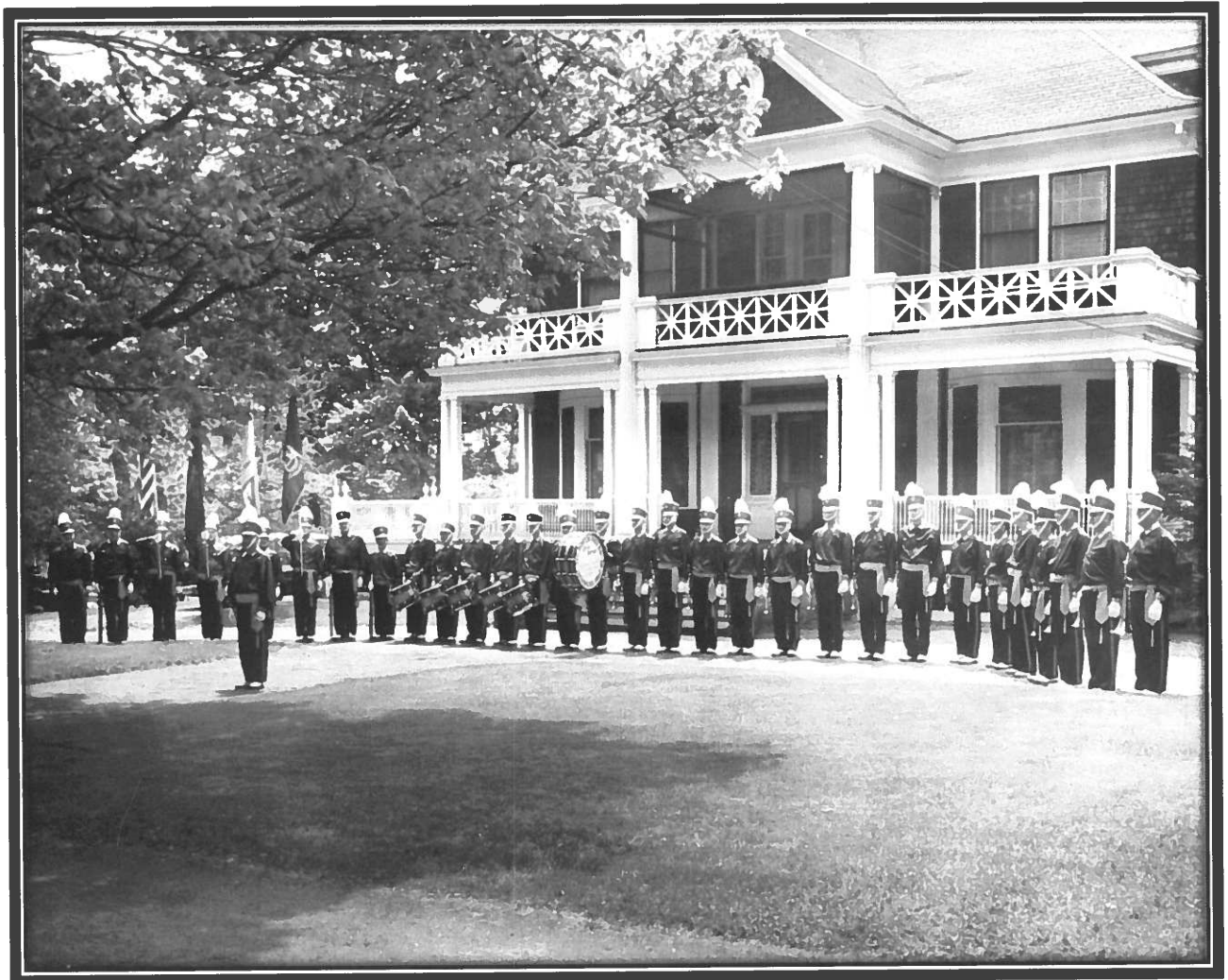


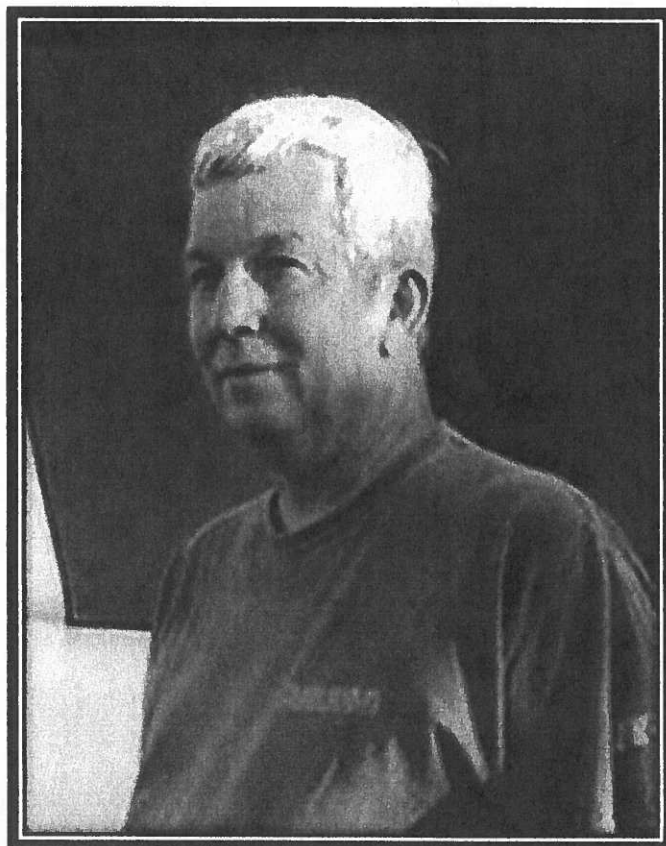

Dear Friends:

When I took the oath of office as Maine's 75th governor, I never imagined that we would face a deadly pandemic. But that is our reality, and it is my responsibility to guide our state through this time, to keep Maine people safe and healthy, and to put our economy on a path to recovery.

COVID-19 has wreaked havoc on our national economy, dealing heavy losses to businesses of all sizes, and leaving millions of people unemployed. Here in Maine it has taken the lives of hundreds of people and sickened many more. My Administration, in collaboration with public health experts and business leaders across the state, developed a plan to gradually and safely restart Maine's economy. We also formed an Economic Recovery Committee charged with assessing the economic impacts of the pandemic on Maine's economy and providing recommendations for policy changes to deal with these impacts. Together, drawing on the hard work and resilience of Maine people, we will rebuild and strengthen our economy and rise from this unprecedented challenge to be a stronger, better state than ever.

I continue to be amazed by the strength and courage of the Maine people and businesses who have found different ways to do business and the brave first responders in your town and in our health care facilities. Thank you to the people of Maine who have demonstrated patience, kindness, and compassion during this difficult time.

Dear Friends:

It is an honor to represent Maine in the United States Senate. I am grateful for the trust the people of our State have placed in me and welcome this opportunity to reflect on 2020, an incredibly challenging year for Maine families, small businesses, and communities.

When the pandemic struck, our country faced the specter of an overwhelmed health care system and devastation to our small businesses and the millions of people they employ. I immediately worked with Republicans and Democrats to pass multiple laws allocating approximately \$3 trillion to respond to this public health and economic crisis, including more than \$8 billion directed to Maine to support testing, schools, the economy, and other purposes — that is nearly double Maine's annual state budget.


I am especially proud of the bipartisan Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) I co-authored. This program has provided three out of four Maine small businesses with nearly \$2.3 billion in forgivable loans, which has helped sustain more than 250,000 Maine jobs. I have met thousands of Maine small employers and employees in all 16 counties who are surviving because of the PPP. As one small business owner told me, the PPP provided “exactly what we needed at exactly the right time.” The PPP also allowed employers to maintain benefits, such as health care, during this challenging time. Another round of PPP is needed to sustain small businesses and their employees.

While the pandemic continues across Maine, our nation, and the world, I thank the first responders, health care professionals, teachers, grocery store employees, factory workers, farmers, truck drivers, postal employees, and so many others who continue to stay on the job during this difficult time. With the deployment of the first vaccines, better tests, and the incredible speed with which these life-saving responses were developed, I am hopeful we can emerge from this crisis in the next few months.

