Dear Friends,

As 2019 ends and 2020 begins, I am pleased to report that Congress made progress on a number of issues important to Maine families despite the polarization in our country.

In a major win for surviving military and retiree spouses to whom we are deeply indebted, I was proud to co-lead the repeal of what is often referred to as the "Military Widow's Tax," an unfair offset of survivor benefits that has prevented as many as 67,000 surviving spouses—including more than 260 from Maine—from receiving the full benefits they deserve.

The high cost of health care and prescription drugs continues to be a top issue for families and seniors. To provide continued relief for more lower- and middle-income individuals, I led the charge to extend for another two years the medical expense tax deduction that I included in the 2017 tax law. Without this extension, nearly 20,000 Mainers and millions of Americans with high medical expenses, including many with preexisting conditions, would have faced an increased tax burden. In other good news, the CREATES Act I cosponsored became law. It will prevent pharmaceutical companies from blocking access to a sufficient supply of brand-name drugs needed for the studies that allow less expensive alternatives to enter the marketplace.

Improving people's health and wellbeing remains my priority. On a per capita basis, Maine has the highest incidence of Lyme disease in the country. In August, I held a Senate hearing at the University of Maine's Tick Lab on this growing public health crisis. A comprehensive public health strategy to combat this epidemic is needed, and the new law I authored will do just that.

In addition, I helped champion another \$2.6 billion increase for the National Institutes of Health, our nation's premiere biomedical research institution, including significant boosts for Alzheimer's disease and diabetes research. Last year, NIH funded more than \$111 million for research at 14 Maine institutions.

To help prepare the graduates of Maine Maritime Academy, I secured \$300 million for a new training ship, which will ensure rigorous instruction for MMA students for decades to come.

Significant federal funding was approved for work at Bath Iron Works and Portsmouth Naval Shipyard. Funding appropriated by Congress will pay for three new destroyers, make a down payment on an additional ship, and finance infrastructure improvements at PNSY.

As Chairman of the Transportation and Housing Appropriations Subcommittee, I have led efforts to improve our nation's crumbling infrastructure and ensure that Maine's housing needs are addressed. For Maine's roads, bridges, airports, and seaports, tens of millions in federal funding will help make urgently needed upgrades and improve safety. Funding will also support housing assistance to low-income families and seniors and aid communities in reducing homelessness among our youth. The Community Development Block Grant program will assist numerous towns and cities in our State.

The Aging Committee I chair has continued its focus on financial security for our seniors. A new law I authored will make it easier for small businesses to offer retirement plans to their employees. Our Aging Committee's Fraud Hotline fielded more than 1,200 calls this year. Congress passed a new law to crack down on robocallers who are often the perpetrators of these scams. And a new law I authored will expand the IRS' Identity Protection PIN program nationwide to prevent identity theft tax refund fraud.

At the end of 2019, I cast my 7,262nd consecutive vote. In the New Year, I will keep working to deliver bipartisan solutions to the challenges facing Maine and the nation. 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Dear Friends,

The beginning of a new year provides the opportunity to reflect on the progress of the past 12 months. If you've been watching cable TV, you might think that every waking moment of 2019 in Washington has been consumed by divisive, partisan issues – and while there's no shortage of those debates, there have also been opportunities for bipartisan cooperation. You sent me to the Senate to make the most of those opportunities, so as we enter into the New Year, I wanted to take a moment to update you on my efforts to work with members of both parties to make life better for the people of Maine.

One of my most important priorities this past year has been emphasizing preventive healthcare. Maine's distinction as the oldest state in the nation brings us wisdom, of course – but it also creates unique challenges, particularly relating to healthcare. The key to addressing these obstacles is being proactive, because the cheapest, safest medical procedure is the one that doesn't need to happen. That's why I've introduced legislation to incentivize healthier living, expand mental health screenings, and help more Americans access regular check-ups. We're making progress, but we've got a long way to go – and I'd like your help, because I know that the best ideas are the ones that come from families and communities on the front lines of these challenges. To strengthen this effort, I convened a policy forum on prevention in Bangor in October, which has already given me exciting new ideas that I'll carry with me into 2020. If you have additional thoughts on encouraging preventive healthcare, please share them with my office.

