It is time for bold, dynamic ideas that will change Maine for the better. That is why I, along with people ranging from small business owners, innovators and entrepreneurs, to economists and every day, hard-working Mainers, developed an economic plan designed to make it easier for small businesses to grow, for people to come and stay, and for Maine to thrive.

Dear Friends.

It is an honor to represent Maine in the United States Senate. I am grateful for the trust the people of our state have placed in me and welcome this opportunity to share some key accomplishments from this past year.

As Chairman of the Senate Aging Committee, I worked to help ensure the well-being of our seniors. The SeniorSafe Act I authored became law last year and is empowering banks, credit unions, and other financial institutions to better protect seniors from financial fraud.

Following extensive committee investigations of prescription drug pricing, additional legislation I crafted became law, ending the egregious practice of pharmacy "gag clauses" that prevented pharmacists from informing patients on how to pay the lowest possible price.

This year, I was also successful in securing an extra \$425 million for Alzheimer's research—the largest funding increase ever—bringing the total to \$2.34 billion. Additionally, the bipartisan BOLD Act I authored will create public health infrastructure to combat Alzheimer's by promoting education, early diagnosis, and improved care management.

More than 40 million Americans—including 178,000 Mainers—are caregivers for parents, spouses, children, and other loved ones with disabilities or illnesses, such as Alzheimer's. The RAISE Family Caregivers Act I authored was signed into law last year, giving caregivers more resources and training to better balance the full-time job of caregiving. Another law I wrote will help grandparents who are raising grandchildren, largely due to the opioid addiction crisis.

In addition to helping seniors, a major accomplishment over the past year is the increased federal investment in biomedical research that is leading to progress in the fight against numerous devastating diseases. Congress has boosted funding for the National Institutes of Health by \$7 billion in just the last three years, bringing total funding to more than \$39 billion.

One of my highest priorities as Chairman of the Transportation Appropriations Subcommittee is to improve our nation's crumbling infrastructure and ensure that Maine's needs are addressed. Since the Better Utilizing Investments to Leverage Development (BUILD) Transportation Grants program, formerly known as TIGER, was established in 2009, I have secured \$160 million for vital transportation projects throughout Maine.

Congress also delivered a Farm Bill last year, which includes many important provisions that will help the agriculture industry in Maine and across the country. Specifically, I secured provisions that will strengthen support for young farmers, improve local farm-to-market efforts, and increase funding for organic research.

Congress took decisive action to address the opioid addiction epidemic. In addition to appropriating \$8.5 billion in federal funding last year, Congress enacted the SUPPORT for Patients and Communities Act, a comprehensive package that embraces the multipronged approach I have long advocated for this epidemic: prevention, treatment, recovery, and enforcement to stop drug trafficking.

Maine plays a key role in ensuring a strong national defense. In 2018, Congress provided funding for five ships to be built at Bath Iron Works, which will help to keep our nation safe and provide our skilled shipbuilders a steady job. I also secured more than \$162 million for infrastructure projects at Portsmouth Naval Shipyard to support their important work to overhaul Navy submarines

A Maine value that always guides me is our unsurpassed work ethic. In December 2018, I cast my 6,834th consecutive vote, continuing my record of never missing a roll-call vote since my Senate service began in 1997.

Dear Friends.

As I travel Maine, I hear from people who live in every corner of our state. I hear about their achievements, their successes, their work to improve their communities – I hear about the hope they have for our state. I also hear about our challenges, and all the work we have left to do. As I see it, that's my job: to listen to you, act where I can to build on what's good, and work on the tough parts. As 2018 comes to a close, I wanted to take a moment to share an update on some of the work we're doing in Washington to lift up the accomplishments of Maine people and make progress on the challenges they face.