While providing relief to American families was my focus throughout 2020, other accomplishments include the passage of the Great American Outdoors Act, which provides full funding of the Land and Water Conservation Fund and addresses the maintenance backlog at our national parks, forests, and wildlife refuges. As Chairman of the Transportation Appropriations Subcommittee, in 2020 alone, I secured \$132 million to improve Maine's roads, bridges, airports, buses, rail, ferries, and seaports. Finally, as Chairman of the Aging Committee, I led the reauthorization of the Older Americans Act, which funds programs that improve the well-being, independence, and health of our nation's seniors and their caregivers, and I authored laws to reduce the cost of prescription drugs and protect individuals with Alzheimer's disease.

As the end of 2020 is approaching, I have cast more than 7,535 votes, never having missed one. In the New Year, my focus remains to work with colleagues to find common ground on policies to help support the health and safety of Mainers and the safe, responsible opening of our communities. If ever I or my staff can be of assistance to you, please do not hesitate to contact one of my state offices. May the coming year be a successful one for you, your family, your community, and our state.


2020 was a year unlike any in our lifetimes. Our state and nation dealt with unprecedented challenges--the coronavirus pandemic, ensuing economic fallout, and a prolonged, heavily divisive campaign season each took a significant toll on all of us. The worst part? In order to protect each other, we had to face these challenges in isolation. But a new year represents new possibilities; a chance to take stock of what we're grateful for and focus on the opportunities in front of us. As we reflect back on 2020, we will remember heartbreak and loss – but we cannot forget the shining rays of hope that broke through the darkness, reminding us all that better days are ahead.

Throughout the pandemic, my top focus has been on bridging the partisan divide in Washington in order to deliver desperately-needed relief for Maine people. Joined by colleagues last March, we pushed for bipartisan negotiations to produce a strong bill that helped fellow Mainers, businesses, and institutions weather this storm. In the weeks and months after the *CARES Act* passed, our team stayed in close contact with people throughout the state to determine how we should adjust our response to best support our citizens. Unfortunately, the aid provided by the *CARES Act* lapsed without Congressional action, leaving too many families and businesses in limbo. I never stopped pushing for a bipartisan relief bill and, after extensive negotiations, we ended the year on a good note by breaking the gridlock and passing new relief legislation. This new bill isn't perfect; in fact, it should just be the start our renewed response. As we enter 2021 with a new administration and new Congress, we must fight for additional legislation to help restore stability to our working families and rebuild our economy and public health infrastructure.

In the midst of this crisis, Congress did manage to accomplish a few successes that will outlast this awful pandemic. Among these was the *Great American Outdoors Act*, a bipartisan bill which was enacted into law in August 2020 and will help address a \$12 billion backlog at our national parks so future generations of Americans can enjoy these beautiful lands and create lifelong memories. Also, as we learn more about the recent hacks of our nation's networks, there is help on the way: 27 of the cybersecurity recommendations made by the Cyberspace Solarium Commission – which I co-chair with Republican Congressman Mike Gallagher– made it into this year's defense bill. While there is no guarantee that these provisions would have prevented the massive hack, they will certainly improve our cyber defenses.

Despite the challenges, I'm hopeful for the future. Vaccines are being distributed across our state – starting with our healthcare heroes, who have sacrificed so much throughout this unprecedented catastrophe and deserve our eternal gratitude. If there can be a silver lining from these challenges of 2020, maybe it will be this: I hope that, in the not-so distant future, we will be able to come together physically and we will be reminded of our love for each other. We have differences, without a doubt. But as Maine people stepped up to support each other, we saw again and again that our differences pale in comparison to the values we share. We are one state, and one community – and there is nothing we cannot or will not do for each other. Mary and I wish you a happy and healthy 2021. We can't wait to see you soon.

Thank you for allowing me the honor of serving you in the Maine Senate. I am grateful that you have put your trust in me and I will continue to work tirelessly on your behalf.