This year has also continued the growth of Maine's forest products industry – a key focus of my work to revitalize Maine's rural economy and communities. We've seen significant investment in mills across the state, creating good jobs to support rural Maine. I'm also pleased that the investments aren't just in our mills – the industry is thriving because of its commitment to innovation. We're fortunate to have the University of Maine's top-notch researchers exploring cutting-edge ways to use our forest resources, including capitalizing on the rise of 3D printing technology with the world's largest 3D printer. Combining this work with ongoing federal support, our vast forests, and Maine's dedicated workforce, I know that the future of this industry is bright, and I'll continue working to support it on all fronts.

I'm proud of all we've accomplished together this year, but even as I reflect on all that we've achieved, it is challenging to not think of the work left undone. It sometimes can be discouraging to watch these important priorities hang in limbo, but fortunately for me, encouragement is never far. After all, I get to live in Maine – which means I get to count Maine people as my neighbors and friends. I'm always struck by the kindness that our citizens show not only to me, but also to each other. This focus on collaboration and compassion is an inspiration, and it powers my efforts bring a little bit of Maine common sense to Washington. Thank you for all you do to for our state – Mary and I are deeply grateful, and we hope that 2020 will be a good year for you, your family, your community, and the State of Maine.

Dear Livermore Falls Residents,

Thank you for the opportunity to continue to represent the residents of Livermore Falls in the 129th Legislature. It is truly an honor to serve our community.

This legislative session took an unusual turn as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic. While the second session of the Legislature generally runs through mid-April, the Presiding Officers made the decision to end our session on March 17. This was done in an effort to adhere to the Center for Disease Control's social distancing guidelines and to keep staff, constituents and our communities safe.

Before adjourning, my colleagues and I passed emergency legislation to help Mainers through the evolving COVID-19 crisis. Among other things, we included provisions to temporarily expand unemployment insurance benefits; empower the state Department of Education to waive certain school-day requirements and ensure students continue to receive needed meals while schools are closed; allow remote participation in municipal meetings; establish a consumer loan guarantee program to help eligible Mainers access low- or no-interest loans; and authorize the Governor to prohibit utilities from terminating residential electric and water service during this period. We additionally designated at least \$11 million in state funding to further respond to COVID-19.

These items are separate from the many steps being taken by Gov. Mills and her administration to address COVID-19. While I am no longer in Augusta, I remain in close contact with the administration and am working to provide relief for our community.

In addition to our COVID-19 efforts, the Legislature passed a \$73 million supplemental budget that raised rates for direct health care providers, increased the state's pre-k-12 education contribution by \$38 million, invested in transportation projects and more, while adding another \$17.4 million to the "Rainy Day Fund." We also passed a bond in the amount of \$105 million for transportation and \$15 million for broadband access. This will be sent to voters in June for final approval.

We passed an affordable housing tax credit that will help us build 1,000 more affordable housing units over the next eight years. We put new safeguards in place to prevent tragedies like last year's devastating explosion in Farmington. And we passed a package of health care bills aimed at driving down costs and increasing accessibility for all Mainers. I was pleased to be a part of strong bipartisan efforts to get meaningful bills passed.

There is certainly more we'd like to do, and it is our intention to return to Augusta and pick up the bills we were not able to finish once it is safe to do so. Until then, I am proud of what we have been able to accomplish for Maine people.

A Message from Senator Lisa Keim

Dear Friends and Neighbors:

I would like to thank you for the opportunity to represent you in the Maine Senate. It is an honor to represent your voices at the State House.

The 1st regular session of the 129th Legislature adjourned on June 20, 2019 after pulling an all-nighter at the State House to get all the necessary work completed. The Legislature passed 654 new laws, and though I don't agree with all of them, there are many I am proud to have supported.

