He has been disabled since he was 32 years old, but has filled his life with family, communities, and volunteering. He has been a veteran advocate in many ways. He has held almost every office at Post George Bunten American Legion #10 in Livermore Falls. He went on to the State-level and held all of the offices in line to American Legion State Commander in 2006-2007. He has also held many national titles, with legislative being his most fulfilling. He has spent over ten years at the legislative-level as a veteran advocate, testifying on veterans' issues. His "Commanders Project" raised funds to enable a flag be placed on every veteran's grave at the Maine State Veterans Cemeteries each year on Memorial Day weekend. This is all done by volunteers.

Donald has worked on cemeteries in Livermore Falls, Jay, Livermore, Fayette, Canton, and many others. He travelled to every cemetery and documented all the veterans and their families to make it easier to find them. He then provided his list to each town and updates it annually. He helps scheduled volunteers to make sure all local veterans in our communities have a flag placed on their graves from May to September.

Donald also heads the Memorial Day Committee, which plans and carries out the Memorial Day parades. He spearheaded a project to raise money to engrave the names of World War II veterans on the monument in Union Street Park. He helped raised funds to restore the cannon located at the park.

We want to send our gratitude and appreciation for his dedication and commitment to our community. Don's efforts have inspired many to volunteer and give back to the area.

U.S. Senator's Report Washington, D.C.

Dear Friends:

I am deeply honored to serve the people of Maine in the U.S. Senate, and I welcome this opportunity to share some of the areas I have been working on over the past year.

The ongoing COVID-19 pandemic continues to pose enormous challenges for our state and our country. When the pandemic began, I co-authored the Paycheck Protection Program that helped small businesses remain afloat and keep their employees paid. In Maine, our small businesses received more than 47,000 forgivable loans totaling \$3.2 billion. I also led efforts to provide relief for loggers, lobstermen, and bus companies.

In addition, I helped secure \$700 million to assist Maine's overwhelmed hospitals and nursing homes, and a new law I led prevented Medicare payment cuts to help further ease the financial strain on our hospitals. I also urged the CDC to update its recommendations so that our students and teachers could safely return to their classrooms, and I pressed the Administration to end the closure of the U.S.-Canada border.

While addressing the pandemic has been a major focus, I've also worked hard to ensure Maine's other needs are met. A group of 10 Senators, of which I was a part, negotiated the landmark bipartisan infrastructure bill that was signed into law in November. I co-authored the section of the bill that will provide Maine with as much as \$300 million to expand high-speed internet in rural and underserved areas.

Soaring inflation is another crisis, particularly when it comes to the cost of heating oil. I have strongly supported federal programs that help Maine families stay warm. In November, Maine was awarded \$35 million to help low-income Mainers pay their energy bills. And the bipartisan infrastructure bill included \$3.5 billion to help families make energy efficiency improvements that would permanently lower their heating costs.

As a senior member of the Appropriations Committee, I have supported investments in Maine's communities. This year's funding bills include \$265 million I championed for 106 projects across Maine. These projects would help create jobs, improve workforce training, address the opioid crisis, and increase access to childcare and health care services. In addition, I worked to reverse proposed cuts to our Navy in order to help protect America and keep the skilled workers at Bath Iron Works on the job. The bills also include \$475 million for the construction of a new dry dock at Maine's Portsmouth Naval Shipyard that will allow the Navy to continue to carry out its submarine missions. I will keep working to get these important bills enacted.

No one works harder than the people of Maine, and this year I honored that work ethic when I cast my 8,000th consecutive vote, becoming the only Senator in history to do so without ever having missed a roll call vote. The Lugar Center at Georgetown University once again ranked me as the most bipartisan Senator for the eighth year in a row.

In the New Year, I will keep working to solve problems and make life better for the people of Maine and America. May 2022 be a happy, healthy, and successful one for you, your family, and our state.

Dear Friends,

I hope this letter finds you safe and well. It remains a privilege to represent you in Congress, and I appreciate the opportunity to update you on what I have been working on for the people of the Second Congressional District.

This year, our small businesses, workers and families, hospitals, states, and towns continued to face challenges related to the coronavirus pandemic. COVID-19 has been a serious threat to public health and our economy that requires a comprehensive, ongoing response. While we are not yet out of the woods, there is a light at the end of the tunnel. Still, I know there are many Mainers who will continue to need assistance getting through this pandemic. I am committed to making sure our communities' most urgent needs are met to get our economy back on track.