The 1st session of the 130th Legislature has been different than any previous session of the Maine Legislature. Zoom meetings replaced in person committee hearings and work sessions and it was certainly a learning process for everyone. As COVID-10 restrictions lifted, the Legislature met in person starting in June. It was high time we returned to the State House so that Legislators could speak in person to one another. The lack of human connection, so essential to accomplishing meaningful work for our constituents, made itself felt in the partisan nature of this session. The 130th Legislature has a great deal of work still to do in the 2nd Regular session; I believe that working together, we can affect positive change.

Before our adjournment on July 19th, the Legislature passed a supplemental budget as well as legislation directing how the American Rescue Plan funds will be spent. Barring another any special session, the Legislature will not meet again until January.

Some sectors of our economy is still struggling, more so now from lack of employees and supply chain issues, and many small businesses are working to regain lost ground. The influx of business will be a boon to many.

Here in western Maine, we are blessed to have an outdoor playground that provides ample opportunity to escape and refresh. As we return to normalcy, I hope you continue to enjoy the natural resources so readily available.

Dear Friends,

I hope this letter finds you safe and well. I know that this year has been challenging for many of our communities. In the midst of these challenges, it remains a privilege to represent you, and I appreciate the opportunity to update you on what I have been working on in Congress for the people of the Second Congressional District.

The coronavirus pandemic has made this year an especially difficult one. We've seen the struggles of small businesses, workers and families, hospitals, and states and towns. COVID-19 has been a serious threat to public health that requires a comprehensive, ongoing response. In March, Congress passed the largest of three bipartisan pieces of relief legislation, the *Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act*. The *CARES Act* was a \$2 trillion economic relief package to provide immediate assistance for some of those hit hardest by the pandemic. While an important start, many of the programs and benefits created by the *CARES Act* were set to expire by the end of 2020 at a time when COVID-19 cases were on the rise. That's why in late December, Congress passed another bipartisan bill to provide COVID-19 relief to small businesses and hospitals, the unemployed, and families struggling to put food on the table. However, the action Congress took at the end of 2020 cannot distract from its failure to act sooner. The unwillingness of many members of Congress to accept compromise throughout the fall left many Mainers struggling and led to a rushed process that produced a bill with serious flaws. In 2021, Congress needs to step up, come together, and lead the country through this pandemic and get our economy back on track.

There are a few bright spots that came out of the work done by Congress this year. As a member of the House Armed Services Committee, I helped advocate for a national defense bill that would include important priorities for American national security, Maine shipbuilders, and servicemembers and their families. The legislation authorizes a new DDG-51 Arleigh Burke-class destroyer to be constructed at Bath Iron Works and helps BIW compete for new work by encouraging a new multi-year procurement process for the DDG-51 Flight III. This funding bill also makes permanent new federal guidelines proposed by Senator King and me to allow Gold Star Families free admission to national parks and other federal lands.

I've been working to improve mental health services for veterans for years, and I led the Maine delegation's effort to address the need for long-term mental health substance abuse treatment for veterans in our state. This past fall the Veterans Administration announced we were successful. Construction starts next year on a new, 24-bed facility at Togus that will ensure Maine veterans won't be sent out of state to receive residential care for substance use disorder and associated mental health issues. This is one result that I am especially proud to deliver for my fellow Maine veterans.

As I reflect upon what I am most grateful for this year, I am especially glad to be able to share that my wife Izzy and I are expecting a baby in 2021. We are excited about this new addition to our family and look forward to the blessings ahead.

This period is challenging for Mainers as we all take steps to limit the spread of the coronavirus, protect our families and our communities, and lean on each other to withstand this pandemic and economic hardship. My staff and I stand ready to assist Mainers as we work through these challenges together. I look forward to continuing to work on your behalf in 2021.



To the Residents, Board of Selectmen, and Town Manager;

I would like to start by thanking the residents and taxpayers of Livermore Falls for your overwhelming support. 2020 was a difficult year for many and the fire department was no exception. Early in the year, we found ourselves wondering what our response activities were going to be in the coming months and learned of many ways we needed to adapt. Our personnel were outstanding at following all new restrictions and guidelines and did an exceptional job avoiding any major outbreaks within our department.

