taken in. On a good note we managed to stay in compliance. We got our new discharge permit approved and that is good through 2021. We got the amount of septic waste that we can accept when the facility is running good increased from 6,000 gallons/day to 10,000/day. Another change in our permit allows us to do away with week end testing, that should save in the area of \$5,000/yr. This change resulted from past test results and major changes in our SCADA and Alarm system.

To make a long story short we have been making repairs and upgrades throughout the Wastewater Facility and sewer mains. So far we have done this without having to borrow any money to add to the dept. that the department already has.

The treatment facility is on its 17th year since the last upgrade and wear and tear on the equipment and buildings is beginning to show up. Roofs on both buildings need to be replaced and other areas in the system that are 45 – 50 yrs old need upgrading.

There are many areas throughout the town that still have old clay pipe in the ground that is failing. Some of these pipes are over 100 yrs old.

The likely hood of not borrowing more money is looking impossible.

The 1996 GMC truck that was used for the sewer work and snow plowing wouldn't pass inspection and was replaced with a new 2016 Chevy. The other truck at the facility is a 2005 and is beginning to show signs that it will more than likely need to be replace within the next 5 yrs.

I wish I had better news as far as expenses within the wastewater facility but it is what it is. I am trying not to add anymore dept. to the department than what it already has but unfortunately we have reached a point where that may not be possible. I know this isn't good news but I want everyone informed and to know that I am doing the best I can with what we have.

The Trustees of the Livermore Falls Water District hereby submit this annual report for the year ending December 31, 2016.


Infrastructure upgrades:

This past year we assisted in the completion of the Main St. Project which was under contract services with RJ Grondin & Sons. This years portion of the project went from the bottom of Pineau St. to the bottom of Quелlette St. Approximately 1600ft of 6" AC main was replaced with 8" C-900 Plastic, One hydrant was replaced and relocated at the Jay Fire Station. A new 6" sprinkler system was installed at the Amvets Bld. along with seventeen new services being replaced along the project. All in all, things went very well with no issues. RJ Grondin & Sons was easy to work with and did an outstanding job. They are at the top of the list in terms of contractors that we have had to work with.

In House projects:

In house projects this year were focused on the treatment facilities. This consisted of Resanding a filter bed in which 2500cu ft. of new sand was added to #3 filter at the plant. The Lagoon was dredged clean and all trees were removed from the banks, also the trees growing up through the rip rap rock walls around all four filters were removed. At the Finish water pump station the soil behind the retaining wall at the pond was excavated and replaced with a heavy clay soil and a drainage barrier added. All these projects were accomplished in August and September.

2017 Annual Town Meeting Warrant

To: Ernest N. Steward, Jr., a constable of the Town of Livermore Falls, in the County of Androscoggin, in the State of Maine:

Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the voters of the Town of Livermore Falls in the County of Androscoggin, in the State of Maine, qualified by law to vote in Town affairs, to meet at the Livermore Falls Municipal Building in said Town of Livermore Falls on Tuesday, the 13th of June 2017 at 8:00 in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles to wit:

Article 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Article 2. To choose by secret ballot in accordance with Title 30, M.R.S.A. Section 2061 all necessary Town Officials including one Selectman/Assessor for a one year term; one Selectman/Assessor for a two year term; one Selectman/Assessor for a three year term; one RSU #73 School Board Director for a one year term and one RSU #73 School Board Director for a three year term.

Note: The polls will open at 8:00 o'clock in the forenoon and close at 8:00 o'clock in the evening.

Article 3: Shall the Town fix dates of October 17, 2017 and March 20, 2018 when taxes shall be due and payable and shall the Town fix a rate of 7% interest to be paid on taxes unpaid after said date?

Recommendation: That 7% per annum be charged commencing on October 18, 2017 on all ½ year payments not paid on or before October 17, 2017 and that 7% per annum be charged commencing on March 21, 2018 on all second ½ year payments not paid on or before March 20, 2018.

Article 4: Shall the Town fix an interest rate of 5% on all taxes abated that have been paid in full, amount to be paid from the date the taxes were paid?

Article 5: Shall the Town charge a 7% interest rate to any sewer assessments not paid within 60 days of the quarterly billing date?

Article 6: Shall the Town authorize the Selectmen on behalf of the Town to retain, sell or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town for non-payment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they may deem advisable and in the Town's best interest, and to execute quit claim deeds for such property?

Article 7: Shall the Town authorize the Selectmen acting in their capacity as Sewer Trustees, to on the Town's behalf, retain, sell or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town for non-payment of sewer assessments thereon, on such terms as they may deem advisable and in the Town's best interest, and to execute quit claim deeds for such property?

Article 8: Shall the Town authorize the Selectmen on behalf of the Town, to accept or reject any and all gifts as they deem advisable, and to expend any monetary gifts on the designated purpose of that gift and to sell, by private sale or bid, or otherwise dispose of Town property that they deem to be surplus, obsolete or unusable?

Article 9: Shall the Town authorize the Selectmen on behalf of the Town to apply for and accept State and Federal grants in the interest of improving the Town?