One thing I am particularly proud of this year is that Democrats, Republicans, and the Biden Administration worked together to pass the bipartisan *Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act*, which will make a once-in-a-generation investment in our nation's infrastructure and support Maine jobs. This bill will bring \$1.3 billion to Maine for highways and \$225 million for bridge replacement and repairs, as well as \$234 million to improve public transportation options. It will also allocate over \$100 million to help provide broadband access to the 42,000 Mainers currently without it and make 310,000 Mainers eligible for the Affordable Connectivity Benefit to help families pay for internet access. Crucially, it will also provide Maine with \$390 million to combat Maine's historically high rates of lead poisoning by replacing lead pipes and allowing Maine families access to clean drinking water.

Another one of my priorities in Congress is protecting Maine jobs. For one, shipbuilders at Bath Iron Works are a vital part of our economy, and the ships they build are critical to our national security. Throughout 2021, I led the Maine congressional delegation in pushing back against the Biden Administration's proposed decrease in DDG-51 shipbuilding, a proposal that would have had serious consequences for the shipbuilding workforce at BIW, one of the two shipyards that produces these destroyers, and American naval capabilities around the world. We fought successfully to include authorization for construction of three new DDG-51 destroyers in the final National Defense Authorization Act. I will continue to work hard with my colleagues on the House Armed Services Committee to ensure that we protect our national security and shipbuilding jobs in Maine.

My most meaningful work in Congress continues to be providing direct assistance to Mainers. My staff and I stand ready to serve you. Dear Friends and Neighbors:

Thank you for allowing me to serve you in the Maine Senate. I am honored that you have placed your trust in me and will continue to work tirelessly on your behalf.

The 1st session of the 130th Legislature was different than any previous session of the Maine Legislature. Online meetings replaced in-person, public meetings for all committee work, and it was a difficult time of adjustment as technology challenges complicated the establishment of new methods and processes. In June, as COVID-19 restrictions lifted, the Legislature held session in person, to vote out the bills. Returning to the State House for final votes, with Legislators having never spoken in person for months, is not a method that produces the best policy outcomes. The lack of human connection, so essential to accomplishing meaningful work for our constituents, made itself felt in the partisan nature of this session. However, as with other challenges brought on by the pandemic, some beneficial changes will become permanent, such as the use of technology to allow persons from all over our state interactive access to their government. The limitations of distance have been almost erased, though internet access limitations were strongly felt and highlighted.

Before our adjournment on July 19th, the Legislature passed a supplemental budget as well as legislation directing how the American Rescue Plan funds will be spent. I remain strongly opposed to tax increases, and am pleased that no new taxes will be placed on the Maine people as a result of those two initiatives.

The 130th Legislature has a great deal of work still to do in the 2nd Regular session, which is statutorily set to run from January 5th to April 20th during which time I look forward to discussing the issues important to all of you. Working together, we can affect positive change.

Many of you have reached out regarding increasing costs and expenses, as well as the countless ways the pandemic has affected every aspect of your life; we are still in tough times. As your State Senator I will continue to do all I can to advocate for policies that benefit you and our beautiful western Maine.

Again, thank you for electing me to serve you in the State Senate. Please do not hesitate to reach out with your comments or questions, or if you would like assistance in navigating our state's bureaucracy. I look forward to hearing from you!


On the heels of 2020's challenges, 2021 brought us both amazing progress and frustrating setbacks. The incredible rollout of several effective, FDA approved COVID-19 vaccines helped reduce the risks of this deadly pandemic – but vaccine hesitancy, combined with the dangers of new variants, have prolonged this crisis and created new risks for Maine people. The challenges raised tension levels to boiling points during the fallout of the 2020 presidential election and the January 6th Capitol attack. But despite that, Congress was able to deliver for a nation gripped by an unprecedented pandemic. As we reflect back on the year, we see the important action that will make a difference for Maine people – as well as work still unfinished.

As COVID-19 continued to impact communities across our state and the country, Congress's first priority this year was to confront the pandemic's health threats and economic toll. We immediately got to work on the *American Rescue Plan*, crafting an emergency bill to meet the moment and get our nation back on stable footing. The legislation delivered essential support to businesses facing crises, households in need, and the medical professionals on the front lines of this fight. The funds helped get vaccine shots in arms, while also confronting the damage done to our economy. All told, the *American Rescue Plan* is bringing billions of dollars to Maine, helping the state continue to push through this crisis and bounce back stronger than ever.