From Portland to Presque Isle, from Milo to Camden, I hear about the pain that the opioid epidemic is inflicting on Maine communities. I've met with Maine people in recovery, family members of those struggling with substance use disorders, treatment providers, and law enforcement officials to learn about their experiences with this terrible disease, and everyone agrees that in order to fully respond to these problems, we need a stronger federal effort to end the opioid epidemic. Fortunately, some help is on the way – in October, we overwhelmingly passed a sweeping, bipartisan opioids bill. I've pushed hard for this type of legislation and was proud to have provisions I've advocated for included in the bill. These priorities have been guided by the voices of Maine people, and we'll keep working to confront this tragic problem.

I've also worked to strengthen the future of our forest economy. Maine's forests have powered our state's economy for generations, especially in our rural communities. So, when rapid shifts in the market led to the closure of many pulp and paper mills and biomass power plants, it required a collaborative approach to support future growth in this important industry. That's why, together with the other members of the state's Congressional delegation, I pushed to establish the Economic Development Assessment Team (EDAT). This integrated, multiagency effort aims to foster innovation and commercialization in Maine's forest economy, and we're already seeing the benefits: in recent months, several forest industry businesses have announced significant investments into Maine operations, and in September 2018, the Forest Opportunity Roadmap (FOR)/Maine released an action plan to make sure this industry, and the rural communities it supports, can continue to thrive for generations to come.

As I close this letter, please allow me to express my gratitude to each of you – for your dedication to our state, and to one another. It's often said that Maine is like a big small town (with very long streets)—that's because at our heart, we're one big community. It's not only a pleasure to serve you—it's a pleasure to know you. Thank you for being the reason Maine is so special. Mary and I hope that 2019 will be a good year for you, your family, your community, and our great State.

Thank you for the honor of serving as your State Representative once again. I have been working hard on your behalf to provide responsive constituent services, be your advocate in Augusta, and advance legislation that improves life in our district and in our state.

Thank you for reelecting me to represent you in Augusta; it is an honor to serve you in the Maine Senate. I am eager to continue working with you to make Maine an even better place to live, work and raise a family. Please let me provide you with a recap of the 128th Legislature as well as my hopes for the upcoming 129th Legislature, which began its work in December, 2018.

During my time as a member of the Maine Senate, I have been encouraged to see the significant progress that has occurred. The State of Maine closed the fiscal year that ended on June 30, 2018 with a budget surplus of more than \$126 million and a 'rainy day fund' totaling more than \$274 million, allowing our state to have a better borrowing capacity and long-term financial stability. After many years of budget shortfalls and high spending, the significance of these economic achievements cannot be overstated. Maine's unemployment is at an all-time low, and the state's jobless rate has been below four percent for a record length of time.

Perhaps the most significant action the 128th Legislature took was passing tax conformity. With the passage of that legislation, we ensured that Maine citizens would not see their tax burden increase as a result of the federal changes to the tax code. Additionally, the tax conformity legislation included a \$300 child credit and increased the property tax fairness credit. I am incredibly proud that both sides of the aisle came together on this issue to benefit the Maine people.

The 129th Legislature has many issues to tackle, including adequate funding of our schools and ensuring that our young people have the skills necessary to enter the workforce. I am a strong supporter of vocational schooling and will advocate that technical education be widely available.

I encourage you to reach out to me with your thoughts, concerns and ideas about state government. Your input will help me better represent your interests and those of the community. Edward H. Hastings IV – Fire Chief Scott Shink – Deputy Chief

To: The residents of Livermore Falls, the Board of Selectmen, and the Town Manager

This year at the Livermore Falls Fire Department we have been working to finish moving back into our station, equipping our new personnel, and regaining our training regimen. It has been a challenge to figure out our way in this renovated space and to see what was needed just to reopen our building. This project began in 2015 and we are happy to say that it is finally mostly finished. There were some projects left out of the renovations which include insulating the building and repairing the parking lot. We are sure these will eventually become priorities, though for now; are not needed to become functional.