One bill especially worthy to be highlighted is LD 1526, "An Act to Increase the Availability of Foster Homes," that I sponsored at a constituent's request. The demand for caring foster families has never been more urgent, the need is critical. This bill will allow for the elimination of unnecessary and obstructive fire code regulations, removing a daunting hurdle in the licensing process. With the passage of this bill, more Maine children will find a loving foster home.

I was also pleased that the 2020-2021 budget provides tens of millions of dollars in property tax relief to Maine citizens and communities, increases General Purpose Aid to local schools by \$81 million, and adds 62 new Child and Family Services staff to better protect Maine children from abuse and neglect and provide relief to caseworkers with unmanageable caseloads.

The Second Regular Session of the 129th Legislature begins in January 2020, and it looks to be as equally heavy as the first. Already on the docket are 410 bills carried over from last session and 39 enacted bills held by Governor Mills that need to be resolved. Additionally, any number of new bills may be introduced that, according to the Maine Constitution, must be of an "emergency" nature.

Dear Friends,

I hope this letter finds you well. It is an immense honor to serve as your representative in Congress. I take very seriously the responsibility that has been placed on me, and I would like to take this opportunity to share with you some of what I've been working on in my first year in Congress.

At the beginning of this term, the House passed H.R. 1, a comprehensive package of reforms I cosponsored to get big money out of politics and fight corruption in Washington. And in December, I helped pass H.R. 3, the *Lower Drug Costs Now Act*, which would limit out-of-pocket prescription drug costs paid by seniors, fund the expansion of Medicare coverage to include dental, vision, and hearing, and lower prescription drug prices for thousands of Mainers. Additionally, as a member of the House Armed Services Committee, I worked to ensure our annual defense authorization bill supports America's national security and Maine's shipyard workers, National Guardsmen, manufacturers, and universities.


On top of working on this legislation, I have also been advocating for our district directly to administrative agencies. I have been fighting for Maine lobstermen to urge the president to intervene in proposed regulations by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) that would hurt our lobster industry. I pressed government agencies to ground their regulations in sound science and data when crafting new regulations on Maine's lobstermen. I also persuaded the Army Corps of Engineers to hold a public hearing in Maine about the proposed Central Maine Power NECEC transmission line, which gave hundreds of people the opportunity to voice their opinions about the project.

Some of the most important work of members of Congress is rooted in on-the-ground constituent services. We have three offices in the district -- in Caribou, Bangor, and Lewiston -- and my staff work tirelessly to help Mainers solve problems they may face with federal government agencies. I urge you to stop by to talk to us in person and let us know how we can better serve you and your communities.

My favorite part of the job is coming home to the district and hearing about what matters to you. This year, I brought a hearing of the House Small Business Subcommittee on Contracting and Infrastructure to Maine to find ways to expand access to rural broadband. I've also held open town halls and coffee hours throughout the district to hear directly from Mainers veterans, as well as roundtables to find more ways to help small businesses in Maine grow and create jobs.

As always, please continue to reach out to me and my staff if you'd like to voice an opinion, let us know about a local event, or seek any assistance with federal agencies.

I have doubt on Pixelles' Androscoggin Mill's future. I pray it stays running



To: The residents of Livermore Falls, Board of Selectmen, and Town Manager


Thank you for this opportunity to explain what we have been up to. This past year we have welcomed Dylan Antone, Brian Harborough, Jacob Stevens, Suvanna Corliss, and Ben Guild to the crew. We have been working over the past few years to increase our personnel and these folks are excellent additions. We are always looking for personnel to join our team. If you or someone you know has interest in coming to work with us, we would be glad to have them. Applications are available at the station or Town Office.