After passing the *American Rescue Plan*, Congress turned its attention to a longstanding but unfulfilled priority: infrastructure. Through hard work and compromise, both parties came together to pass a bipartisan bill that finally addresses key infrastructure needs. For Maine people, the bill means an estimated \$1.5 billion to repair crumbling roads and out-of-date bridges, \$390 million to improve access to clean drinking water, and more. I am most excited about the significant funding for broadband – because, as we have seen during the pandemic, broadband is a necessity to succeed in the 21st century economy. The historic investments in the bipartisan infrastructure bill, combined with additional funding I pushed for in the *American Rescue Plan*, will bring an estimated \$400 million for broadband home to Maine. These funds will be nothing short of transformational, creating new opportunities across our state.

These two bills have made and will continue to make a real difference for Maine people, helping to both address the challenges of COVID-19 and lay a foundation for long-term success. I am proud of what we've accomplished this year – but I know there is still a lot of work to do and that the road ahead is challenging. Even still, I am filled with optimism because I know the true nature of our citizens, though challenged, has not changed. Despite every hardship, people in towns and communities have stepped up with strong local leadership, a willingness to help, and a Maine 'neighborhood' spirit. It is why I truly believe we can and will get through anything together. Mary and I wish you a happy, healthy, and safe 2022.

In 2021 the Livermore Falls Police Department received and responded to 2433 calls for emergencies and/or assistance. In addition, 31 arrests were made, 90 criminal summonses issued, 16 traffic summonses issued and 492 traffic warnings and/or defects were issued.

Officer Keith Masse was hired on May 24, 2021, to replace Walter Batchelder who was recruited by the Maine State Police. Officer Maverick Real was hired October 21, 2021, to replace Stephen E. Gould who left to work for the Kennebec County S.O. Recruitment and retention of Police Officers is becoming more difficult in these trying times, and the competition between departments to acquire and maintain dedicated Officers from a limited resource pool is getting ridiculous. Officer Masse is in the 41st BLETP at the Police Academy Scheduled graduate May 20, 2022.

Now with this COVID-19 pandemic, finally coming to a manageable normal we hope to see more community activities with families and the public enjoying what Livermore Falls, and the surrounding area has to offer. We will be with you working to try and keep everyone in the community safe. We all need to work together and hopefully this new normal will be a smooth transition.

The Trustees of the Livermore Falls Water District hereby submit this annual report for the year ending December 31, 2021.

The district finished the disinfection-by-product study and started implementing the operational changes the study recommended. In October of 2021 the district installed a 6" layer of carbon to our # 2 filter, this project was completed in house using only district staff.


The district entered into contract with C.H. Stevenson to replace 5300' of 12" cast iron pipe installed in 1899 with 12" ductile iron pipe, 7 new services, and 2 new fire hydrants. The district is planning a rate increase, to fund the cost for this pipe project.

The district is also in the process of securing funding for a main replacement project on Church, Knapp, and Millett Streets. We are hoping to start this project in 2023.

The district has also installed 100+ new meters as part of our meter replacement program, so we will be calling each customer at some point in the future, for a meter changeout.

Along with the general day-to-day operations, we repaired 7 main breaks, replaced 7 services, repaired 5 other services, installed a new service, and assisted the Fire Dept. with 6 fires.

Our household trash has reduced in tonnage from the previous year, while Recycling and Demolition has increased by 126 ton, We are currently paying \$78.92 a ton for household waste and we now pay \$95.00 a ton fee on recyclables until the markets start to rise again.

Hauling costs have gone up for the first time since 2009 and with the rising fuel costs we are seeing fuel surcharges added also. We are trying to get maximum compaction in the containers to save on hauling costs, sometimes we can not get a truck here soon enough to swap out the containers, so we have to put trash or recyclables in the old building until we get a new container swapped out.

Librarian's Report 2021

COVID-19 still dictates how the library functions, as determined by the State of Maine CDC and the Maine State Library. We have stayed in compliance with the State Guidelines to the best of our abilities throughout this pandemic, and will continue to do so, while endeavoring to serve you, our patrons.

Patrons saved \$53,297.39 in 2021 by using their library instead of purchasing materials themselves. This total does not include the inter-library loan items that were borrowed from other Maine libraries and out of state, the Large Print collection from the Maine State Library, nor all the eBooks and audio books of the Download Library.