As we spoke about this last year, our vehicle maintenance is still a daunting task. We did hear last year about the status of our AFG grant request for a quint, though we didn't make it through the selection process. Given our truck's condition, we did apply again this year seeking \$500,000.00 in funding to replace an engine and the ladder truck. Our plan has been focused on trying to reduce the fleet of vehicles, in part due to their age and required maintenance. As we discussed our condition of the apparatus in December, the Board of Selectmen directed us to seek costs of a combined pumper/ladder truck. We found there were some very competitive used trucks that cost around \$300,000. We also found that the town could purchase a brand new truck to meet our needs at a cost of \$600,000. This was put to the voters during a special town meeting in March, though was defeated 32 to 27.

This leaves us with a laundry list of repairs to make on the proposed trucks we were looking to replace. We will be working through this in the coming months which we anticipate will be financially difficult because we don't have sufficient funds to cover the repairs needed. Additionally, there wasn't enough money appropriated in the current or future budgets to handle the growing list of repairs needed. (The average age of our vehicles in the department is 21 years old.)

In 2018, we recognized a very dedicated member of the department for his many years of service to our community. Lt. Nixon Ortiz can be found at the station almost daily and is always wearing something representing the Livermore Falls Fire Department. Nixon is a true community oriented person and will do anything he can to helps his friends & neighbors. Nixon was selected by several of his peers and undoubtedly, deserves our recognition as the 2018 Firefighter of the year.

We would also like to thank the town office staff, Police, Highway, Water, and Sewer Departments, along with our mutual aid partners for their assistance this year.

Most importantly, we would like to thank our residents for the support of our department. We are looking forward to another great year, including the Halloween open house. (This past year about 450 people came to visit.)



In 2018 the Livermore Falls Police Department received and responded to 2483 calls for emergencies and/or assistance. In addition, 91 arrests were made, 155 criminal summonses issued, 57 traffic summons issued and 802 traffic warnings and/or defects were issued.

Officer Walter Bachelder was hired 6/27/18 to replace Officer Nadeau who is now a Deputy in Androscoggin County and also a reserve officer with us. Officer Bachelder will be completing his 18 weeks at the Criminal Justice academy May 24th. James Phillips is a Auburn Police Officer that was hired 7/2/18 as a reserve officer for us. Michael Adcock was hired full time on 12/28/18, he was formally a patrolman at Farmington PD. He replaces Sgt. Vernon Steven who left the department in October.

This has been one of the most trying years yet in our community. We have been as vulnerable as the rest of the State to this drug crisis, we have lost citizens and we have saved some. All the changes that have taking place at the transfer station since 2010 have made up a very large reduction in the budget for the tax payers of Livermore Falls. Our recycling and household trash has reduced in tonnage from the previous year. We are currently paying \$60.09 a ton for household waste and we now pay \$15.00 a ton fee on recyclables until the markets start to rise again.

We are trying to get maximum compaction in the containers to save on hauling costs, sometimes we can not get a truck here soon enough to swap out the containers so we have to put trash or recyclables in the old building until we get a new container swapped out.

2018/19 Sewer Report

2018 has been a busy year for us. Ted Berry cleaned, videoed and mapped the Towns sewer system on the South side of Church St. Some of the lines were in pretty good shape and others were near failure. We have been locating manholes that were buried and raising them to grade and installing some in areas that were over 1000 ft. between manholes. Streets on the North side of Church St will be done sometime this summer.

Wright & Pierce has been designing an upgrade for the Wastewater Treatment Facility to replace equipment that is failing and to protect the workers and the environment. The upgrade is expected to go out to bid in the spring of 2020. The staff has been doing a great job at getting by with failing equipment and spending as little as possible to keep it running until the upgrade takes place.

The Town of Jay is going to shut down their Wastewater Treatment Facility and install a pump station to pump their wastewater from N. Jay to Livermore Falls. The construction is expected to begin this spring and L.F. should be receiving flows from N. Jay this fall if everything goes as planned.