This past year our department responded to the catastrophic incident at the Leap Building in Farmington. We are very thankful that Mr. Lord has returned home and we look forward to his recovery. This incident really highlighted the bond which all of us share as neighboring community members and the overall support for the fire department statewide. The Maine Fire Chief's Association coordinated a staffed fire station within hours of the incident and it was really humbling to see our fellow firefighters come together to help a small town in a time of need.

Our department is still working through expensive vehicle repairs and this year have used about \$38,000.00 to keep our fleet on the road. Even after an \$8,500.00 repair, our ladder truck remains broke down, which has been unreliable since December. We have proposed using our capital reserve funds to help with these vehicle problems and are hoping for a special town meeting soon. We are proposing to purchase a used quint, which should help replace both a failing pumper truck and our out-of-service ladder truck. We currently have these funds available within our capital reserve account, though need to reallocate them specifically to allow the purchase of a fire truck.

In 2019-2020 we were able to receive grants through the Maine Municipal Association and the Maine Forest Service to help with fire gear. This provided about \$3,500 which we put toward the purchase of firefighting turnout gear, pagers, and forestry helmets.

I would like to thank everyone for supporting all first responders, essential workers, family, friends, and their neighbors for pulling together and helping us through the situation this spring. I would like to thank the members of the LFFD for their dedication to the Town of Livermore Falls, all of the mutual aid partners who have come to our community to assist this past year, and all other town employees for working with us.

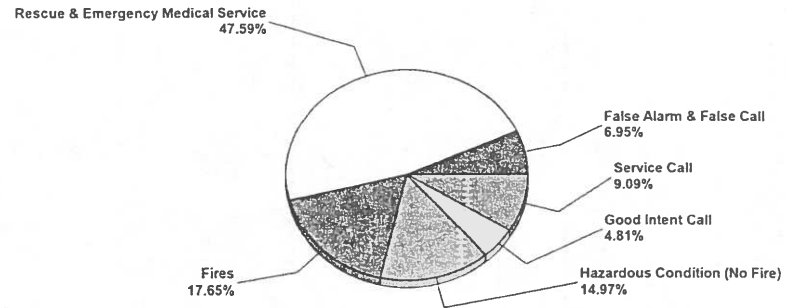

To the Town Manager, Selectmen and Citizens;

In 2019 the Livermore Falls Police Department received and responded to 2454 calls for emergencies and/or assistance. In addition, 91 arrests were made, 153 criminal summonses issued, 79 traffic summonses issued and 1200 traffic warnings and/or defects were issued.

Officer Bachelder graduated from 18 weeks at the Criminal Justice academy May 24th, 2019. He is doing well and will soon be off his years' probation. This has been a good year for us as we are at full staff and all full-time personnel are academy graduates. We have a good fleet of vehicle and have been able to save on maintenance cost because of it, thank you.

It is hard for me to reflect back on events of 2019 as everything has turned upside-down in such a short time recently. Our jobs haven't changed just the way we do them and many times without the support staff we have come to rely on in the past. We finished our harvesting of the 100-acre woodlot on Parker Pond in the spring of 2019, thanks to the help of George Merrill & Sons Logging, LLC.


The District also received a grant from the Maine Drinking Water Program to have Maine Rural Water Association write Standard Operating Procedures for us.

Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the voters of the Town of Livermore Falls in the County of Androscoggin, in the State of Maine, qualified by law to vote in Town affairs, to meet at the Livermore Falls Municipal Building in said Town of Livermore Falls on Tuesday, the 14th of July, 2020 at 8:00 in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles to wit:

Article 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Article 2. To choose by secret ballot in accordance with Title 30, M.R.S.A. Section 2061 all necessary Town Officials including one Selectman/Assessor for a two year term; one Selectman/Assessor for a three year term; and one RSU #73 School Board Director for a three year term.

Note: The polls will open at 8:00 o'clock in the forenoon and close at 8:00 o'clock in the evening.

Article 3:	Shall the Town fix dates of October 21, 2020 and March 24, 2021 when taxes shall be due and payable and shall the Town fix a rate of 7% interest to be paid on taxes unpaid after said date?