This past year we had a citizen's initiative brought forward to construct a Fire Substation within 1 mile of the Rt. 133 and Rt. 106 intersection in the area known as East Livermore. This ballot question was overwhelmingly approved by a vote of 992 to 399. The Selectmen have formed a committee with five people to work on developing plans for this facility and we hope to start construction by this summer.

We also had the opportunity to upgrade our 1988 Ladder truck this past year. You may have seen the new green tower truck cruising around town as we train and familiarize ourselves with this new equipment. This used truck was purchased from Jackson Fire District in New Jersey for \$15,000.00. The truck is a 1997 E-One with a platform to work from and an onboard pump. This tower truck will combine the abilities of a pumper & ladder truck and allow us to do our job more safely. We are excited about this new addition to the fleet, and it will undoubtedly be put to good use in our region.

This fall we are very hopeful we can hold the "haunted fire station" event again. Unfortunately, this had to be canceled in 2020 due to COVID restrictions, though in the past we have seen over 750 people come through our station to enjoy the festivities. We will also be hosting another American Red Cross Blood Drive and encourage you to stay tuned for the date and donate if you can.

We would like to thank all of the other town departments for their help this past year, all mutual aid towns, Northstar EMS, the Fire Marshal's Office, and Castonguay Excavation for their help with fire calls. Most importantly, we would like to thank the residents and taxpayers of Livermore Falls for your financial and moral support throughout the past year.

Personally, I would like to thank the men and women of the Livermore Falls Fire Department for your dedication and service. I would also like to congratulate Assistant Fire Chief Tyler Poulin for being named the 2020 Firefighter of the Year.