The 2021 Summer Reading Program was "Tails & Tales." Once again, we used the online service Beanstack provided by the Maine State Library. Of the 14 registrants 5 completed the program.

We continue to keep everyone informed by our Facebook page. Events, regular activities and photos are posted there. We have been unable to provide any in-person programming due to COVID and the physical setup of our building. We offer as much as we can online. This year we offered 201 activities/programs online, which engaged 2,319 people.

This year the Maine State Library closed for renovations. We did not receive any Large Print books, so there were none to circulate. Most of the MSL services have been relocated and are becoming available.

Elsie's Reread Used Book Emporium has been closed during this year due to the lack of physical space. We were unable to have our annual book sale for the same reason.

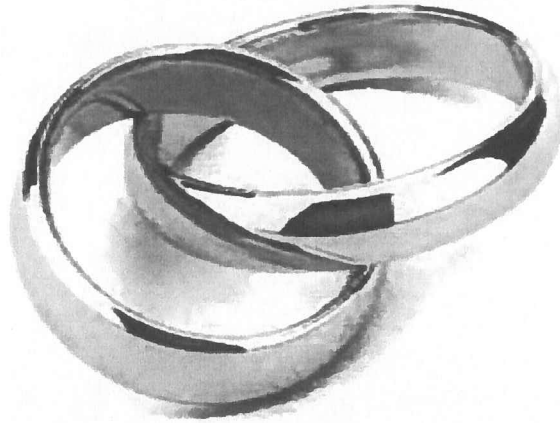

2022 Annual Town Meeting Warrant

To: Ernest N. Steward, Jr., a constable of the Town of Livermore Falls, in the County of Androscoggin, in the State of Maine:

Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the voters of the Town of Livermore Falls in the County of Androscoggin, in the State of Maine, qualified by law to vote in Town affairs, to meet at the Livermore Falls Fire Station in said Town of Livermore Falls on Tuesday, the 14th of June, 2022 at 8:00 in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles to wit:

Article 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Article 2. To choose by secret ballot in accordance with Title 30, M.R.S.A. Section 2061 all necessary Town Officials including one Selectman/Assessor for a one year term; one Selectman/Assessor for a two year term; one Selectman/Assessor for a three year term; and one RSU #73 School Board Director for a three year term.

Note: The polls will open at 8:00 o'clock in the forenoon and close at 8:00 o'clock in the evening.

Article 3:	Shall the Town fix dates of October 21, 2022 and March 24, 2023 when taxes shall be due and payable and shall the Town fix a rate of 6% interest to be paid on taxes unpaid after said date?
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Recommendation: That 6% per annum be charged commencing on October 22, 2022 on all ½ year payments not paid on or before October 21, 2022 and that 6% per annum be charged commencing on March 25, 2023 on all second ½ year payments not paid on or before March 24, 2023.

Article 4:	Shall the Town fix an interest rate of 5% on all taxes abated that have been paid in full, amount to be paid from the date the taxes were paid?
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Article 5:	Shall the Town charge a 6% interest rate to any sewer assessments not paid within 60 days of the quarterly billing date?
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Article 6:	Shall the Town authorize the Selectmen on behalf of the Town to retain, sell or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town for non-payment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they may deem advisable and in the Town's best interest, and to execute quit claim deeds for such property?
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Article 7:	Shall the Town authorize the Selectmen acting in their capacity as Sewer Trustees, to on the Town's behalf, retain, sell or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town for non-payment of sewer assessments thereon, on such terms as they may deem advisable and in the Town's best interest, and to execute quit claim deeds for such property?
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Article 8: Shall the Town authorize the Selectmen on behalf of the Town, to accept or reject any and all gifts as they deem advisable, and to expend any monetary gifts on the designated purpose of that gift and to sell, by private sale or bid, or otherwise dispose of Town property that they deem to be surplus, obsolete or unusable?

Article 9: Shall the Town authorize the Selectmen on behalf of the Town to apply for and accept State and Federal grants in the interest of improving the Town including the Sewer Department and Sewer Treatment Plant acting as Sewer Trustees?

Article 10: Shall the Town vote to place excess revenues from the sale of tax acquired property into the Dangerous Buildings Fund?

Article 11: Shall the Town carry the balances forward in the following accounts: Landfill, Street Paving, Recreation and Buildings?
 Note: Approximate totals are respectively: \$15,000, \$25,000, \$29,853 & \$15,000