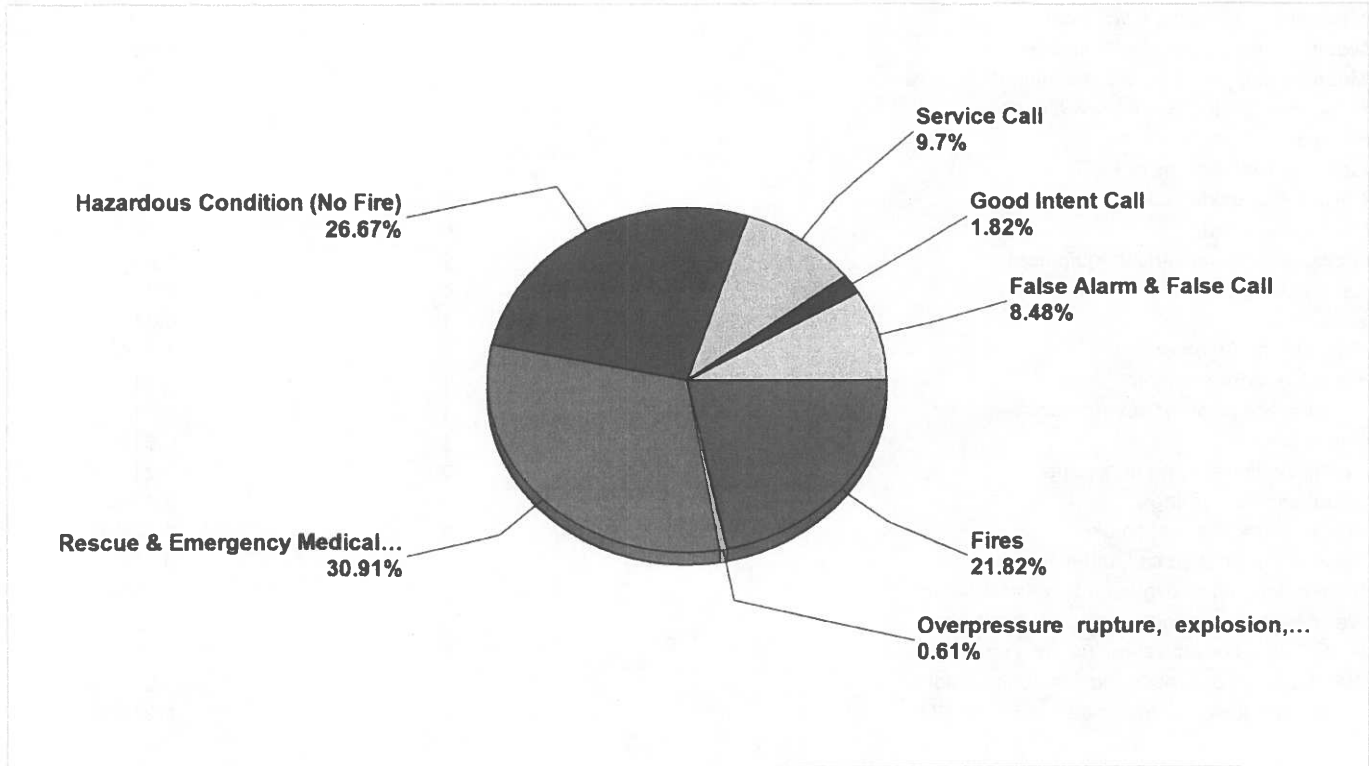

The Trustees of the Livermore Falls Water District hereby submit this annual report for the year ending December 31, 2020.

On March 1, 2020 we implemented the third step of a three-step rate increase approved by the Public Utility Commission.

The District received a grant from the Maine Drinking Water Program to have Wright-Pierce do a study of our disinfection by products for us. They will be making recommendations for the district to implement in the coming months.


The District has also secured funding from the United States Department of Agriculture for a water main replacement project. That will take place along the Foundry Road in the spring of 2021.

The District has also installed 100 new meters part of our meter replacement program, so we will be calling each customer at some point in the future to change your meter.

Along with the general day-to-day operations, we repaired 9 main breaks, replaced 5 services, repaired 9 other services, replaced a fire hydrant, and assisted the Fire Dept. with 2 fires.

March was also the start of one of the most unprecedented times in our lives. With the onset of the Covid-19 virus, stay at home orders and a new mandate every other day. We want take this time to applaud our staff for the outstanding job they have done over the last 9 months to continue to supply this community with quality water.

2021 Transfer Station Report

To the Town Manager, Select Board and Citizens of Livermore Falls

All the changes that have taken place at the transfer station since 2010 have made up for a very large reduction in the budget for the tax payers of Livermore Falls. Our recycling and household trash has reduced in tonnage from the previous year. We are currently paying \$75.50 a ton for household waste and we now pay \$95.00 a ton fee on recyclables until the markets start to rise again.

We are trying to get maximum compaction in the containers to save on hauling costs. There are going to be times where we cannot get a truck here soon enough to swap out the containers. In those cases, we have to put trash or recyclables in the old building until we get a new container swapped out.

Library Director's Report 2020

To say that due to Covid-19 this has been an unusual year seems like an understatement. The library was actually closed to the public for eleven weeks, during which time we had to bring the building into compliance with State guidelines for reopening. At the same time we were going online using Facebook to offer programming and services to meet the public's needs. Our statistics for this year indicate how great an impact all this has been when compared to last year.

Patrons saved \$64,374.90 in 2020 by using their library instead of purchasing materials themselves.

The 2020 Summer Reading Program was "Imagine Your Story," an online program using a platform provided by the Maine State Library. We also offered Story Cubes to inspire young writers. We reached 2,356, engaged 296, and there were 14 shares. Of the 3 registrants 3 completed the program.

We continue to keep everyone informed by our Facebook page. Events, regular activities, information, and photos are posted there. Our regular in-person programming included Wednesday's Pre-School Story Time, LEGO Club, Tuesday's Knit & Crochet Group, and a monthly book discussion group for adults. In-person programming stopped March 17th and we went online using Facebook. Online programs include Pre-School Story Time, monthly adult book club, Armchair Travelers, art/therapy for stress relief, and Crafternoons for activities. With these programs, we reached 11,311, engaged 1,820 and had 90 shares.

Elsie's Reread Used Book Emporium has been closed due to Covid-19. We were unable to have our annual Book Sale, which is one of our major fundraisers. Individual patrons have made generous donations and we thank them!




